## Office of the V.B.A. Field Governor

- Many archers in the State are either shooting illegal equipment or using that which borders on the illegal side.
- Many clubs are overextending the time limits set by the State on torunaments, and this is done for a favored few archers

To elaborate on item #1, it has been my observation from many many tournaments I attend each year that the above is a very true statement. Arrowplates not manufactured on the bow are being used; many-colored servings are being used. I suggest all archers read and adhere to the following: article VII Section D Subparagraph 1 in its entirety, paying particular attention to (D 1E) for Bare bow and "E" section for freestyle," particularly "E 3".

Article VII

- D. Shooting Styles
  - 1. Bare Bow Division
    - a) Archers shooting in the bare bow division will use bow, arrows, strings and accessories free from any sights, marks or blemishes.
    - b) An adjustable arrow plate may be used to control the space between the arrow and the face of the sight window.
    - c) The use of stabilizers shall be permitted.

- d) One consistant nocking point only is permitted.
- e) No mechanical device will be permitted other than one draw check and level mounted on the bow, neither of which may extend above the arrow.
- f) All arrows shall be identical in length, weight, diameter and fletching, with allowance for wear and tear.
- g) The ends or edges of laminated pieces appearing on the inside of (cont. page 2)

# What is V.B.A.?

"Point of order," cries one of the delegates at a typical V.B.A. meeting. Then follows a long dissertation and wrangle and jangle on how a motion must be made. In the process sometimes the idea or the thrust of the idea loses its impetus. Sometimes a clever delegate will do this on purpose.

"That's why I'll never go to another V.B.A. meeting," complained a member recently to one of the officers. "All they do there is haggle over procedures." "Well, you've got to have procedure," the V.B.A. officer argued. "After all, Congress is run by Robert's Rules." "Congress is messed up too, so I can't see that that is any argument," retorts another archer. The V.B.A. officer can't find a table to get under, so he just stands there and lets the barrage fall where it may.

No, V.B.A. is more than just an exercise in Robert's Rules. It's a darn good organization that has done as much as any any state organization for the bow hunter. As for tournament archery, -- well, after all, the delegates are made up of these same tournament archers. The only trouble is that the whole legislative load is carried by 12 to 15 delegates out of the 28 clubs that should be represented. And very often the complaining clubs are the ones that do not have representation.

Those that feel change is needed should make their opinions known to their delegates, and if your club isn't represented at the V.B.A. meeting and you haven't asked why or volunteered to represent your club, then all than can be said is "Shame on you!"

the upper limb shall be considered a sighting mechanism.

E. Archery Equipment Regulations Used
3. The following releases will be legal
in the free style shooting competition: gloves, tabs, ropes, leather
straps, ledges and hooks. Mechanical sear or trigger type devices
shall be illegal. Releases other
than gloves, tabs or fingers shall
be deemed illegal in the bare bow
and competitive bow hunter divisions.

The trigger release by Killian (check it) is illegal.

(2) It has been brought to my attention that on numberous occasions the time limits set by the State Association are being overextended by clubs. Then, in turn, the clubs are allowing the already overextended time limit to be further overextended by certain privileged archers, causing uncalled-for delays in lunch, putting up targets for afternoon rounds, restarting afternoon rounds, and lastly, awarding of torphies or pins, whichever the case may be. In short making a very long day. Therefore,

the time limits should and will be strictly adhered to. If one certain archer is holding up a tournament, this archer shall be disqualified and the ones being held up shall be allowed to complete the round.

Time limits set forth by State are as follows:

Field round: 4 hours
Hunter round: 4 1/2 hours
Animal round: 3 1/2 hours
Internat rd.: 3 1/2 hours

These times were overextended 1/2 hour for the State Shoot and the Open only on a trial basis.

In conclusion I will charge that all clubs and archers along with the officers of V.B.A. are responsible for this policy. Let's clean up the archers equipment and shoot for the betterment of archery.
