N.F.A.A. Director Reports on Mid-Atlantic Meeting

Our N.F.A.A. director, Robert Cissel attended the Mid-Atlantic sectional meeting on August 18-19, 1979 at Mayberry Archers, Taneytown, Md. He gave the following report at the V.B.A. meeting recently and instructed club delegates to go back to their clubs for direction on voting on the agenda items at the February N.F.A.A. meeting in Seattle, Washington.

N.F.A.A. Council Meeting Report

The N.F.A.A. will now employ 4

full time and 3 part time employees. The N.F.A.A. Exec. Secretary position will be filled after the decision has been made rather or not to relocate the NFAA headquarters to Park Rapids, Minn.

Archery Magazine will now be published bi-monthly.

NFAA national tournament for 1980 and 1983 will be held at Watkins Glen, N.Y. In 1980 the dates are July 21-26. Aroura, Illinois looks good at this time for 1981.

The Mid-Atlantic tournament will be held at Watkins Glen, N.Y. on June 21-22, 1980. 28 field to be the first day and 14 hunter and 14 animal to be shot the second day. There will be 14 targets set up to practice starting at noon Friday at a fee of \$1.00 per round. Registration will close at 11:00 P.M. on Fri., June 20.

The NFAA Indoor tournament will be held on March 8-9-, 1980 at Omaha, Nebraska.

A proposed Mid-Atlantic Indoor tournament will be held on April 12-1 3, 1980. (tenative location -Greenbelt, Md.)

Family registration will be reinstated in 1980 for the Sectional and National Tournaments.

A workshop is proposed to study the rules in 1981.

Agenda items for February

Hold a 3 day Nationals instead of a 5 day.

• Allow three fingers under in the bowhunter division.

. That bowhunters be required to shoot at least 4" fletch.

To critique National tournaments . in the future so as to improve the tournament.

Distribute the annual agenda 80 days prior to the National meeting. No one shall hold NFAA office

. without 6 shoots on their card in the preceeding year.

Alternate the National tournament from July to August to give others a chance to shoot.

• Increase the size of the spot on the 35 cm face at 23-20, 32, 28 yds. on the hunter round and 25 and 30 yds. on the field round.

Clarify the ruling on the pylon cable guard.

Allow 10' for a dropped arrow. Change the round to 20 targets to speed up the round by deleting the bunny, 15, 45 walk up and 80 yd. walk up.

Limit the bowhunters to shoot only up to 60 yds.

* Bill Boyle and Paul Double will serve as National tournament chairmen for the Mid Atlantics at Watkins Glen, N.Y. in 1980.

Reservations should be made as soon as possible for both the Mid-Atlantice and Nationals.

Paul Double was reelected as * the Mid Atlantic Councilman.

★ It was proposed that the NFAA councilbe allowed to decide on the NFAA meeting site for 1980, as the state of Washington may not be in the NFAA next year.

The 1980 Mid-Atlantic meeting will be held at Watkins Glen, N.Y. on June 23, 1980 following the Mid Atlantic.

V.B.A. MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

The quarterly VBA Meeting the weekend of September 15-16 got off to an official start on Saturday night at the scheduling session for next year's shooting dates. Directors and guests representing 17 VBA clubs were in attendance. The date for the June 1980 VBA meeting was the only change made as this meeting would fall on the same weekend as the Mid-Atlantics. It was moved to the weekend of June 28-29, 1980 so as not to conflict with the Mids.

Roger Firth, Field Vice President reported that he had ordered 1000 new VBA pins from the firm in North Carolina. He expects shipment soon on these. He also reported that he had approximately 120 old VBA PINS AND INSTRUCTED CLUB DELEGATES TO TAKE BACK TO THEIR CLUBS THE FACT THAT THESE PINS WILL BE AUCTIONED OFF AT THE January meeting to the highest bidding club.

In agenda business, it will now be mandatory for all clubs to recognize CFSBH limited and unlimited at all sanctioned tournaments.

The unit rule mandatory for a period of one year was defeated and clubs will not have to follow it.

The proposed indoor class breakdown was carried and all clubs having indoor leagues this year will now have a classification system to follow. This breakdown was published in the last issue of Flight.

After much confused discussion the agenda item regarding the elimination of casual registration at sanctioned tournaments was voted down. All clubs can still have casual pin shoots and annuals. The starting time for all tournaments will be specified on the schedule cards.

The Bowhunters Jamboree East for 1980 will be hosted by Princess Anne Bowmen, while Loudoun was awarded the honor of hosting the Bowhunter Jamboree North East as well as the Northern Virginia Championship.

The following are agenda items for the January 1980 meeting and you are asked to review and instruct your delegate how to vote on them.

1. Have all clubs take to their membership for approval or rejection the following breakdown for a TRIAL CLUB SHOOT to reduce high cost and number of trophies and medals now required for a shoot.

Instead of classes, go to all archers shooting in score division against each other regardless of the method of shooting, men, women, youth, and young adults.

This would reduce the number of medals and trophies from approximately 360 for 3 awards in all classes and divisions to 30 for adults plus 30 for cubs. (made by Two Rivers)

2. Shawnee Bowmen wishes to eliminate the animal round from a two day State Closed. They feel the animal round is untair to decide a championship and also 2 rounds shot in one day is too much.

3. Two Rivers wishes to have shot at the State Closed Championship shoot a 1 shot animal round from the animal stakes no further away than 50 yards. Kill area scores 20 points, vital area 10 points, and the balance of the animal, zero.

4. Hugh Darnell moved to have as an agenda item the elimination of the 120 day rule at the State shoot.

5. Gene Rose moved to have as an agenda item that all cub and youth divisions must have adult supervision.

6. Dickie Hall moved to have as an agenda item that the Pro division only be recognized at the State Indoor the State Open, and the State Closed. At all other shoots, the Pro would have to shoot as non-competitive.

At the Saturday night bull session at the January VBA meeting, there is a seminar planned on Parlimentary procedures.

Pucket wins state archery title

Riley Pucket of Alexandria scored top honors at the Augusta Archers range just east of Staunton Sunday to capture the state championship in the Virginia Bow Hunters Association's annual closed tournament.

Pucket accumulated 1,620 points out of a maximum 1,680 to take the title in the freestyle men's AA division. He also scored the highest number of points of the 189 archers participating in the tournament.

All told, well over a dozen state champions were crowned at the event, with winners coming from divisions for men, women, young adults, boys, girls and cubs.

Pucket had rounds of 533, 556 and 531 for his total. He barely edged Morris Atwood of the Augusta Archers for the title. Atwood, who trailed Pucket by one point going into Sunday's action, recorded a 526 on his final round to end at 1,614, six points behind the winner.

Pucket who has shot higher rounds this year, was still pleased with his win. "You don't normally score as high in the state as you do in local tourneys because there is just too much pressure," he said. Then complimenting the local club, he added: "I'm really impressed with this range. It's manicured like a golf course. I've shot on a lot of ranges on the east coast and never have I ever seen anything like this."

In pro competition, Robert Cissell captured the title with two consecutive rounds of 530 for a combined 1,060. W.H. Thompson was second with a 1,053.

Ann Boyd, the only woman to compete in the pros, finished with a 1,026 to win her classification.

In the freestyle women AA class, Eula Hogge was the top scorer with a 1,564 while Jean Miller finished with a 1,493.

The state closed tournament which dates back to the early 50s, saw its largest field ever to assemble compete for this year's titles. The event was limited to Virginians from the 32 local clubs across the state, although a few out of state "guests" were allowed to unofficially compete.

1 Jack: Crouse, president of the Augusta Archers, was very pleased with this year's tournament. "It's the first time we have had the state championship in the last five years, and the 189 entrants is a record for our club. The turnout really surprised us because we felt the gas situation would hold it down.

"Normally, the state closed tournament is a three day shoot, but this year, the three rounds were pushed into two days. All the competitors qualified at their local clubs based on the number of rounds they shot."

Crouse particularly noted the large number of archers in the freestyle bow hunter's class, a relatively new division only recently opened up. "A lot of archers went to it because it simulates the equipment used for deer hunting. A person can shoot in archery tournaments all season then take the same bow and equipment and walk out in the woods. It's getting bigger and bigger every year."

The Augusta Archers will be busy again this weekend, hosting an all deer shoot. Twenty-eight deer targets at varying distances will be set up. The shoot is open to the public and will start at 9:00 a.m. Sunday. Additional information can be obtained from Dave Arbogast at 942-2220 or Ron Lotts at 943-7116.
