# YOUTH: Future of Bowhunting

Just a quick note to point up that VBA member Jeff Nathan, of McLean, Va. and a member of the Loudoun Bowhunters Archery Club took three deer with his bow in the fall of 1971 when he was eight years old.

His first, was a 102 no. white fallow deer taken in Penna. in Sept. On the opening day of the Virginia bow season, Jeff took a whitetailed doe deer on Presquile National Wildlife Refuge, being one of four bowhunters of 85 to score.

The following day, Jeff took his second whitetail in two days. However, the deer was hit by two other bowhunters before coming by Jeff's stand.

Under the Unwritten Law of the Bowhunter, Jeff gave the deer to the first bowhunter who had struck the deer with a non fatal skull shot with a light bow and dull broadhead. Jeff's shot was a throat and neck shot at about 8 yards, and his bow drove the Black Diamond broadhead thru the neck to the fletching. Both hunters wanted Jeff to take the deer, but his comment was "I don't want this deer, it's all shot up."

Recently an eleven year old hunter, Eric Patton of McLean Va. did almost the same thing, placing a Super "S" broadhead thru both lungs of a deer hit in the hip by another member of his party. After tracking the deer and spending an hour on hands and knees in a swamp, the other hunter claimed the deer, and Eric, being a true sportsman, gave up his first deer. There is more to hunting than just "gettin a deer."

The Ishi Bowhunters of McLean has recognized Eric's sportsmanship and has honored him at a recent Club Game Feast with a Gold Trophy for the 1977 SPORTS-MANSHIP AWARD.

Other VBA members honored included Ken Sorrells for the 1977 Big Groundhog, Jeff Nathan for the biggest Doe - 126 no., and Dave Watson for the 1977 Outstanding Bowhunter Education Instructor Award. In short, VBA members did well during the Awards Ceremony, which included awards presented to Mr. Frank Everest, Commissioner of the Virginia Game and Inland Fisheries, who is also an avid bowhunter.

Congratulations to these young bowhunters. The future of bowhunting rests with our youth and how we develop them.

#### Whitetail Deer Food Preferences

Provided below are some statistics extracted from a study performed by the Wildlife Habitat Research Unit, Southeastern Forest Experiment Station, Forest Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture, Blacksburg, Virginia.

The study area covered seven Southeastern states including Virginia. During the study, the stomach contents of deer were analyzed to determine what foods were being eaten.

The study indicated that during the Fall season (in which Virginia bow season occurs) acorns were the most popular item in a deer's diet. Green leaves of woody plants were the second most sought after food. Overall, honeysuckle was the most popular green leaf. Mushrooms were the next most preferred food. Contrary to generally accepted beliefs, deer from Southeastern states consume very limited quantities of hard, woody browse.

The implications that the data have for the bowhunter are clear. Locate the preferred foods in a hunting area and you are likely to locate deer. Keep in mind the fact that food preferences change as the seasons change. For example, in the Spring when acorns are not plenti-

ful deer consume a much larger amount of green leaves. This is one reason it pays to scout for deer immediately prior to hunting season. The deer will often be feeding in locations different from those they frequented only weeks earlier.
