Why not see America on your way to the 23rd annual NFAA tournament Convention in Salinas, California? From July 29 through August 2, more than 600 competing archers and their families are expected to converge on the Salinas Valley and Monterey Bay area of California.

Vacation time means much more than swimming, horseback riding or shooting

archery. The Salinas Convention and Special Events Bureau has planned added attractions for the archers and their families. While Dad or part of the family is out shooting, the Convention Bureau has scheduled a variety of tours in the immediate area for the non-shooting members of the family. The Richmond Archers of the Izaak Walton League are going all out to make the first Virginia Open Archery tournament July 6 and 7 one to be remembered. Three new 28 target ranges have been constructed at the Richmond Izaak Walton Park to accommodate visiting archers who will shoot 28 field targets on Saturday and a 28 target hunter round on Sunday. Novelty shoots and other entertainment planned is guaranteed to leave shooters with no dull moments during the two-day event.

Two of the new ranges are located in an attractive wooded setting and the third is in an open field area. The two wooded ranges have cement shooting stakes and excelsior target butts. All ranges are of the spectator type with adequate provisions for those who want to watch the shooters and a minimum of walking for those participating. All are attractively laid out and marked with signs featuring the club emblem.

Facilities at the park are expected to appeal to visiting archers. A well stocked 27 acre fishing lake will provide some exciting off-hour entertainment. The wooded camping area on the lake shore is expected to be humming with the activities of shooters and their families. The campground pavil-

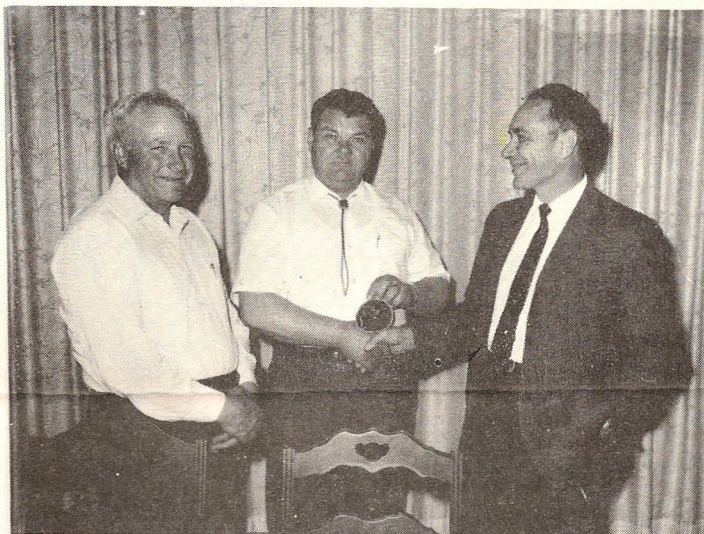

COMMISSION OF GAME AND INLAND FISHERIES DROPS ELK SEASON

As a result of much local opposition the Commission of Game and Inland Fisheries vetoed the controversial proposed Elk season for Bland and Giles Counties at the Commission meeting in Richmond, April 20. Opposition was expressed by both County Boards of Supervisors in addition to petitions from local citizens and groups. The gobblers only fall turkey season proposed for Eastern Virginia was approved for all counties open to turkey hunting last fall, plus King William. Season dates will be December 16 through January 15, The November 4-December 17 western turkey season for birds of either sex was approved.

West of the Blue Ridge the 2-week deer season was approved with doe shooting permitted on the last day only in Alleghany, Augusta, Bath, Botetourt, Clarke, Craig, Frederick, Giles, Highland, Page, Rockbridge, Rockingham, Shenandoah and Warren Counties. Other western counties will be limited to bucks-only shooting.

East of the Blue Ridge the Novem-

ber 18 through January 4 deer season was unchanged, with doe shooting authorized for about half of the counties. Northern Virginia counties with a one-deer limit will be allowed to shoot does on the last day except in Albemarle and Louisa where does will be legal game the last 3 days of the season. Three days of doe shooting will also be permitted at the end of the season in Fluvanna County.

One doe will be permitted in the bag in Northern Neck counties during the last 12 hunting days, and in Brunswick, Greenville, Isle of Wight and western Nansemond Counties, Southampton and Sussex Counties will be allowed one doe in the two-deer bag throughout the season. Deer hunters in the rest of eastern Virginia, including Buckingham County where 3 day doe shooting was proposed will be restricted to bucks only. The special season for sika deer and whitetails on Assateague was approved allowing archers on the Island October 16-19 and shotgunners plus archers on October 15 and 16. The bag limit will be one of either sex.
