1966 State Champs Crowned

Several changes were seen this year in the regular lineup of VBA state champions.

Clifford Necessary, the National Field Archery Association's Bare Bow champ and perennial winner of the same division in Virginia, elected not to defend his championship and compete in the Freestyle Division.

Tom Frye, Leesburg Bare Bow archer, in a hard fought battle with Ed Rose captured the Men's Bare Bow honors and took over the top spot.

In the Freestyle Division, record breaking scores blazed over the three courses at the Sherwood Archers Club.

Phillip Tillison, of Bristol, shot an amazing aggregate score of 1,592 overtaking James Mitchell of Bedford with an equally amazing score of 1,561.

Cliff Necessary placed third in the division with 1,555.

For the seventh time, Mary Lee Craft gained top Women's Bare Bow honors with a score of 1,197. Penny Shannon, a B Class shooter out shot the others in A and placed second overall in the Women's Bare Bow Division.

Betty Kello successfully defended her Freestyle Championship with a top aggregate of 1,175 over second place Mertie Shultz who scored 1,142.

In the Bowhunter Division, absent from the Virginia scene for some time, Franklin Mc-Peak holds the top spot shooting a score of 1,375.

in any class; unless it be just for the Hunter Division.

I would like to express some of the reasons pointed out, as to why the animal round should be changed. Many instances of sand-bagging have been cited by club members of each respective club, accusing members of using the animal round to increase his of her score. You will have to agree it is possible to use this round in this manner. For the most part it has been left up to the archer's integrity and sportsmanship to control his actions. Whether we face the facts right or wrong is a matter of opinion. Who is wrong? It remains that if the gate is left open, some will wander through whether it be right or wrong. If we close the gate all will have to function within the confines of the rules.

Something must be said for the animal round and the hunters that conceived it, and also for the ones that like to shoot this round. I believe that most archers like the animal targets and likewise a fine hunting knife, but not one of them would like it sticking between his shoulder blades.

It was said at the V.B.A. meeting, that if it wasn't for the hunters there would be no V.B.A., this may or may not be true. When the V.B.A. was organized all archers were using heavy equipment (wooden shafts and shelf bows) suitable for hunting. The ranges were laid out in rough terrain with many shots from tree-stands and in between trees, and the stakes were unmarked. We broke up a lot of arrows and our scores were poor, 250 and you were a top shot. We shot arrows from the bow shelf, and sights were not used. This was truly a hunter's range.

Archery equipment and the finer points of shooting have come a long way. The ranges have been cleaned up and the more difficult shots removed. I think the ladies helped decide this change, God bless them. The sight shooter needed to know the distance on every range not just his home range. The instinctive shooter was pushed to change, to find new ways to keep up with the rising scores. The

true instinctive archer is dead to competition, this is a sad affair and we can mourn his passing. But someone once said, "Death is a part of living." We must change with times or be left behind. Whether the animal round stays or is changed, is up to you the archer.

Since it is the tournament archer who is mostly affected by the use of the animal round, it is up to him to express his opinion on its use by voting on its use in tournaments.

Five (5) reasons why the animal round should not be used in championship shoots.

- 1. Club shoots and V.B.A. shoots do not feature this round enough.
- 2. Scoring is too different from field and hunter rounds.
- 3. It does not help hunting ability; originally it gave practice to the hunter, when the stakes were unmarked, the hunting and tourrament bow was one and the same
- Tournament archery is precision shooting and the element of guess should not determine a champion.
- 5. It is a haven for sand-baggers below "A' class, as you know "A" shooters must shoot all they can on every round.
