



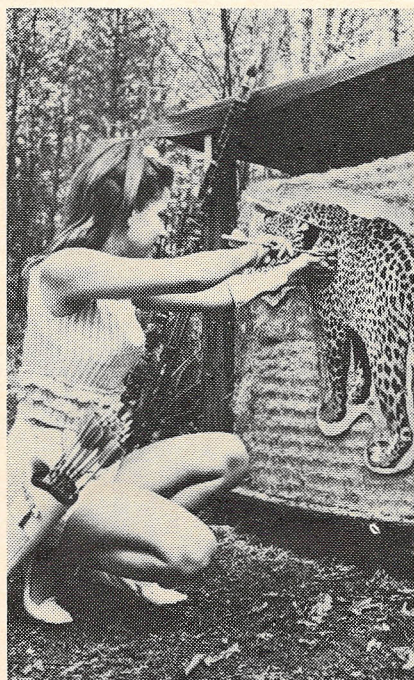

CUB RUN PLANS SAFARI SHOOT

The Cub Run Archers, Centreville, Va., will hold an "International Safari" shoot July 16 and 17 at the club's range.

Featured will be 28 different Big Game Animal targets from Africa, Asia, North and South America and Australia. Bowmen will try to hit these trophy animals from 10 to 60 yards under hunting conditions for two days, Saturday and Sunday.

Casual registration will open Saturday at 9 a.m. and close at 5 p.m. and will open again Sunday at 9 and close at 3. Food and refreshments will be served throughout the day, with a party planned for Saturday night. During Saturday evening, African and Indian Safari films, 16 mm in color and sound will be shown free at the Izaak Walton Field House next to the range.

Scoring will be the same as the NFAA animal round, so bring your numbered field arrows. All three divisions will be recognized, including the Bowhunters Division as well as an unclassified division.

Archers may shoot as many rounds as they desire, with the best single score counting. Trophies will be awarded in all classes, along with many special awards. A raffle is being held, for the building fund, with a set of custom made arrows, any type of material, as first prize. Second is a dozen

broadheads. Third, a custom-made hunting bowstring. The drawing will be held Sunday evening by the lovely Miss Bonnie Smith, of Washington, who will award the trophies and prizes.

All tournament archers and bowhunters are invited to sharpen their hunting skills on realistic targets. There will be no small game, only big game animals. Top shots from all over the East will be there, many priming for the NFAA nationals to be held after this shoot in West Virginia. It is possible that someone will shoot a perfect 560.

Civil War buffs will enjoy the historic Bull Run Battlefields which are close to the course, as there are also earthworks and trenches on the range. There are motels and restaurants nearby. Adequate parking facilities are available. Novelty events are planned late into the evening. The practice area will be lighted until midnight.

The "International Safari" is a first in the Virginia area and the Cub Run Archers welcome each and everyone to visit with us and enjoy the fun-filled weekend. For more information, call or write "Tink" Nathan at 6232 Cumberland Avenue, Springfield, Virginia.

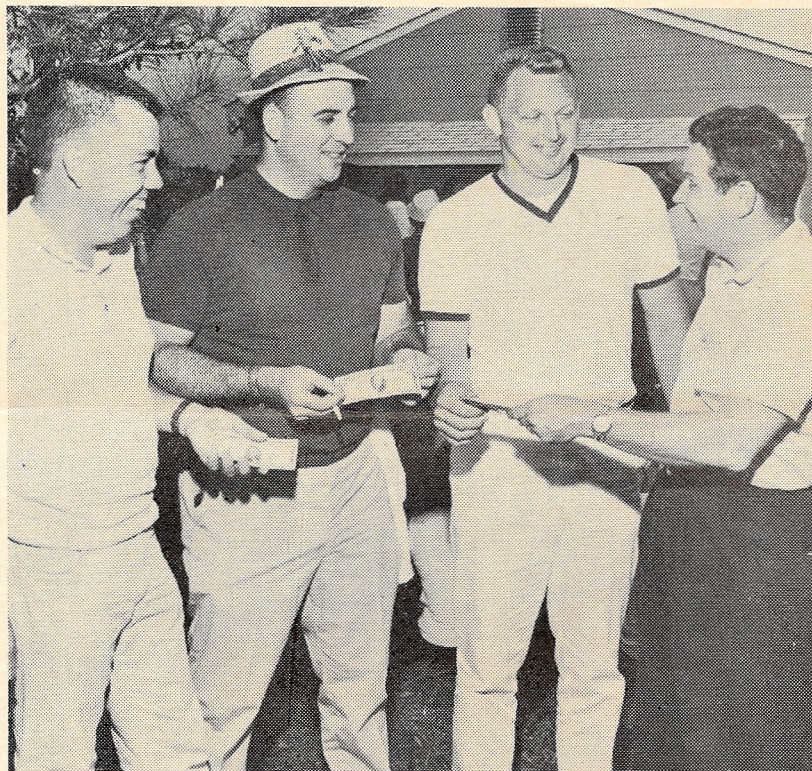

This year saw a new face in the winner's circle at the Annual Bob Monteith and some familiar ones also.

Cliff Necessary overcame the perennial winner of the Bare Bow Division, Emo Moore, with a two-round score of 1,005.

Cliff's morning Hunter Round found him 29 points ahead of Emo with a 506 as compared to Emo's 477. In the afternoon, Emo scored a 488 but still could not close the gap. Cliff scored a 499 on the Field Round and Emo had to settle for second place.

Tom Frye with rounds of 467 and 462 finished third in this division.

In the Freestyle Division, Jack Cantwell led all the way from the first arrow and finished with a 1,027. Jack's rounds of 519 and 508 enabled him to recapture first place in this division.

Tom Taylor shot a 996 to take second place.

Third place was won by Jack Midkiff, winning in a tie over Wyatt Mays. Their aggregate scores were 936.

Louise Wilson took first place honors among the ladies with a 699 over Mary Lee Craft who shot a 689.

This year's Monteith was one of the most successful run by the Richmond club with 135 archers vying for the silver trophies.

It was a first for the state and everyone enjoyed it.

This was the first Virginia Outdoor PAA Championship, held the day preceding the Bob Monteith.

Taking home the loot in the money shoot were: Charles Powers, Jack Cantwell, and Tom Frye.

Charles's 285 out of the possible 300 netted him \$15, Jack's 281 gave him \$10, and Tom Frye (shooting instinctive) won \$5.

The Richmond Archers constructed the PAA course, which is 10 targets, ranging from 16 yards to 65 yards.
