SITE OF STATE CHAMPIONSHIP

RICHMOND ARCHERS TO BE HOST FOR TOURNEY

Even this early in the season, tension is mounting toward the Nineteenth Annual VBA State Championship Tournament to be hosted by the Richmond Archers over Labor Day weekend.

Actual work will begin this month on the three new ranges in beautiful Bryan Park in the northside of the City of Richmond. The tournament will be held with the cooperation of the Department of Parks and Recreation of Richmond and will offer shooters such modern conveniences as lavoratories, telephone, water, beautiful

camping and picnic areas with an abundance of tables and plenty of shelters.

Bryan Park is located off Routes 161 and 95 and contains 263 acres of well-kept lawns, rolling terrain and large trees. The Park is especially noted for its beautiful Azelea gardens.

It is easily accesible from all areas of Richmond and within five blocks are located such modern motels as Holiday Inn and Town Motel.

The three ranges will be entirely new and no one will have an opportunity to practice before the State Shoot.

Television, radio and newspaper coverage will be used to advertise the event and put it before public attention.

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SAVE MONEY ON OTHER ARCHERY TACKLE AT HITE'S ARCHERY

Jack Cantwell Takes 16th At Pearson Open

A Portsmouth archer, Jack Cantwell, has picked up the "gravy" in the Ben Pearson Open held in Detroit April 10 and 11.

Jack fired a 285 and 287 on the Professional round to cop 16th place for \$140. This was the second Pearson for Jack. Last year he finished 18th.

Jack describes the event as a pleasurefilled spectacular. This year's Open, held in Cobo Hall, saw a record 1,070 archers hit the lone for the \$12,000 in prize money.

James Ploen, of Bloomington, Minn., pocketed first money of \$1,000 for his 294-290 rounds. Just 16 points less than perfect.

We have also been informed that Jack Cantwell, who has been in the winner's circle many times, scored a perfect 280 for 14 targets at his home range at Fort Eustis recently.

Cliff Necessary To Defend National Title

With the NFAA Regional Mid-Atlantic tournament out of the way, all eyes will turn to the 20th Annual National Champion ships in Watkins Glen, N. Y.

Dates for the event are set for July 26 through 30, with 28 targets being shot on each day and awards Friday afternoon.

Among those Virginia archers competing in this year's competition will be Cliff Necessary of Richmond who will be defending his 1964 Instinctive Championship. Cliff's record breaking total of 2537 for the five rounds set a new mark in the national books. Cliff scored 487-513 on field rounds, 517-512 on hunter rounds and 508 on the animals.

All of us hope that his competitors will again ask Cliff if it was necessary for him to make the trip to New York.

VBA By-Laws To Undergo Complete Revision

Organization (or the lack of it) appears to bear much of the responsibility for the present decline of archery in Virginia. This is the view of Carey Price of Arlington who proposed that a total revision of the By-Laws, which already have been amended to the point that the manual is out-dated, would be a remedy for this situation.

As a result of this discussion, president Gene Limerick has appointed a committee of Ted Grefe, Carey Price and Irv Sears to completely revise and update the VBA By-Laws.

TEACHERS TO GET GRANTS FROM VBA

The Board of Directors of the Virginia Bowhunters Association has voted to donate \$150 to provide scholarships for teacher tuition in a conservation shortcourse to be held during June, July and August.

The short-course is provided by the Virginia Resource-Use Education Council. The board also donated \$75 for construction of feed patches in Botetourt County.

Results of C. I. VanCleve Memorial Shoot

A Freestyle B moved into A in real style by beating all the A's in the first Annual C. I. VanCleve Memorial Shoot at the Walton Park archery club in Lynchburg.

John Marks of Lynchburg fired a 463-479 to be the over-all winner in the trophy event.

Some 85 participants initiated the new spectator course built by the club at the Izaak Walton Park in Lynchburg.

Bob Terry of Roanoke was winner in the Instinctive Division.

VFW ADVOCATES DOE SEASONS TO BALANCE HERDS

Deer hunting continues to become increasingly important in Virginia. Under more lenient hunting regulations, based on deer productivity, the harvest could easily be increased.

Overpopulation in some sections has resulted in reduction in deer weight and antler size, and in the worst areas reproductive rates have lowered as much as 50%. The only practical solution to this problem is to harvest more antlerless deer, and our biologists are firmly convinced that equal numbers of bucks and does may be taken on a statewide basis without damaging the herds.

As a comparison in 1956-57 the total deer kill in Virginia was 20,861; in 1957-58 the deer kill was 22,473; in 1958-59 the deer kill was 26,843. The 1964-65 season the deer kill totaled 31,126.

For maximum recreation and sensible and scientific utilization of this natural resource, regular seasons for does as well as bucks are both desirable and necessary.

BOB MONTEITH WINNERS CROWNED

Champions have been crowned for the Richmond Archers Annual Bob Monteith Tournament held May 23.

The two big winners were Emo Moore of Warwick in the Instinctive Division and Jack Cantwell from Fort Eustis taking Freestyle honors. This was the second year in a row for both.

Emo came through in a real "squeaker" for a win over a "hot in pursuit" Cliff Necessary. Emo chalked up a 499 on the field round held in the morning while Cliff scored a 492 to be just 7 points behind.

On the afternoon Hunters' Round an even 500 by Cliff wasn't quite enough to overtake a 497 for Emo. Final aggregate scores were 996 for Emo and 992 for Cliff.

In the Freestyle Division there was quite another story. Jack Cantwell was never in trouble and scored 521 and 518 for 1039. James Mitchell was closest to the sight-shooter with 496-492 for a 988 total.

120 archers from throughout the state braved what was said to be the hottest-humid day so far in Richmond. An added attraction of the event was drawing for a \$100 lawnmower won by Ed Rose, Jr.
