From The Office Of Hunting Vice President

Now that the State champions have been determined, and fitting champs they are, we can turn our attention to the fast-approaching bow season. This season we want to stress safety above everything else. There is no justification for shooting at something we are not positive we intend to kill. There is no way we can justify a careless shot and there is no way we can tell the widow, mother, or children of a hunting buddy that we thought he was a deer. Think about it, is a chance shot at a deer worth endangering someone's life? Let's stalk or wait out our game until the chance of maybe being mistaken is past. Let's keep bowhunting the safest sport on the hunting scene.

Most game officials think bowhunters are real sportsmen. Let's not give them any reason to change this thinking. Let's think about hunting etiquette.

We all know a shooting stand or platform in a tree is the ideal way to get your buck. You are above your game and the air currents carry the human scent above the game. You have the advantage of being able to see farther, and usually you have an unobstructed position to draw and release your arrow. Now, there is one drawback to this tree stand business. A tree offering a good stand is usually growing any place except where you want your stand. The answer is one of the several tie-up stands on the market today. They look complicated to use but when they are demonstrated, what could do the job and be any simpler? A nailed up platform and wooden stake ladder? Remember, the landowner and the forestry officials are within their legal rights if they summon you for nailing a platform or a ladder to their trees! Be a good sport, tie up your tree stand and remove it when you get out of the tree.

Have you seen bowhunters on the fenders of cars and trucks, and standing in the back of trucks with strung bows? Does this strike you as being a sportsman-like method of hunting? You bet your life it isn't. What do you think Game and Forestry Officials think when they see this manner of hunting? What about our gun hunting friends? No wonder we have complaints about the bowhunter when we let these things happen to our sport. We have the best sport that is offered to hunters today. Let's protect it. Let's be real sportsmen and leave no one with any doubt about it.

A reminder—the last two weeks of bow season in the west will be overlapped with the small game season. During that time, choose your hunting area and stands with this in mind. If you hear gunfire in a small woodlot, your chances of shooting a deer there will be rather slim. It would be rather discouraging to wait in your stand until just about the magic moment and then have someone open up on a squirrel and shatter your chances. We have to share this season but, if we choose with care, we can still have an enjoyable season.

Here is something that was brought to my attention last season. Several fawns were killed during the season. Yes, they are deer too, and they are smaller and harder to hit. But, can we really be proud of harvesting such small specimens? As an excuse, I've been told they wouldn't withstand the winter, but I'm not convinced. It may take a little more skill and a little more patience to wait out that big deer, but wouldn't it be more rewarding? Can't you picture the thrill of a big buck hanging on your game pole at camp? For some bowhunters (most of us—Ed.), the real thrill is in the story connected with getting a shot, whether it's a successful one or a near miss.
