# **Clifford Necessary And Mary Craft Win 16th Annual State Tournament**

# From The Office Of The Hunting Vice President . . .

It has been about a month since the State Shoot and I'm sure most of you have limbered up that ole hunting bow by now. Time is growing near for that "once a year" deer hunt all bowhunters look forward to. Quite a bit of preparation is called for if we are to be successful. If at all possible, we should do some target work, using our hunting equipment. Changing bows and using heavier equipment will make a big difference on your target. Locate an old sawdust pile, suspend a silhouette deer target in front and take pot shots from different distances and angles. This will give you a good idea of the behavior of your equipment under actual hunting conditions. After your target work be sure to put that sharp razor edge back on your broadhead. Of course, all of this doesn't do anything for "buck fever".

The outlook for hunting is much the same as last year. There is a good mast crop and in our section it has been extremely dry, so water-hole stands may be very productive. The fawn crop seems to be large but quite a few small (spotted) fawns are still being observed. Apparently, the crop is late this year.

Just about the same seasons are in store for us this year as last. One exception is the Big Levels Area. Here, the season coincides with the state-wide season except the closing date at Big Levels is October 27.

Be sure and check the season in your area for all the fringe benefits, early squirrel season, coon season, etc. Anyone tried "Dove" with the bow?

In making application for big game awards please take the extra time and effort to fill it out accurately. Help speed up the work by mailing it to: Mrs. Sue Price, 1712 N. Quincy St., Arlington, Va. Get some good pictures of your trophies and we will have a good "hunting display of pictures" to set up at future state shoots.

One word of caution: Don't get yourself in a "fix" with a bear. If you find yourself between a mother bear and her cub—someone must give ground! And a wounded bear is a "howling, blood-chilling, brush-breaking" adversary. Let's not panic, but don't be foolish where a bear is concerned.

### Thomas J. Ford, Jr., Wins National Junior Championship At Crystal Springs, Arkansas

Virginia can be proud of young archer Thomas J. Ford, Jr., who became Junior Champion in the 1961-1962 National Archery Tournament in Arkansas. The only Virginian to place, Tom shot a total of 2061 points divided as follows: 818 field round, 805 hunter round and 438 in the animal round.

He has other wins to his credit, having won third place in the Mid-Atlantic Regional Archery Tournament in June and a third place in the 1960-1961 VBA Tournament.

The new Junior Champion is now 14 years old and began shooting at age 10. He is a member of Northern Virginia Archers. The scores for the 16th Annual VBA State Championship Shoot are now in the books. New records were set in the instinctive division by Clifford Necessary and Mary Lee Craft. Clifford shot a tremendous 468 field round, 482 animal and 504 hunter for an aggregate score of 1454. Mary Lee led the women's instinctive division with a 395 field round, 362 animal and 390 hunter for an aggregate score of 1147.

The men's free style went to Jack Cantwell with an aggregate of 1366.

Bee Gomory, the only entrant in the women's freestyle, shot a very respectable 1006 aggregate.

Hunters' Division honors went to Wayne Armstrong, Sr., with a total of 1135.

Douglas Dutton again took first place in the Intermediate boys with a whopping 1270. This was only 184 points behind champ Necessary. Junior Boys' division was won again this year by Bobby Ryder with a very good 1012.

Intermediate girls' honors went to Madeline Selby with a 707 total and Junior girls was


