Truly a championship performance in anyone's book. Good luck to all our champs in the nationals, and if they can continue the kind of shooting exhibited at Harrisonburg this year, I'm sure Virginia will be in the running.

Another milestone has passed in that the first fiscal year of the reorganized VBA has passed and your new officers have been elected. To those who supported your reporter with their votes, I extend my appreciation for their confidence. To all, I pledge my best within my ability and shall sincerely do what I can to carry on, with the help of you and the other officers, the wonderful progress already accomplished in the past years by your association. Don't know how many of you are taking advantage of the bowfishing season for carp and gar, but if you haven't, you are missing out on a barrel of fun. We've heard many comments that it's "more exciting than deer hunting." We won't argue that point, but here in the Valley it's catching on like a prairie-fire. Some archers have landed better than a hundred carp already this season. Your reporter tried a couple weeks ago and has really flipped over it. Beats squirrel hunting and don't think those sluggish looking carp are any fools. They are as wary as any game animal we have come across. We haven't heard how the southern guys are doing with gar, but if it is anything like is taking place here in the Valley-Boy! We would like to hear reports from you as to how many of these rough fish you have taken and their average weight. If we have this information, we can report to the commission how many have been removed from the waters of our streams, and no game violations! Also please do not leave your catch lying on the banks to rot in the sun. They just plain stink! Either bury them or give them to some one who will make use of them. bag and spoil the whole sport for everyone else. True they are a minority of the group, but they louse-up the whole deal for everyone else. This has always been a perennial problem. It is recognized that in some cases it does penalize the honest shooter, but to date this is the best system to curb the sand-bagger. It does not get them all, but it has helped. If we realize that this rule was made as protection to the honest archer and not to penalize him, the rule shows it's better side. There are provisions for downgrading if desired, study them. Let's not tear it apart or throw it out until we can improve it by modification or substitution of a better rule.

Also our standardized pin award system was the hit of the meeting. Wouldn't be surprised if several other states adopted it in the near future. A Mid-Atlantic states tournament will be held in 1959. Say, on page 21 of the July issue of Archery Magazine is an idea that looks like a good one for us to adopt. The B & B Arrow Identification System seems to be a simple system to put into effect. We'll work it up and have it ready as soon as possible. This looks like it will get more arrows back to their rightful owners than any other method we have heard of to date. It does not affect your individual crest, yet identifies what club you belong. Strays can be bunched and exchanged at shoots or the VBA meeting every quarter.

Recommendations By-Field Vice President

The following recommendations were made by the Field Vice President, Woody Woods and adopted by the Directors.

- 1. That all targets have Junior Stakes.
- 2. That the stakes be white with the letters JR on them.
- 3. That the shooting lanes be clear with no close shots through brush.
- 4. That all rounds (Field, Animal and Hunters be shot from the same JR stakes.
- 5. A 5% variation be allowed but distance lost on one target must be made up on another.
- 6. That only the Field rabbit shot be a four position or spread shot.
- 7. Juniors are not eligible for VBA 20 pin unless shot from regular field stakes.
- 8. That all clubs install junior stakes by August 1, 1958.
- 9. That the 20 ft. field stake be the shooting position for the animal rabbit shot.

- 80 yards to 50 yards
- 65 yards to 47 yards
- 60 yards to 43 yards
- 55 yards to 40 yards
- 50 yards to 37 yards
- 45 yards to 34 yards
- 40 yards to 27 yards
