They asked about archery clubs in their areas, Sunday hunting in Virginia and about the deer population in Northern Virginia. They asked what VBA does for archers, bowhunters, tournaments and shooting styles. We were amazed at the number of parents who stopped to ask about archery lessons for their children. And, yes, we had answers for all those questions. We encouraged them to contact Paul Vogel and sign up for his "Archery Education Program" which has become a tremendous asset to VBA and its clubs. Let's keep Paul's archery program growing as his "graduates" are the archers of tomorrow. And, thanks to all you volunteers.

Participation was up at the VBA State Indoor this year, helped, perhaps, by holding the event at three different locations. Everyone had an opportunity to show their archery skills. Of the 110 archers, 20 were cubs, youths or young adults. Many of them had scores as high or higher than some of the adults' scores. Regardless of their styles, just compare these young folks' scores with those of their parents: Joshua Lohr, Patrick Vogel, Ana, Will and Joseph Domingo, Travis Gormley, Jessica Cash, Kimberly and Matthew Dobbins, Emily Routt, Mark Gallimore, Steven, Alex and Erik Carlson, Brent Stone, Chris Williams and William White. Although the parents of Sara and Lindsay Lavenhar and Aaron Eby didn't shoot, they were there to support them. Way to go, guys! Many thanks to Belvoir Bowhunters, Kingsboro Bowmen and especially Sherwood Archers and Auvray and Bill Shumate, who made sure the tournament ran smoothly!

Our Ninth Annual Awards Banquet was a big success, although attendance was down a bit from last year. Mike Roberts' speech and his slides on the "Return to Nature" was enjoyed by everyone. He is a wildlife photographer, a natural resource conservation educator and the founder of his program exposing students and teachers to the "Great Outdoors." Awards were presented to our Big Game and Bill Bennett trophy winners, to our Double and Triple Crown winners and to the following clubs for their increases in membership: Buggs Island Archers, Cub Run

Archers, Dixie Bowmen, Kingsboro Bowmen and Shawnee Bowmen.

On Sunday, the day after the banquet, delegates met to hear about and discuss VBA's outlook and some upcoming changes. As you know, each delegate is responsible to fully inform club members regarding these agenda items which are discussed and voted on at the VBA quarterly meetings. We cannot emphasize how important this is to each of you!

Considering all forms of hunting combined, the 2003-2004 hunting season was up 9.8% from last year. Antlered deer taken numbered 118,567 and does numbered 93,216. The bowhunters' harvest was 19,233, up 3%. A total of 1,510 bears were checked in, up 62% from last year.

For those of you who want to get involved and attend the many outdoor education programs offered by the Virginia Game Commission, check their website: www.dgif.state.va.us.

I am soliciting volunteers to work at the "Archery Village" for the Ducks Unlimited Great Outdoor festival on the weekend of September 17 - 19 at Virginia Motor Sports Complex. As the Archery Village manager, I need 135 volunteers to dedicate 12 hours of their time in various shifts to help with admissions, serve as range and safety masters, the regular lanes and one paralyzed veterans lane. Volunteers will be asked to attend one of the two Volunteer Orientation sessions. In return, you will receive a DU shirt, cap, gate passes and food and drink will be provided. Genesis, Horton, Bowtech, Easton and Delta will be on board as the sponsors. I will be sending out an e-mail providing more information and details to everyone.

Snow White And The Bowhunter

The anticipation had been building for weeks as the 2003-04 Virginia bowhunting season approached. My tree stands had been set for over a month now and deer sign was readily available on all the trails that crisscrossed through this small patch of deer heaven. I'd spent the last five years hunting this particular piece of property and was well aware of the potential for a nice buck to show at any one of my dozen stands.

It had only been two years ago that I was blessed with the opportunity to harvest a nice 4 x 4 that would score 115" Pope & Young. The sign of his dad or grand dad was visible on several of the cedars that dotted my hunting grounds. I was feeling very confident about the outcome of this season and waiting for the opening day to arrive was about to drive me crazy. I had located this deer the previous season and seeing the new rubs show up was proof that this big fellow was still roaming around.

As most bowhunters know, the sight of any deer will get the heart pumping, but it was not uncommon to see lots of deer while hunting this property. Seeing a doe is always fun, but it's just not the same as seeing a big set of headgear sneaking through a patch of woods. As the opening day neared all of my thoughts were concentrated on this one deer. I knew he was there and that it was just a matter of me putting in my time before we crossed paths.

October 4th had finally arrived. The night prior was, for the most part, sleepless as it is every year. My mind must go over everything that is remotely related to bowhunting several hundred times that last night before the opener. Going over the check-list of gear making sure that everything is in the pack. The bow has been ready for months and the final edge had been placed on the broadheads weeks ago and touched up one last time the day before. I was over ready and by the time the alarm went off, I was half dressed. It was going to be a fairly warm day, but just maybe that buck would be moving in the early dawn light.

It was a quick 200-yard walk to my chosen stand for the opening morning. I could make out the outline of the houses that were

just a stone's throw away as darkness gave way to the gray pre-dawn light. It was quiet, very quiet and I could hear every little noise and of course it all sounded like a deer. I don't know about other bowhunters, but it takes me a few days back in the tree to get my deer woods ears back. For the first dozen or so hours on stand the squirrels absolutely drive me crazy. If I didn't know better I'd bet that they intentionally make sounds that mimic a deer just to drive us bowhunters, crazy.

The morning hunt would end uneventfully and with the temperatures on the rise I decided I would slip back to the house and grab some lunch and my seven year old son, Wesley, so he could join me for the first afternoon in the deer woods. We arrived back at the property around 2:00 p.m. and entered the woods. I had hung two stands on a tree that stood beside a small creek just for the times when my son could join me. Since it's all but impossible for a seven year old to sit still for more than a few minutes, I felt the elevated perch would at least give us some cover.

We both put on our safety belts and climbed in the tree stands. Wes had plenty of questions to ask of me the first half hour and I'm sure he thought I was short with my answers. Of course I was trying to concentrate on my surroundings, but he made it very difficult to say the least. Kids are a riot some times with the things they think of and my son is no different. Several times it was all I could do to keep from laughing out loud. An hour had passed and he was still talking, so I just leaned back against the tree and


drifted off while thinking about the buck that had been roaming around in this neck of the woods.

I had just about gone to sleep when Wes asked what that white thing was walking in the woods. Straining to see what he was talking about I finally caught movement about 75 yards off to my right. At first glance I was sure it was one of the local dogs that lived in the neighborhood, but after closer inspection I realized it was a deer. Not just any ordinary deer at that. It was a solid white deer and it stood out like a fall moon in the night sky.

We both watched her as she made her way through this section of woods headed towards the stand that I had been sitting that morning. What a sight this deer was. In over 30 years of hunting I had only seen one other white deer. Wesley looked at me after she had disappeared with a big smile on his face and he quietly asked if deer were supposed to be white. I explained that this encounter was a rare treat and the fact that we had shared it together was all the more special. I would see this deer on two more occasions in the next two months.

I would take a nice little buck and have several close calls with other deer in the next two months, but the big buck that I had been hoping to get a chance at was keeping his daily routine private. I would get him on film thanks to one of my strategically placed trail cameras and this would only make me more anxious to be in the woods. Before I knew it the final day of hunting season was upon me and I had yet to see the buck and my white deer friend had become scarce as well.

I had decided to spend the entire day hunting with only a short break to change stands and grab a quick bite to eat. With only a few hours left of daylight and hunting season, I climbed into one of my favorite stands. This was the same stand that I had seen the white deer from months earlier and it was also the location of the trail camera that had taken the photos of the buck I had been after. My spirits were high as I watched the sun make its way towards the horizon. With

**A New Feature In
FLIGHT Magazine!**

Mark Lohr of Shenandoah County Archers came up with the "Bright Idea" of sharing information and ideas in the pages of FLIGHT. Clubs or individuals can submit their ideas for the benefit of their fellow archers. For this issue, Shenandoah County Archers have submitted two "Bright Ideas." Kudos to this club!



Use ammonia-based glue when you glue up paper targets. This keeps the critters from eating your targets before you get a chance to shoot them.



When you construct your butts, especially when using Celotex, make them six feet wide and four feet tall. This will enable you to shoot white face targets on one side and black face targets on the other side of the same butt. You can then shoot both field and hunter rounds, a full 28 target round, on only a 14 butt range. The only one you need to have 8 feet wide is the bunny. It works at our range and you actually have the ability, providing you have enough arrows, to shoot both Field and Hunter rounds as you go around, saving walking and time. The waste of two feet you'll find you're left with when cutting up a 4' x 8' sheet can be ripped 12" x 4' and put on your practice range, which doesn't usually require a double target butt. No waste, saves time, less costly to build and maintain, and you shoot a full 28 targets on a 14 butt range!

Basil Venison Tenderloin And Broccoli Stir-Fry

| 1Tbsp. canola oil | 1/2 cup boiling water |
| 3/4 lb. venison tenderloin cut in
1/2 inch medallions | 2 cubes chicken bouillon or
2 tsp. instant bouillon granules |
| 2 cups frozen broccoli pieces | 1/4 cup cold water |
| 1 medium red bell pepper, cut julienne | 1 Tbsp. cornstarch |
| 1/2 cup snow peas | 1 tsp. dried basil leaves |
| 1/2 cup fresh mushrooms | 2 tsp. lime juice, or to taste |
| 1/4 cup water chestnuts | 1/2 cup sliced green onions |

Cut venison tenderloins into 1/2"-thick medallions. Heat canola oil in a large skillet on medium heat. Add venison. Stir fry until venison is medium rare. Do not overcook. Remove venison to a serving dish. Add all vegetables except green onions. Stir fry until crisp and just tender. Combine boiling water and bouillon. Stir to dissolve. Combine cold water, cornstarch, basil and lime juice. Stir well. Add bouillon to vegetables in skillet, then add cornstarch mixture. Cook and stir until sauce is thickened. Add venison to vegetables, followed by green onions. Heat through until venison is warm. Serve over rice or Chinese noodles, if desired. Serves 2 to 4.






