Virginia Shooters at the Nationals

My wife, Debi and I made our first trip to the Nationals this year, and one thing is for sure, Virginia was there! Everywhere you looked there was some-

one from Virginia.

There were several big stories during the week, and once again one of these big stories include Cay McManus, who won the Female Barebow National Championship. Said Cay "Usually I have at least one bad day on the dots, but this year I had three good days and one great day", in route to her seventh National Champion title.

Another big story was Amy Withers, who won the Cub Female Freestyle National Champion. Amy also set a new National record for the two days of field target shooting with a combined score

of 1089.

And then there was Jane Mabe, who won the Senior Female BHFS-L National Champion. Jane may be a lot of things, but it's hard to believe she's a senior. We rented a house with Jane, Gloria & Danny Alger, Lois & Greg Housden, and Gary Alger. Not only did this save on money, but it was lots of fun too, as Jane kept something going on all the time! She was also the big money winner (\$3.75) at the nightly poker game.

Debi Barker placed second in the Female Freestyle Limited division. This was a really tough division this year. We went to the Nationals with the idea that she would have to shoot 495's to win. For the past few years the winner had averaged between 485 and 490. Debi averaged a 503 for the four days of dots and only had a 4 point lead over the second place girl, who holds the National record for that division in the animal round. After the animal round, they were tied, and Debi lost the shoot-off Friday evening.

Denny Cline placed third in the male Barebow division. I had heard the stories about the "BIG BOYS", but now I know why they are called that. These guys shot 500's like it's easy, including a 517 by winner Dave Clem of MD. on Thursday.

Ronnie Lewis tied for second in the

Male Freestyle Limited division, but lost on the tiebreaker and ended out third in the Nation.

Dale & Scarlet Rucker both shot good. Scarlet was in the Championship flight, but her cables broke on Thursday. Dale must have hated that, as Scarlett took

Friday off to go shopping!

Gary Jenks shot good, even though he broke the cables on his bow on Saturday before the shoot started. He did a real good job of getting it back together, but after attending the Frank and Dean Show, he said he was going to tear it back down this winter and start from square one. I hope he didn't learn too much, as he's a barebow shooter too!

Danny Alger wasn't pleased with how he shot, but he ended out eighth in the Championship flight, so he didn't do too bad! A new kid won the Adult Male BHFS-L division this year. Said Danny, "We kept waiting for him to figure out where he was and how he was shooting, and then panic and fade away. But he

just kept getting stronger".

C.D. Miller really shot good for the whole week, as he didn't drop below a 544 for the whole week, and had a 548 on Thursday. He ended out sixth in the Championship flight. If that doesn't sound good, listen to this. There were thirteen flights of Adult Male Freestyle Shooters, and the total number was 181 of them. Now, how does sixth sound?

Dan Book was fourth in first flight in the Adult Male Freestyle division. He had a couple of days 'down' in the 530's, but he had a few days in the 540's too, including a 546 on Tuesday. Now that's

shooting!

Gary Alger shot good in the Adult Male BHFS division. Gary was suffering from an infected tooth all week and couldn't talk very good, so Jane didn't pick on him too much. We would all like to have that clock Gary won at the raffle during closing ceremonies.

Greg Housden shot good in the Adult Male BHFS-L division. Because Gary couldn't talk, Greg became the target of all of Jane's barbs. He seemed to take it

all in stride though, as Jane is his Mother-In-Law, and he seemed used to it. Can't you guys imagine going to the Nationals with your Mother-In-Law?

For the first time since I have known him, I saw John Boyd excited about his score. While walking up the hill one day after a long day of shooting, a pick-up went by with John setting on the tailgate. When he saw me he hollered, pointing at his chest and then giving me the thumbs up. I later found out he had shot a 482. No wonder he was excited! As far as I'm concerned, those guys shoot the hardest division. John ended out tenth in the Championship flight of the Adult Male Bowhunter division.

Gloria Smith was another one who shot really good, ending out seventh in the Adult Female BHFS division Championship flight. She seemed real

pleased with her scores.

Kenny Sorrels shot good even though he had some equipment problems. He ended out fifteenth in the Championship flight. He was also another one of us Virginians who forgot his sights!

Joe McManus was doing better and better walking the string, as was evident at the Nationals. But at the State Closed he went back to the Bowhunter division. What's the matter Joe? Barebow too tough? Just kidding, I would give anything (almost) to be able to be competitive in that division!



Why Should I Join The NFAA?


I was recently at a pin shoot when I heard a club member explaining the membership options to a perspective new member. When the topic got around to the NFAA the club member explained "if you don't plan on shooting you don't need to join the NFAA". I was not surprised by this explanation, but saddened to think of a new member missing out on what it means to belong to the NFAA.

The National Field Archery Association is a federation of States organized into one unit to provide for the development of the sport of Archery. One of the main purposes of the NFAA is to encourage the use of the bow in the hunting of all legal game birds and animals. It is also the intent of the NFAA to protect, improve, and increase the sport of hunting with a bow. To develop programs dedicated to the conservation and preservation of game and its natural habitat, as well as to foster and perpetuate a spirit of good fellowship and sportsmanship among all archers are also the goals of the NFAA. To stop here would be more than enough reason for an archer to join the NFAA. But there are others.

For the Bowhunter, the NFAA offers two game awards, the Art Young Big Game Award, and the Art Young Small Game Award. There are 3 classes of bowhunter awards, the bowhunter, the expert bowhunter and the Master Bowhunter.

The NFAA also offers a Diamond Buck Award for the Largest example of mule deer, whitetail deer and blacktail deer based on antler measurements. Along with these awards, NFAA offers an opportunity for a hunter to share his hunting adventures through the bimonthly ARCHERY magazine.

The most important reason for joining the NFAA is the "clout" in which one day may help perserve the rights of every bowhunter. A bowhunter Defense



fund exists through the NFAA to develop and promote educational programs to combat anti-hunting efforts. This fund may also be used for the legal counsel in the defense of bowhunting rights.

So, the next time you, as a VBA and NFAA member begin explaining the dos and don'ts to perspective members, do encourage them to join NFAA. There is strength in numbers.

The following are RIC rulings from NFAA since I took office in June. They are in effect until they are either upheld or overturned at the Annual NFAA meeting in February 1990.

1. The index finger must be touching the nock of the arrow in the Bowhunter divisions. "Finger position may not be changed during competition."

2. The tab produced by Killiam Products Ltd is illegal in the Bowhunter divisions.

3. The A/F/C point and balance pin is not legal in the Bowhunter divisions.

4. The Neet RFT tab is tab is legal in the Barebow division.
