

From the Hunting Vice President

As you may know, this is the year the VDGIF accepts and initiates proposals for changing hunting regulations. A regulation review happens every two years. The VDGIF wants your input!

Several items of interest are waiting on your input at the VDGIF website. The address is http://www.dgif. virginia.gov/ then click on the hyperlink for regulations. There are two with different dates!

I will summarize the main ones that I think it would be in your and other bowhunter interest to take the time to go to the above site and express your opinion.

The period for you to post your remarks for this first group began March 4 and closes 5PM on April 15th. Given the mail issues with *FLIGHT*, you might receive this too late but if you get it in time please respond. In the meantime, please be aware that we informed your club leadership about this review and hopefully they called it to your attention.

The number one item in my mind is a proposal to add a Bear Hunting license on top of our big game license. I feel this is mainly to raise funds and also restrict a bowhunter from taking a bear during the archery season. I would strongly be against this and urge your input to to the VDGIF. I would also appreciate a copy sent to me at bick333@msn.com.

The next item concerns expanding the urban archery season to a few cities that were excluded in 2002. I am for this as Suffolk, Chesapeake and Virginia Beach were the ones excluded. Another proposal is aimed to have a "model" ordinance to follow for all "Urban Archery seasons." Many towns have asked for this and it is a good idea.

Another item of interest is to expand the "Youth" hunting day to include Fairfax, Loudoun and Prince William counties. This would make the youth day open statewide!

The board is proposing to close the elk season in Buchanan, Dickenson and Wise counties and require any legally killed elk outside the restoration area be made available for collection of biological specimens for disease testing. This seems important to me to protect our great deer herd and get the elk herd established.

The areas of Fairfax, Loudoun and Prince William counties may remove the daily limit and make it unlimited. This is an attempt to bring the herd under control. Also, there is a proposal to require that only one antlered buck taken in Rockingham county per license year may have less than four antler points one inch or longer on one side. Quality deer management!

As I mentioned in an earlier article, the unauthorized feeding of deer, bear and other wildlife is also prohibited in three proposed amendments. One of these is to make it illegal except in the month of July for the purpose of photographing deer.

Two other proposals have only until March 14th to post your comments. They concern fees. Check them out.....

4VAC15-20-65. Definitions and Miscellaneous: In general. Hunting, trapping and fishing license and permit fees.

4VAC15-20-66. Definitions and Miscellaneous: In General. Admittance, parking, or other use fee at certain department-owned facilities.

It is time for you, the bowhunter, to do your due diligence and spend an hour on the VDGIF site and post your opinion! It's free and if enough of us do so it will make a difference!

Enough for my soapbox... on to other news.

The banquet was great! The Keezletown Ruritans did a great job and the food was superb. Mr. Mark Damian Duda gave a very interesting presentation. The awards were very nice and everyone had a good time. Come see next year!

From the Publicity Director

Spring is Here! As the year gets underway, it is time to prepare for another 12 months of exciting archery activities. It is also time to celebrate a significant VBA milestone. As you know, the VBA has now enjoyed 70 years of success since our founding in 1941 and has effectively represented the interests of bowhunters to the Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries (VDGIF).

As mentioned at the January meeting, clubs are urged to incorporate ideas on how to celebrate this historic event. Perhaps a review of some examples of VBA achievements will help trigger ideas for you to mention at meetings or discuss in newsletters. The VBA: has clubs throughout the state that offer a variety of ranges and programs open to all members; has worked with the VDGIF for decades to enhance archery hunting in the Commonwealth; is a partner with the VDGIF in the preparation and presentation of the International Bowhunter Education Program classes held throughout Virginia; is responsible for the After School Archery Program in the Commonwealth; provides instructor training and equipment; has a hunting awards program for members that includes plaques and pins; sponsors an annual Awards Banquet for hunters and tournament archers; produces a quality magazine four times a year that focuses on archery in Virginia; hosts five state tournaments each year as well as more than 100 sanctioned club shoots; sponsors a state-wide charity shoot each year (e.g. St. Jude Children's Research Hospital, Children's Miracle Network) and numerous club shoots for charity (e.g. Hunters4Hungry, March of Dimes); offers an annual Conservation Scholarship for an eligible VBA member or immediate family member; conducts a quarterly meeting of all clubs and VBA officers to plan events and ensure smooth operation of the VBA; hosts an evolving and dynamic web site to inform all residents about archery activities in Virginia; represents the VBA at various sportsmen shows throughout the year and much, much more!

As for what the VBA has done for YOU: in 1949 – North River area (16 square miles) in Rockingham County was the first area opened to bowhunting in Virginia; in 1953 – "Big Levels" in Augusta County was opened to bowhunting; in 1956 – A statewide bowhunting season was enacted; in 1985 – A separate archery license for bowhunters was established, allowing two additional deer to be harvested; in 1994 – An additional week of bow season was added when the opening date of archery season moved from the second Saturday in October to the first Saturday in October; in 1994 – It was made legal to harvest turkey with a bow during the early archery season; in 2003 – It was made legal to harvest a black bear during the early archery season and in the process many valuable messages about hunting safety and ethics were reinforced with all involved; in 2007 – New "Urban Archery" regulations expanded the archery season by months in many locations and included harvest incentives such as "earn a buck"; in 2009 - Resumed responsibility to coordinate the After School Archery Program (ASAP) in Virginia and in 2010 – Supported a successful VDGIF plan to reintroduce elk to Virginia; Sponsored state-wide charity shoots to benefit St. Jude Children's Research Hospital; Revitalized the International Bowhunter Education Program in Virginia in conjunction with the VDGIF & National Bowhunter Education Foundation.

The items discussed in the two paragraphs above will hopefully trigger some thoughts on how you can celebrate the history – and future – of an organization that has worked hard and successfully on behalf of bowhunters and archers in the Commonwealth to preserve and expand the sport.

VBA Sixteenth Annual Awards Banquet. This year's banquet was again fantastic with a very nice turn-out. Of particular note was recognition of our Triple Crown winners: Ethan Mullins, PWMTRAD; Logan Weller, CMFS/F; Cory Mullins, YFBHFS/R; Lucas Kenley, YMFS/R; Mary Wenzel, SFFS/R and Jerry Wenzel, SMFS/F. The Double Crown winners were: Ethan Mullins, PWMTRAD; Caitlin Willard, PWFBHFS/F; Carolyn Willard, PWFBB/BH; Nichole Willard, CFBB; Cory Mullins, YFBHFS/R; Hunter Carper, YMBHFS/R; Chris Willard, AMBB; Randy Patterson, AMFS/R; Paul Vogel, AMTRAD; Dallas Hoover, SMBHFS/F and Danny Alger, SMFS/R.

The 'Big Game' winners were: Double Slam (Wade Colton, bear & deer); Big Rack (John Peeler, 9 points, 165+ total VA score); Big Buck by Weight (Dennis Scott, 175 lbs field dressed); Big Doe by Weight (Terry Dorman, 113 lbs field dressed); Largest Turkey by Weight (Cay McManus, 16.5 lbs); Largest Bear by Weight (Wade Colton, 145 lbs).

From the NBEF/IBEP Director

Progress continues to be made with Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries (VDGIF) picking up sponsorship of IBEP classes across Virginia as part of their Hunter Education Program. One example is the significant changes to the IBEP classes held at Fort Belvoir.

While Fort Belvoir has always been a strong supporter of the IBEP, because the classes were sponsored by Morale Welfare and Recreation, there has always been a charge to students to cover the cost of training materials. This year, as part of their continuing expansion of IBEP instruction, VDGIF has picked up sponsorship of our IBEP classes there. That means VDGIF is providing the student materials, so there will be no charge for the class (instructors are all volunteers). This change has also allowed us to eliminate the need for pre-registration; bowhunters can just show up before 8:00 AM on the day of the course (However, enrollment is limited to 40 students per course and filled on a first come/first served basis.) These kinds of changes make it cheaper and more convenient for those seeking to take the IBEP course, and should certainly be welcomed by all of us!

Speaking of IBEP classes, probably the most frequently asked question I get asked is where to find an IBEP class. It really is simple - You can find the location of IBEP courses across Virginia online at: <u>http://www3.dgif.virginia.gov/ClassSchedule/ClassSearch.aspx</u>. All you have to do is enter your zip code and how many miles you are willing to drive, and it will show you the location, date and time of classes. This site lists both Hunter Education classes and IBEP classes, so you have to scroll through to find the IBEP offerings. If you have questions, a Point of Contact and contact information are provided. For those near Fairfax County, I have seven IBEP classes scheduled at Fort Belvoir this year. They are on the following dates: Sat., Mar 26; Sat., Jul 16; Sat., Aug 6; Sat., Aug 27; Sun., Sep 11; Sun., Oct 9; and Sun., Nov 13.

Equipment Reviews By Bob Foster

Belvoir Bowhunters

Spring means lots of things to all of us, but with the extended anterless season finally winding down, it is a time to reflect back on which of my new product selections from last year were keepers and which were busts. Here are a few of the keepers I found.

As I mentioned in my article last edition, I spent most of my time hunting at Laurel Hill - a public park in Fairfax County. This used to be an old farm and some of the better places to hunt are thickets that don't have trees you can go up in with climbing or lock-on treestands. The trees just aren't big enough. Ground blinds could only be used selectively. That drove me to look for something portable that could get me off the ground in overgrown fields with trees that were 15 feet or under. What I found was a tripod from Big Game Treestands (http://www.biggametreestands.com/) called the Pursuit. Weighing in at only 60 pounds, I found I could carry it in and set it up by myself - a real plus. Seat height is only about 12 feet, but in the area I was hunting, that worked out just fine. I found it stable enough, and easy to shoot from. The only downside - I use a Cat Quiver because I don't like a quiver attached to my bow, and found there was no place to hang it like you can when you are in at tree. I have since purchased a leg quiver that I think will work quite nicely in the tripod next year to solve that problem. I actually took two deer from this tripod, including a 7-point buck (shown in the Winter 2010 edition of *FLIGHT*). Two other hunters used it to take deer as well. A competitive price is about \$150.00.

A second winner was a 13-foot ladder stand that actually breaks down into a small enough unit to be packed in on your back like a climbing treestand. Called the "Pack and Stack", it is sold by Rivers Edge (http://www. huntriversedge.com/). It easily fit in the back of my Explorer and didn't take any more room than a climbing treestand. Since it only weighed 33 pounds, I found I could easily carry it in and out of the woods, and the way it stacks for packing, it allowed me to carry my extra winter clothes and other items as well. It is a snap to assemble, and I had no problem doing so even in the dark. So, if you like the comfort of a ladder style stand but still want portability and ease of use, this is a real winner. At about \$80.00, this one is easy on the budget as well.

If you are like me, then you are prone to let bow maintenance slide during bow season. Something simple like waxing your bow string to keep it in tip top shape keeps getting put off. This year I decided to try a synthetic product called Winner's Choice Weather Tamer String Care Kit. It is advertised to clean, revitalize, protect and prevent wear and "fuzziness" while fully waterproofing the string against anything Mother Nature can dish out. I have to say it lived up to those claims. I applied it in August, and then didn't touch my string again until last week - and it was no worse for the wear despite a lot of days afield. This one is a keeper!

In the area of electronics, I became enamored with a product called the Plotwatcher (http://www. day6outdoors.com/). It differs from conventional trail cameras in a couple of key ways. First, Plotwatcher has no flash, so it only works during daylight hours. Second, rather than being "triggered" by motion, it can be set to take a picture at whatever interval you select, all the way down to one picture every 5 seconds (all day long). Where it really shines is when used to cover a large area like a field or food plot. When set to take a picture every 10 seconds or so, it can be used to tell not just when deer are coming and going, but where they are entering and leaving. Each picture is taken in a "jpg" format, and they are put together for you in the form of a movie (avi) so you can review several days of activity in just a few minutes. If you see something interesting, you can save individual pics. It runs off 4 AA batteries and storage is done on a thumb drive. How long they last is a function of how frequently you set the timer. At 10 seconds between pics, you only get about 2 days before needing to change them (do the math; that's a lot of pics). The other downside is that if you setup a spare thumb drive, it loses track of the date time unless immediately put into the unit. BTW - there is a camouflaged unit modified for hunters that runs about \$199.00, but the original unit is called Brinno's Garden Watch Cam (http://www.brinno. com/). It comes in fluorescent green but if you don't mind covering with camo tape you can pick one up for about \$125.00.

All of these items passed my personal field testing last year, so I'm very comfortable recommending all three.

2010 Virginia Archery Deer Kill Summary By Matt Knox

During the past deer season 219,797 deer were reported killed by hunters in Virginia. This total included 95,543 antlered bucks, 19,191 button bucks, and 105,063 does (47.8%). The fall 2010 deer kill total was 15% lower than the 259,147 deer reported killed last year. It is also 3% lower than the last 10 year average of 227,430.

Deer kill levels were down across all of Virginia and showed a significant declining trend from east to west. In Tidewater, the deer kill was down 3%. The Southern Piedmont and Northern Piedmont were down 14% and 19% respectively. The largest declines were seen West of the Blue Ridge where Southern Mountain and Northern Mountain deer kill totals were down 28% and 20% respectively. The combined West of the Blue Ridge deer kill total was down 24% and represents the lowest total deer kill in this area in over 20 years.

A decline in the total deer kill was predicted for fall 2010 based on two factors. First, the Department deer management efforts over the past five to ten years to increase the female deer kill over most of the state, especially on private lands, have been very successful. Nearly all of the increase in the deer kill over the past couple of years has been due to an increased kill of antlerless deer. These high and sustained female deer kill levels were intended to eventually lead to a decrease in the statewide deer herd and a decline in total deer kill numbers.


The second factor was the winter of 2010, which may also have resulted in some winter mortality. After a poor mast crop in fall 2009 and more than a decade of very little snow fall, winter of 2010 saw much of the western half of Virginia covered in snow for up to two months. Snow in Virginia is not unusual, but snow that stays up to one foot deep on the ground for nearly two consecutive months is very unusual.


Archers, not including crossbow hunters, killed 15,579 deer (Figure 1). The bow kill comprised 7% of the total deer kill. The 2010 archery deer kill was down 10% from 2009. Overall, the archery deer kill has been very stable between 14-18,000 deer for two decades (Figure 1). Since crossbows were legalized for all deer hunters in fall 2005, license data demonstrates that approximately 10,000 or 15% of archers have evidently put down their bow and picked up a crossbow (Figure 1). This migration from bows to crossbows was expected.

Crossbows resulted in a deer kill of 8,606 deer or 4% of the total deer kill (Figure 2). The 2010 crossbow deer kill was also down 10% from 2009. The crossbow deer kill and number of deer hunters using a crossbow has increased significantly since fall 2005. However, for the time being, the crossbow deer kill appears to have leveled off at about 10,000 deer; and crossbow participation appears to be stabilizing at about 26,000 hunters (Figure 2). Simply, put this means there are about 15,000 more deer hunters in the woods each fall in Virginia during the archery deer seasons since crossbows were legalized for everyone.

The best news for Virginia archers is that they get an extra week of bow hunting this coming fall because of the way the calendar falls. No, the Department did not change the bow season. Archery season still runs from the first Saturday in October through the

Friday prior to the third Monday in November. Last fall the bow season was six weeks. This year it is seven weeks--Saturday October 1st through Friday November 18th. Of course, the last two weeks runs concurrently with the early muzzleloading deer season. Be safe and enjoy?

Winnie and Wally would like you to try Black-Pepper Venison

Winnie and Wally got a super recipe from Gina Nadzam of Massanutten Archery Club and liked it so much they could not wait to share it with you. They say it is lip-smacking good. ENJOY!

2 lbs venison tenderloin. (You can use many different cuts of venison -- tenderloins, steaks, small roast -- they all work very well with this recipe)

- <u>Rub:</u> In a bowl combine following ingredients.
- 1 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon black pepper
- 2 teaspoons olive oil

In skillet, add 1 teaspoon of oil; sear 2 lbs venison tenderloin quickly on high heat.

Remove from pan and let cool slightly; smear Rub on all surfaces of meat and let marinate at least one hour.

In a preheated 500 degree oven, roast meat for 15-20 minutes or until rare to medium (time will depend on the cut and size of meat).

Let meat rest a few minutes and <u>slice very thin</u>. Pour pan dripping over sliced meat. Serve hot or cold with Mustard-Horseradish Sauce

Mustard-Horseradish Sauce:

2 tablespoons Red-Wine Vinegar

- 2 tablespoons Yellow Mustard
- 2 tablespoons Horseradish
- 1/2 cup mayo

 $\ensuremath{^{1\!\!\!/}}$ sour cream (optional, use if too vinegary for your taste)

Salt and pepper to taste

Whisk together, serve with meat



Huntin' Hogs in Hemingway

January 4th - 6th was the kick-off date for my 2011 hunting season. Three of my hunting buddies (Randy Andes, David Burpee and Robert "Bink" Yager) and I headed for Hemingway, S.C. for an early wild pig hunt with Rick Grubbs, the owner/operator of Waccamaw Hunting Services. It's about an eight-hour drive from Harrisonburg to Hemmingway, which isn't that long of a trip until you factor in the down side, which is spending that amount of time in a confined space with Dave Burpee.

We arrived Monday afternoon, unpacked and readied our gear for the next day's hunt. The accommodations at Waccamaw are excellent. The lodge has two bedrooms and two baths and will sleep five comfortably. There is a living room with a TV, a dining room and a full kitchen. The lodge even has Wi-Fi Internet access for all you computer geeks who feel naked if you leave your laptop at home.

Our first evening hunt (Tuesday) had most of us seeing pigs but no shots. Wednesday looked cloudy and

threatened rain all day long. Because it looked so much like rain on Wednesday, Randy decided to cross over to the dark side and took his rifle on stand with him. In true hunting fashion, it didn't start to rain until everyone was on stand.

I was passing the time watching six deer walk in and out of the swamp when suddenly the deer scattered, and here came the hogs. I watched the three hogs for about 15 minutes, trying to pick the largest before finally making the shot at 16 yards. I made the shot at 4:00 p.m., but by the time Rick picked me up it was after 6:00 p.m. and with the light but steady rain, there was no blood trail to follow. Because the temperature was in the mid-30s that night, we decided to look for the hog the next morning. Finding a black hog in dark swampy woods is almost impossible, but

the next morning it was much easier, and we found my pig piled up 40 yards from where it was shot. Randy also killed a pig that night, and Bink had a shot and missed. Burpee must stink as he didn't see anything for the rest of the hunt.

When hunting with Rick at Waccamaw Services, it is truly a wild pig hunt. His hunting lease is an old 7,000 acre plantation, and there are no

fenced animals. For the past three years Rick Grubbs has supported the VBA with a donated pig hunt that we have raffled at our annual banquet, and he has already committed to a hunt for 2012. If you're looking for a laid back fun hunt that can supply some very good table fare, give wild pig hunting a try. You may find how easy it is to get hooked on this kind of hunting.

ODDBALL By Randy Brookshire Sherwood Archers

I was hunting on top of a mountain in the National Forest when I shot an oddball the morning of Nov. 2nd. I saw him coming past my stand at first light and he stopped about 10 yards away, with his nose on my drag rag with Lethal Weapon on it. That ridge is covered with real thick laurels and all I really saw was that he had what looked like heavy horns and was a good sized deer.

I drew my recurve back and sent a Snuffer into him at about 15 yards. He ran up the ridge about 60 yards, stopped and then slid back within 10 yards of my tree stand. I got down and walked over to look at him and was shocked to see that he was still in velvet. Although he was obviously interested in the scent rag, his neck wasn't swollen up in the least. My initial investigation on the mountain led me to believe that maybe he was just a real old deer that was on the down side of life and not into the whole rut thing anymore, but once I got him home and examined his teeth, they were not as worn down as I initially thought and I don't believe he is all that old. He hadn't rubbed his velvet at all and his antler bases and burls were very large.

I have been bow hunting for 40 years and this is the first buck I have ever shot that still had his velvet on his horns.

Clubs that had the largest membership increase in 2010 were also recognized with plaques. Among the large clubs, the winner was Belvoir Bowhunters with a 20 percent increase. The small club winner was Singers Glen with a 162 percent increase.

Sportsman Expos. In conjunction with the VDGIF and VBA, working hand-and-hand, I volunteered to help our VDGIF folks at the Richmond Fishing Expo in January, the 7th Annual Orange County Sportsman Expo and the NASP State Archery Tournament in February, and the Round Oak Baptist Church Wild Game Dinner in March.

VDGIF. Two of their regional coordinators, Bob Riggs and Phil Townley, retired on January 1st. Both will continue from time to time to be volunteer instructors. They are uncertain if and when these vacant positions will be filled. The Department has reorganized from five regions to four. The reduction (possibly temporary) in their staff will make it more difficult to finish the new curriculum and the on-line event manager system. The realignment of their Law Enforcement officers to four regions will be announced shortly.

Hear Pe, Hear Pe by Olin Bare Augusta Archers

Hear De, Hear De all those who want to learn more about traditional archery.

On June 26th, as a public service, Augusta Archers and I will co-host a fun day of traditional archery classes and instruction. The goals of the event are to pass along traditional skills and to boost the family sport of archery. The scheduled events will also help the VBA membership by giving insights into the history of archery.

Archery is a fun and economical sport that can also tie families together. The cost can be minimal if you make your own bow string and arrows and, if you can hit your mark, you can put food on the table!

The day will combine target archery practice with instruction in Flemish string making, bow shooting and arrow building. I have been a VBA member for years and will organize the day thanks to the willingness of Augusta Archers to open their facility for this event.

Flemish string making will begin at 10 AM to start the day. Participants will make a two-color Dacron string for his/her long or recurve bow without the use of modern jigs. There is a fee of five dollars to cover the expense of materials. The class will last two hours.

At 12:30 PM, there will be bow shooting instruction and bow shooting with an emphasis on wooden arrow shafts, metal points and feather fletching. Archery equipment will be inspected for safety.

The final event begins at 2:30 PM when we will make traditional arrows without the use of modern jigs. We will taper a wooden shaft, apply a self or

plastic nock, fletch with feathers that are wrapped on with thread, and end with the application of a metal point. Five dollars will cover expenses of shaft, feathers, nocks, points and glue. The class will last two hours.

Classes are open to all who wish to expand their knowledge and skills. Individuals can participate in all the classes or select the ones that interest them the most. Children six and up must be accompanied by a parent. There is no pre-registration. Just show up and prepare to have a good time!

Idea Corner

This is the place in the magazine where individuals and clubs pass along ideas, tips, and innovations that might be of use to other members or Clubs. Don't be bashful. They may seem pretty mundane to you, but if someone else had not thought of the concept it will be like a BFO – Blinding Flash of the Obvious – and a valuable new idea for a club or individual.

Here are some of the ideas already published: Southern Bowhunter Award, archery golf, discounted memberships as volunteer incentives, target sponsorship, special club awards, racks to hang bows/bow cases/ coats, milk jug shoot, prize tag shoot, beat-your-score award, military and first responder discounts, free shoot for work party participants, and how to improve use of peep sights in low light conditions.

The most recent ideas center on recognition and providing a service.

The Blackwater Bowhunters reserve a spot on a bulletin board as a place for all members to list items they want to buy or sell. This is a great service to members that is easy to implement. You might need some rules about how long an item can be posted and someone will probably need to police the board occasionally to remove items that have been sold/bought, but the small amount of time invested should be worth the effort.

Augusta Archers has a board that recognizes the superior efforts of their members. In Augusta's case, the board recognizes each person who shoots a 300 round by recording the score and the number of X shots. A column down the left side of the board has the individuals name and columns across the top indicate the date/event (Yes, they have folks who shoot several 300s a year, but so do other clubs). This idea can be expanded to include recognizing people who participate in work parties, folks who win tournaments, etc. Your imagination is the only limit of ways to use a board to recognize accomplishments and contributions.




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

SURVIVOR CONCLUSION

(Editor's Note: Several issues ago Keith wrote a short piece about a hunter who was attacked by a bear and left severely injured. In subsequent issues, readers were encouraged to provide their versions of how the story ended. Some had the hunter making it out alive, others had him not so lucky. In this article, Keith closes the suspense by providing the final version. THANK YOU Keith for your support of *FLIGHT*.)

It's up to me, what do I do now? It would be easy to slip into the comforting darkness of unconsciousness. Just close my eyes and let it all go away. But I can't. Emily needs me, our child needs me. I have to fight— I must live. Sudden clarity brings my thoughts into focus.

Shock from my wounds could kill me. I need to move. To prove to my body that despite the blood loss, my mind hasn't given up. I have to move now!

Adrenaline helps my mind hold off the effects of shock, but it can do nothing for the thousands of Clostridia bacilli marching towards the exposed femoral artery. These flesh eating organisms cause gaseous gangrene. If they breach the artery before I reach help, it's game over.

With shaking hands, I open the first aid ointment and squirt the entire tube into my exposed leg wound. I grit my teeth and fold the ragged flesh back into place. Ointment oozes from the edges as the parachute cord binds it down. This will staunch the bleeding. They can worry about the advancing army of bacteria at the hospital if I make it.

Stuffing the rest of the items back into the pack, I sling one of the straps over my neck. Using my bow as a staff, I manage to get vertical. My head is swimming from the effort but I dare not stop. Both water bottle and hat are just a few yards away. I must have them. The bow makes a poor staff but is better than no staff at all. Balancing on my good leg I use the bow to snag my hat first, then the water bottle and rag. I'll leave the jacket, by the time I need it I'll already be dead.

Leaning against a tree I use the rag to clean the blood off of my face, and then put on my hat. One hand holds the scalp in place while the other works the knit fabric down bit by bit until it holds the scalp and slows the bleeding. I resist the inclination to drink the entire contents of my water bottle, instead allowing only a small sip. Too much at a time will only make me sick. A convenient tree branch makes a better staff than my bow so I drop it and hobble along, branch in hand, whistle in teeth. Each hop ending with a tweeting exhale. I can only maneuver downhill. To go uphill would require bending my injured leg. The hamstring is more than willing to bend the leg, but the torn quadricep is incapable of straightening it. Downhill is my only choice.

Tiny goals are set. That oak tree is first. The white rock is next. Each attained goal is small, but the cumulative effect is large. As I achieve each goal I'm allowed a few moments of rest. Just before moving again I blow the whistle hard three times. To my ears it sounds like a distress signal, to my mind the starting whistle.

An hour into this forced march and my ears are playing tricks on me. Diesel engines have a distinct sound and my ears think they have found one in this forest. Wait! No, I'm sure it's an engine. TWEET! TWEET! TWEET! TWEET! THE engine is getting louder. I blow the whistle with all my might. TWEEET! TWEEEET! TWEEEEEEEET!

The engine sound morphs into a green tractor. It's on a logging road just a few yards away, invisible till now.

Hey buddy, you all right?

Agenda Items

The following agenda item was voted on at the Jan. 2011 meeting:

ITEM: The Constitution, Art. 4, Sect. 1 as reads "Each Director shall be a direct representative of his/her club or group, and be entitled to one vote" should be changed to read "Each Director shall be a direct representative of his/her club or group, and club voting representation would be based on their club membership numbers. Each club would acquire votes based on their previous year membership as follows: 1-50 = 1 vote, 51-100 = 2 votes, 101-150 = 3 votes, 151-200 = 4 votes, 201-250 = 5 votes. EFFECTIVE: Immediately. RESULT: **Passed with required 2/3 majority**.

The following agenda items were voted on at the Mar. 2011 meeting:

ITEM: Change Senior Division to 65+, recognizing all styles, but no classes. Age groups needs to be added to "terms" under VBA Shooting Rules. EFFECTIVE: Jan. 2012. RESULT: **Failed**.

ITEM: Change the Traditional style for all age groups, except Peewee's, to shoot a maximum of 30 yards at any Field/Hunter/Animal rounds, using the Cub stakes. Peewee's will continue to shoot Peewee distances. EFFECTIVE: Immediately. RESULT: **Failed**.

ITEM: Move Senior Class to shoot from the same yardage as Youth for Field/Hunter/Animal rounds. EFFECTIVE: Immediately. RESULT: **Failed**.

ITEM: Constitution, Art. 4, Sect. 3, lines 8 and 9, delete the words "via the association's official publication, *FLIGHT*." EFFECTIVE: Immediately. RESULT: **Passed**.

ITEM: Bylaws, Art.10, Sect.3, Para. C., Add: The VBA Executive Committee has the authority to waive this requirement if they determine there are extenuating circumstances and such waiver would be in the best interests of the VBA. This waiver would be for a maximum of two years and while in a waiver status, the club could participate in all VBA activities, but could not vote at VBA meetings. EFFECTIVE: Immediately. RESULT: **Passed**.

The following agenda items will be voted on at the Jun. 2011 meeting:

ITEM: Bylaws, Art. 15, Sect. 1, Para. J, Sub paragraph 3, Add: At all VBA State Tournaments at which physical awards are presented, awards in the Adult, Senior and/or Master Senior divisions will be limited to the unit rule: one to three competitors, first place award; four to six competitors, first and second place awards; and seven or more competitors, first, second and third place awards. All place winners will be recognized and announced; however, physical awards will be presented according to the above unit rule. EFFECTIVE: Jan 2012. JUSTIFICATION: To reduce the number of awards for cost and logistics reasons. It is believed that most adult and senior competitors wish to be recognized for their participation and performance, but will accept the rationale that awards made in small competitive divisions should be limited. If this item is adopted, it is believed that more members will support shooting divisions favored by our active members, such as the Master Senior Division.

ITEM: Change state tournament results presented to *FLIGHT*, Field Vice President, Executive State Secretary/Treasurer, and Publicity Director from five days to two working days. EFFECTIVE: Jan.2012. JUSTIFICATION: When awards are presented at the state shoots, most of the hosts have results listed in computers.

ITEM: Change Constitution and Bylaws to allow Peewees to get awards in their own VBA shooting styles for all state shoots. EFFECTIVE: Immediately. JUSTIFICATION: Historically, VBA has presented awards/records for Peewees at all but Indoor state shoots. This will bring the VBA's Constitution/Bylaws in line with what has been happening.

ITEM: Traditional style for women to shoot a maximum of 30 yards, as Cubs shoot, in Field/Hunter/Animal classes. EFFECTIVE: Jan. 2012. JUSTIFICATION: Due to women's muscle strength on a recurve or long bow, there isn't any compensation as with a compound bow.

ITEM: Bylaws Art. 15, Sect. 2, Para. D page 8: Add at end," for Indoor, Field, Hunter, and paper animals." EFFECTIVE: Immediately. JUSTIFICATION: Clarification allows the clubs flexibility with 3-D.

ITEM: Establish a 65 and older Master Seniors Class with no breakdown on classes, but a breakdown on styles. EFFECTIVE: Jan. 2012. JUSTIFICATION: The number of archers entering the Senior Class has increased over the past several years and archers 65+ are having trouble effectively competing and in some cases are leaving archery. By establishing the Master Seniors Class, they can look forward to peer competition that is really competitive and we may retain them as motivated archers.




