Hopefully, by addressing this person's comments and concerns, it may also help any other member having similar questions or concerns. I'm not sure if this person attends any of his club meetings, but if he did, some of his issues could have already been addressed.

The quarterly publishing of the FLIGHT magazine is required by our by-laws. At one time it was published bi-monthly, and the membership decided to make it a quarterly magazine. Yes, the FLIGHT could be published fewer times per year if the membership chose to do so. A club would have to bring that request to a quarterly meeting as an agenda item, and it would require a majority vote by the rest of the VBA clubs to amend that part of the by-laws.

With the inception of the Spring & Fall 3D Classics, it was decided by the membership to leave these shoots open to non-VBA shooters to promote more competition and to expose more shooters to the VBA for future growth of the association. And yes, these shoots could be changed to allow only VBA members to compete if voting clubs chose to do so.

Your issue about what the VBA does for the bowhunter is listed on page 22 in this issue, and it doesn't stop there. Every year the VBA sends representation to most of the VDGIF meetings that are open to the public just to make sure nothing falls through the cracks that might affect our bow season. In fact, the VBA will have representation at the March 27 and June 5 meetings even though there are no items pertaining to bowhunting on the agenda. So, in short, the VBA is alive and well in protecting your bowhunting privileges.

I'm not aware of any other target or bowhunting group in Virginia that is "on the front lines fighting for YOUR bowhunting rights!"

Finally, if the FLIGHT is truly a waste of your reading time, I would suggest that you contact Marie Bell and have your name removed from the mailing list. You can do your part in helping the VBA save money for printing and mailing costs. Thanks for your comments.

Can we really blame the ground hog this year for dumping more than four inches of snow in parts of northern Virginia and causing the State Indoors to be cancelled on the second day? After all was said and done, 124 archers had fun and made it home safely. Coming up will be the State 3-D Spring Classic (marked), hosted by Manahoac Bowmen, on April 21st & April 22nd and the State Open Championship, hosted by Sherwood Archers, on May 26th & 27th. VBA Twelfth Annual Awards Banquet. Although this year's awards banquet had a smaller attendance than in the past, we enjoyed the camaraderie, telling bowhunting stories, and the delicious meal. We kicked the banquet off with a very nice presentation by E. W. Grimes, President of the Maryland Quality Deer Management Association, who discussed how to manage and maintain deer growth and population.

After the presentation, Kevin Reedy thanked the Belvoir Bowhunters, Bowhunters of Rockingham, Staunton River Archers and Sherwood Archers for their raffle donations and for those who submitted their silent bids for the prints and hunt of their choice.

Dave Burpee presented the Order of the Golden Feather to Vic Matthews from BBH. Dave has graciously volunteered to assume the OGF duties which Clinton Western has had since 1974.

Cay McManus presented Double Crown awards to Karin Eppard, AFFS/R, Cay McManus, AFTRAD, David Dobbins, AMBHFS/F, Mathew Dobbins, YAMBHFS/F and Matthew Turney, CBHFS/R. The Triple Crown winners were Lucas Kenley, CMFS/R, Cay McManus, AFBB, David Dobbins, SMBHFS/F and Matthew Dobbins, YAMBHFS/F.

Back to Kevin as he presented the Big Game award to Ricky Simmons for the largest gar at 17 lbs., a turkey at 17 lbs., the largest doe at 147 lbs., and a buck at 192 lbs. The largest bear award went to Wesley Goff. The largest deer by rack was taken by Randy Armentrout at 156 3/8, followed by Terry Dorman at 151 1/8 and then Steve Morgan at 137.11.

Double Slam winners were Wesley Goff for whitetail deer and bear and Ricky Simmons for whitetail deer and turkey.

In acknowledging clubs with the greatest increase in membership, we decided to break it down into two divisions. In the clubs with 100 or fewer members, New River Bowhunters had 26% increase, Pr. William Archers had 45.6% increase, Massanutten Archers had 52.4% increase, and Buggs Island Archers had 73.3% increase. In clubs with 100 or more members, Bowhunters of Rockingham had 15.9% increase, and Sherwood Archers had 16.4% increase.

The Bill Bennett awards went to Steve Morgan, Greg Shifflett, Ricky Simmons, Peter Acker, Randy Armentrout, Ethan Armentrout, Everette Cline, Jr., Terry Lee Dorman, Robert W. Yager, Jr., Wesley T. Four beautiful prints were presented to the silent auction winners, and the PSE bow went to Paul Vogel. Lastly, was the 'Big Game' turkey hunt, which went to Bob Seltzer.

On a Few More Topics. The U.S. Sportsmen Alliance requested the participation of the VBA in their youth event, Trailblazer, on April 28th in the Radford Area and on June 9th in Haymarket. The 2007 Va. General Assembly Legislation has decided to take <u>no action at this time</u> regarding 'Hunting on Sundays.'

Preliminary reports show that hunters experienced another successful hunting season in 2006-2007. The bear harvest numbers continue to move upwards as the bear population continues to grow. The deer harvest was 223,198, higher than the 10 year average but not as high as the record of 235,944 set in 2003-2004. The fall turkey harvest was down due to a number of factors. The extended deer season in certain Northern Virginia counties was successful. Extensive testing has revealed no CWD in Virginia white-tail deer population. The Hunters for the Hungry reported that they donated 356,054 pounds of venison in 2006 from the generous hunters of Virginia, which exceeded last year's record-breaking total by 16,000 pounds.

Why Do You Hunt?

If you are rurally deprived like me, you live in suburbia, commute to a city, and work in an office full of people who have never eaten game or handled a firearm, much less a bow. As fall comes around and I block out four days off, word gets around that I am going hunting. Usually, this raises some curiosity if not suspicion around the office.

If my colleagues are omnivores, I can convincingly walk them through some of the nasty practices of mass farming, the need to control deer populations, and the benefits of providing meat for the family table. My inquisitors might walk away satisfied. That's too bad. Because that barely covers why I hunt. If somebody really wanted to know, I would have to say: ``If you have three minutes, I'll tell you why." And this is what I would say.

My dad died when I was 11. My family moved to El Paso, Texas. We lived in a rural area known as Ysleta within easy reach of cotton fields and the Southern Pacific train tracks which I could follow on my Honda 50 motorcycle out into the desert. The desert enthralled me. The paradox of life thriving in mesquite, sand and heat held secrets I was anxious to learn. Soon, I would have my very own guide.

One Apache, Three Lessons

My cousin at the time dated a guy named Mike Bogdan, who was a rifle hunter. He was also part Mescalero Apache. Mike had been bitten by a diamondback rattler one night in the desert. He bled his leg out and bore the fever on is own, too deep into the wild to venture driving back. At the time, I secretly admired this right of initiation. He also introduced me to a few basic concepts of hunting with a rifle and pistol during our day and night forays into the desert.

The first lesson was this: As you step into the wild, be quiet. Listen. See. Nature is speaking to you in full volume. The second lesson was that the taking of life for food had to be done with the greatest reverence. And the third lesson: A bow, rifle or fishing rod was a bridge to nature, and helped define man's place in it.

That last statement would surely raise some eyebrows, if not some anger back in the office. It contains some sharp-edged ideas about the difference between humans and animals. I would briefly try to explain that folks who try to control the deer population with birth control, or try to make pets out of wild creatures are trying to recreate nature on their terms. They fail to appreciate wild things for what they are. That attitude is a stumbling block for reasonable discussion. So, I would get back to my story.

Treasure in a Jeep

We moved back to California when I was 13 and my mom remarried. I gained an older step-brother named Henry, who took me on a giant step into the world of hunting and hunters.

With Henry, I learned the fourth, and maybe best, lesson of all. It came with time, and I had a lot of fun on the way. There were certain things I could always find in the cab of Henry's Jeeps or trucks: live ammunition and live bird dogs; some kind of tail-feather, hide or antler; and maybe cold beer. It was a treasure chest!

My first trips with Henry were duck hunts in California's Great Central Valley in blinds owned by his friend Billy Walker. The first time I turned a bird in flight with a call, I gasped with incredulity. I knew, maybe just at that moment, I would hunt the rest of my life.

After the hunts, Henry and Bill would stop in at a bar named Dutch Miller's. ``I'll bring you a sandwich," Bill would say to me as he and Henry walked away from the car. ``That's what my dad told me when I was your age, and now it s my turn to tell you."

Later, I began to understand what this was all about.

The Fourth Lesson

I began to learn that Henry had to do a fair amount of pleading with his hunting buddies to let me tag along. Among these men, who were some of the most seasoned and experienced hunters I have ever met, I had to earn my place. As a clumsy, 13-year-old boy that wasn't easily won nor was it easily given. This was the fourth lesson: Hunting forms unique bonds among people who share experiences in the field. It is built on deep trust with someone who can read your thoughts, instincts, and general moods, and fit between them like a key in a door lock. These friendships aren't easily intruded upon by newcomers or new brothers in this case.

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Within a year or two of eating sandwiches in the car, I had finally killed my first beautiful mallards. I remember thinking their feathers were so beautiful that it was a shame to pluck them. I earned my entry to Dutch Miller's where I could sit elbow-to-elbow with hunters and listen to their stories. The ceiling was covered - every smoke-stained inch of it - in deer antlers.

I was around for the early part of my brother's hunting adventures. While my career took me away to Mexico and South America for nearly a decade, he would go on to build a trophy room of elk, mule deer, blacktail, and boar. I missed all of that, and, to this day, I am not sure if trading a life of hunting adventure with my brother for a career was the right decision.

Passing on the Gift

When I moved back to the U.S. in 2000, I slowly picked up hunting again. It was Henry who told me in a phone call one day to pick up the bow.

Henry fell off a crane two years ago and suffered spinal injuries that now impair movement in his hands and legs. I had hoped Henry would teach my sons how to hunt. Near our home in California, there is a piece of land he leases where cougar, blacktail, and boar run through hills covered in live oak, bay, and oat grass. I want to visit those hills with my sons and Henry when we go back home this summer. Passing on this gift I received from Henry, and from hunters like Mike the Apache and Billy Walker has taken on a little more weight.

So, if you were to ask me why I hunt, I would have to say this: I hunt because the mastery of wild things amazes me. I hunt because I enjoy being in a natural order that never lies about what it is. I hunt because the bonds I form with people in the field are among the strongest friendships I have. I hunt because I have three sons who may not get to sit in a duck blind with their Uncle Hank, and as he gave to me I must give to them. I hunt because it is the most dignified way to eat.

This September, my 7-year-old son Sebastian and I did some scouting in the Virginia woods. We stepped off the hard-pack road, dipping into the shadowy tree canopy. We descended to the bottom of a ravine where we studied a wash for tracks.

Squatting, Sebastian looked at me, and I looked at him, as we both saw the script of fox feet in the sand.

Quiet.

Listen.

See.

Nature speaking in full volume.



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The VDGIF Public Comment Process

The Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries (VDGIF) has a new process to seek public comment on changes to department regulations. VBA members who want to participate in the process need to monitor the VDGIF website at www.dgif.virginia.gov.

The key change is that there will no longer be regional meetings throughout the state to solicit comment. These meetings cost the VDGIF a lot of manpower and money to plan/execute, and their reward for an expensive process was VERY MINIMAL participation by hunters and the general public. So, in effect, apathy by hunters has caused the new system.

This year, the process began with the VDGIF staff studying issues and drafting preliminary recommendations during the January – March period. They presented their draft results at the DGIF Board meeting in Richmond on March 27. Members of the public attended and added issues that should receive attention.

These draft issues will be open for public discussion from April 10 to June 15. During this period, the public can suggest other topics for consideration. The staff will then present final recommended changes to the Board on July 17.

The final proposed changes will be open for public comment from July 24 to September 24. The staff will then present the final items to the Board on October 16 and the Board will approve or disapprove the recommendations. If approved, changes will be effective in 2008 on January 1, March 1, or July 1 depending on the season being impacted.

The public will be able to comment on-line at the VDGIF website, via e-mail, via letter, via attending a Board meeting or by inviting a Board or staff member to attend a group meeting.

Some of the topics that are under consideration are authorizing electronic ignitions for in-line black powder firearms, reintroduction of elk into Buckingham County, extending the rabbit season, revising the fall turkey hunting dates, allowing the use of leashed dogs to track deer, and closing the squirrel season on wildlife management areas during archery seasons.

This is just a sample of items that may eventually be posted to the VDGIF website. The VBA Hunting Committee will stay engaged and keep you informed, but the committee recommends that members also watch the site for developments of interest to particular clubs or to individuals.









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WHAT HAS THE VIRGINIA BOWHUNTERS ASSOCIATION DONE FOR THE BOWHUNTER IN VIRGINIA?

Listed below is a sampling of hunting related projects the Virginia Bowhunters Association, working with the Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries, has accomplished for the bowhunters in Virginia.

- 1. 1949 North River area (16 square miles) in Rockingham County was the first area opened to bowhunting in Virginia.
- 2. 1953 "Big Levels" in Augusta County open to bowhunting.
- 3. 1956 Opening of a state-wide bowhunting season.
- 4. 1985 Separate archery license for the bowhunters, allowing two additional deer to be harvested.
- 1994 Additional week of bow season. Opening date of archery season moved from the second Saturday in October to the first Saturday in October.
- 6. 1994 Legal to harvest turkey with a bow during the early archery season.
- 7. 2003 Legal to harvest a black bear during the early archery season statewide.
- 8. 2005 Opposed VDGIF wanting to legalize the use of crossbows in the regular archery season. (The VBA lost their fight against the crossbow, and in October, 2005, Virginia had its first state-wide crossbow season during the regular archery season).

The VBA has not only worked to acquire new and additional hunting privileges for the Virginia bowhunter, but also continues to work at keeping the privileges we already have.


