

#### AGENDA ITEMS VOTED ON AT JUNE MEETING:

(7) VBA ROUNDS, INDOOR SHOOTING RULES, Pg. 6, Add #20: Sectional Indoor to be a 2 day shoot. Competitors have option of shooting 1 or 2 times, highest round to count for score. Count last 6 ends inside out x's. Effective immediately. **PASSED 20 - 8** 

By-laws, Section 1, State Tournaments, Pg. 6, Para. B: Effective 2014-2016, trial on shooting where archers have options of shooting 1 or 2 times and counting highest score at the Spring 3-D. **Passed 8-1 by a show of hands**. Justification: To see if a 1 day option will increase participation. After 3 years, a by-law change can be made if it helps.

#### AGENDA ITEM FOR SEPTEMBER MEETING:

(1) By-laws, State Championship Awards, Sect. J, Pg. 8: Remove paragraph #3, eliminating the unit rule. Effective, Jan. 2014. Justification: Participants should not be penalized for lack of shooters.

#### From the NBEF/IBEP Director

I'm a Baby Boomer. Like many others who also fit that description, it means that I'm now one of the elder statesperson in our sport. While I don't mind that so much, it does mean that I can no longer take for granted that I will continue being healthy enough to bow hunt without any effort on my part.

I served for over 20 years in the Military, so staying fit was a way of life. As a result, being physically fit never crossed my mind when I started preparations for the upcoming season – I just knew I would be. Now I've come to the realization that I can no longer take that cavalier approach. This year I underwent orthoscopic surgery to address a torn meniscus in both knees. Notice I didn't say "repair" because at my age, there is no repairing the tears. They simply clip off the tear, smooth it out and hope for the best. While my outcomes were OK, I won't be running any marathons – or climbing straight up mountains chasing goats or bighorns. More important, I realize that I now have to work at getting physically fit to be able to enjoy it and hunt like I want to. In my case, since high impact exercises like running are out, I regularly walk, and find that works great for me.

The point I want to make it this. Bowhunting is a strenuous sport. If you have also reached the elder statesperson category, or if you are younger but out of shape, you need to address it now in order to be ready for the upcoming season. First and foremost, get your annual physical exam from your primary care provider. Talk frankly with your provider about your physical limitations, medications and your fitness goals, to work out an exercise program that is tailored to you. If you aren't a self-starter, find a partne. (Hint – as a general rule, wives take better care of themselves than we do. They are willing fitness partners, and will be delighted to join you). Finally, if you need to start a new medication to address an issue, now is the time, so you and your provider have your condition under control before the season starts.

During the season, make sure anyone you hunt with knows about any medical conditions you have that and medications you are taking. Things have a way of popping up unexpectedly, and you don't want to surprise your guide when you have a diabetic episode (like hypoglycemia) half way up a mountain chasing elk. You not only put your life at risk, but also any rescuers who respond to offer assistance. If you carry emergency medications, make sure your guide or hunting partners know where they are and how and when to administer them to you.

As we've said before, you owe it to your family, friends and loved ones to come home safe every time you hunt. Being physically fit is a key part of making sure that happens, and something stressed in every IBEP class. Be Safe!!

The shooter has the option of shooting one or both days, counting only one score. The delegates also decided to try this on the Spring 3-D to see if it increases participation. This was passed as a three year trial.

Our next proposal will be changing from the current VBA 3-D shooting rules to rules that align more with IBO shooting rules for the VBA State 3-D shoots. The delegates are considering a two-year trial to see how well it is received by the shooters. There will be discussions at the September VBA meeting so all members should let their VBA representative know their thoughts on this matter. This change is proposed for the 2014 shooting season.

These changes would be at the state level but is our hope that the clubs will follow suit. Your feedback is requested.

1 32 oz can kidney beans


2 TBSP vinegar

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## Whitetail

#### Summer = Seaso

ith the start of summer, the whitetail's world has again undergone a dramatic change: the fawns have arrived. All of the chaos of the breeding season, or rut, 200 days prior has now resulted in the arrival of the next generation of deer. In Virginia, this happens in late May and early June and translates to the arrival of probably a half-million new, spotted wildlife residents in less than one month's time.

Does which separated from their family groups to set up and defend a fawning territory have now given birth. In healthy deer populations, most adult does give birth to twin fawns. Not surprisingly, older does with higher social status and more experience tend to make better, or more successful, mothers.

Fawns are generally born head and feet first and are able to stand and nurse within about 30 minutes of birth. Twin fawns are normally born 10 to 20 minutes apart. After the fawns are born, the doe will lick them

clean and groom them and eat the afterbirth to reduce odors, thus minimizing the chance that predators will find them. These first hours of seclusion are critical because they allow the doe and fawn(s) to imprint each other, forming a critical bond where the doe will be able to identify her young in the future

Young white-tailed deer fawns are hiders. This means the doe leaves them lying in the woods and fields alone nearly all the time for the first couple of weeks to month of life. The doe does not abandon them. She moves off far enough that her presence does not draw attention to the fawns, but remains close enough that she can come to their defense if necessary. Picking up a young fawn will normally cause it to make a piercing cry or bawl, which will bring the doe running. It is often during this time of year that protective does attack dogs, or sometimes even people, defending very young, hidden fawns.

During these critical first weeks, the doe will approach the area where the fawn is hiding two to four times each day, mostly during daylight hours. With a soft grunt she will call the fawn to her, allowing it to nurse for 5–10 minutes. While it is nursing, she will lick and groom it. Then she will typically move the fawn a short distance and leave quickly. When she leaves, the fawn will automatically lie down again to resume hiding.

Healthy fawns generally weigh about six to eight pounds at birth, and they grow quickly. During a typical nursing session a fawn will consume about eight ounces of milk, which is richer than cow's milk, and will usually gain about a half-pound per day, tripling its birth weight in the first month of life

Although ruminants by nature, a fawn has a digestive system folded in such a way early on to allow the milk to bypass the rumen and reticulum. By two to three weeks of age, fawns begin to eat vegetation. Although fawns can be seen nursing into fall, by 12 weeks of age they are functionally weaned and full-time ruminants.

The spotted coat of a hiding white-tailed deer fawn is one of the most well-known physical characteristics. White spots on a chestnut brown background act as nature's

camouflage, hiding the fawn by mimicking dappled light coming through the forest canopy. Yes, someone has counted the spots. On average, a fawn has between 270 and 350 of them, with two fairly straight lines down either side of its back and the rest scattered randomly over its sides. This camouflage works so well it is very difficult to see and find fawns in the woods.

For the first five to ten days of life, young fawns will lie completely still and not even attempt to escape when approached by a predator or a person. Because of this behavior, very young hiding fawns are highly vulnerable to predators such as black bears and coyotes. Many fawns do not survive. At least ten percent are generally lost to natural causes, and fawn predation rates of 20–30 percent, up to 75 percent or more, have been documented across the Southeast recently. Not surprisingly, most predation losses occur during the first week to ten days of life.

Many times in suburban environments, young fawns will be found hiding in homeowners' yards or mulch beds, or even on porches or in carports. Because the fawns ap-

pear to be alone, well-meaning people pick them up, thinking they have been abandoned. They have not. Young fawns should *not* be picked up in late May and early June. Truly orphaned fawns, injured fawns, or fawns mistakenly picked up as orphans should be returned immediately to the area where found. If that is not possible, they must be taken to a licensed wildlife rehabilitator. It is illegal in Virginia to keep deer as pets.

By ten days to two weeks, although they still spend most of their time bedded and hiding, young fawns have changed from helpless hiders into exceptional escape artists, easily outrunning a person and most predators. As fawns age they become more active and spend increasingly longer periods with their mother, playing and frolicking about. By one month, sibling fawns that were kept separated since birth are reunited. These play sessions are important to building strength and agility for escaping predators. Most activity by young fawns takes place during the day. This is thought to be an adaptation to avoid nocturnal predators like coyotes and bears. The first two months, most of their time is spent alone with their mother and siblings; however, by three months of age they will quit their solitary lifestyle and reunite with their mother's doe family group and other fawns. By fall, the fawns spend all of their time accompanying the doe.

While family life occupies the does during summer, adult males literally lie around and do nothing except grow antlers. Bucks remain in loose bachelor groups, with size and membership routinely changing until the rut begins in September.

Antler growth in male deer is the fastest normal tissue growth known among mammals; most is accomplished in less than 100 days during May, June, and July. Growing antlers are sensitive, tender, and soft. Bucks go out of their way to avoid injuring them, as injuries frequently result in malformed antlers.

By August 1, shortening days mean the annual life cycle of the deer is beginning to turn again, back to fall and back to deer life in the rut.










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
