e experience gained in the last two years invaluable and I hope that it will be useful to VBA in the future.

Not all of our goals were accomplished. Our membership is not up to expectation; our club growth is almost stagnant. There are several opinions on this, such as the new dues for NFAA and VBA, handicap, etc. No problems have come up where some intelligent solution cannot be found.

With respect to the handicap system, it needs trial, patience, and adjustment to be fully utilized. Until we go through our childhood and move into adulthood concerning this problem, we will experience some confusion. The perplexing remarks that some archers give are really disturbing because they do not yet understand the intent of equalizing the grouping at tournaments. Possibly we need to cut our spread numerically to approximately 30 points per flight, and we must change our old class philosophies. It seems to work in bowling, golf, etc., so let's have a little patience and compassion until your officers have weighed all the facts.

I want to take this opportunity to thank each officer that served the VBA in the last o years. They are all a dedicated, concientious, and loyal staff; also, the many committees that functioned effectively deserve the praise of all VBA members. When you realize that these people spend hours of their time to help us all, the job of saying thanks adequately is really hard to do. The dues raise this year was a piece of legislation not envied by the executive board, but necessary if we are to grow and become a strong unity in archery in the state and National. Most archers realize this and accept the inevitable.

The VBA received two awards for membership growth at National this year. For this I am personally very proud. The individuals responsible have my sincere thanks.

I will not be at the Mid-Atlantic in Richmond because of a conflicting appointment in Las Vegas. I had hoped to make both, but circumstances will not permit. However, with the new officers to be installed and every available member at the tournament, you should have a fine meeting and a most enjoyable tournament. Thank you for your support.

N.F.A.A. CHAMPIONSHIP TOURNAMENT SLATED FOR WATKINS GLEN, NEW YORK

July 28th through August 1 are the dates to keep in mind if you wish to attend the 24th annual N.F.A.A. Championship Tournament. This year the week-long event is to be held at the ever popular Sugar Hill, a recreational area located at the bottom of Lake Seneca near the town of Watkins Glen N.F.A.A. Officials are already hard at work making preparations for this to be one of the finest tournaments in the long chain of NFAA Championship shoots. Pat Wingfield, President of the N.F.A.A. has appointed William E. (Bill) Boyle to coordinate the event as tournament chairman. Archers are familiar with tournaments conducted by Boyle in the past and can expect a wonderful time in the State of New York this year.

The N.F.A.A. Tournament Committee has selected the various breakdowns of competition which will be part of this 1969 event There will be 20 basic divisions; Men and Women Bare Bow in both open and amateur, Men and Women Freestyle in both open and amateur, Men and Women Bow Hunter in both open and amateur, Young Adult Division for both Boys and Girls in Bare Bow and Freestyle. Classes have been selected for each of these divisions except for the Young Adult. In all senior divisions, there will be breakdowns of classes from A through D. The Youth Division will have classes from A through C. Classes will be determined by the archer's handicap at the time of check-in at the tournament. Here is a rundown of the classes.

Men Bare Bow (open and amateur)

- Class A -- Handicaps of 0 through 128
- Class B -- Handicaps of 129 through 208
- Class C -- Handicaps of 209 through 288 Class D -- Handicaps of 289 and up

Women Bare Bow (open and amateur)

- Class A -- Handicaps of 0 through 188
 - Class B -- Handicaps of 189 through 248
- Class C -- Handicaps of 249 through 348
- Class D -- Handicaps of 349 and up

Men Freestyle (open and amateur)

Class A -- Handicaps of 0 through 88

- Class B -- Handicaps of 89 through 149
- Class C -- Handicaps of 150 through 208

Class D -- Handicaps of 209 and up

Women Freestyle (open and amateur)

Classes A through D the same as women Bare Bow.

Bow Hunter (men & women, open & amateur) Classes A through D the same as women Bare Bow.

Young Adult Boys and Girls with two scores over 450 (one class for each).

Youth Boys and Girls both bare bow and freestyle(4 divisions of the following classes)

Class A -- Handicaps of 0 through 168 Class B -- Handicaps of 169 through 288

Class C -- Handicaps of 289 and up

It is easy to see, there will be enough room for everyone at this year's tournament. Competition in the various classes should be quite similar to those of the past.

Even though you will be shooting in a respective class, handicaps will only be used to place you in a class. The N.F.A.A. Champions in various divisions will be determined by their raw or scratch score in tournament competition.

For the enthusiastic archer, here is the information on shooting and registration fees. Adult men and women may partake in the week-long event for \$13.00. This included the registration fee and the target fees. If there are more than four in a family, NFAA has established a family target fee of \$30.00

rather than \$10.00 for Adults and Young Adult divisions. For the youth, the fee is \$8,50 which includes the \$1.50 registration fee and the \$7.00 target fee.

You may obtain application blanks for the tournament through two sources this year. You may write to NFAA Headquarters and request one; or, you may conveniently contact your club secretary for blanks. NFAA Headquarters will make a direct mailing to alt NFAA Club Secretaries and all pertinent information on the tournament will be in this packet. In addition to putting the applications in the hands of all club secretaries, NFAA will also make a mailing to archery dealers as we have done in the past. So, if you find it hard to locate your club secretary applications will also be available through your favorite archery dealer. Pre-registration? You bet. It will close on June 30th. All pre-registrations must be postmarked on or before that date to be gible for the pre-registration fee of \$3.0 adults and young adults, and \$1.50 for-Youth. In the event you cannot attend the tournament, only your registration gee will be lost but your target fees will be returned. Save the \$5.00 late registration fee by signing up early.

Watkins Glen and the finger lakes area make a mighty fine vacation spot, and all the conveniences of home will be yours at Sugar Hill. Excellent camp sites have been established since the former tournament in 1965, and the New York State Conservation Department is continuing to improve the facilities at Sugar Hill-

Better start seriously thinking of planning your vacation to take in the 24th NFAA Championship Tournament at Watkins Glen, New York.

BOAT ACCIDENT RATE DROPS

Virginia's boating accident rate declined in 1968 in spite of a record 66,941 boats registered in the state during the year, reports Game Commission Safety Officer J. N. Kerrick. The record shows that boating accidents reached a peak in Virginia during 1962, from which they have steadily declined. Fatalities have also generally been on the decline in recent years as has property damage from boating accidents. During 1968 there were 58 reported accidents resulting in 29 fatalities, 21 injuries and \$67,400 in property damage. In 1962 there were 118 accidents sulting in 27 fatalities, 33 injuries and \$2. 000 in property damage. The record number of fatalities occured in 1965 when 55 persons lost their lives in boating mishaps within the state. The number of registered boats in Virginia has nearly doubled since 1960.

The 1969 Mid-Atlantic Regional Championship Tournament will be shot in Richmond, Virginia, June 21 & 22. The range is located 7½ miles west of Richmond city limits on

The 1969 Mid-Atlantic Regional Championship Tournament will be shot in Richmond, Virginia, June 21 & 22. The range is located 7½ miles west of Richmond city limits on U.S. 60. Half of a National Round will be shot. Shooting begins at 9:00 sharp, Saturday morning, June 21 with the first round being the hunter round (black face), 28 targets. Afternoon round will be the field round, 28 targets. The animal round will be shot on Sunday. (Practice butts will be closed at 8:15 both mornings.) Mid-Atlantic PAA members will shoot a PAA round coincidentally with field archers' rounds. Their tournament will be held on a separate range and competing for separate awards as set forth by the Mid-Atlantic Association.

Competition for field archers shall be class competition, based on handicap, as set forth in the "NFAA Handicap System Booklet," page 8; that is to say, you will be placed in a class, depending on your handicap and shoot strictly scratch, total aggregate determining winners. Awards will be three places in all classes.

AGCOMODATIONS AND FACILITIES

Our facilities include 20 practice butts, staked for all distances, (field ranges will naturally be closed prior to shoot).

Hot plate lunches, sandwiches and drinks are available. Ample camping facilities are located within a few hundred yards of the ranges. Camping fees will total \$2 per unit, some sites have electricity. Come early for the best spot since places will be allocated on a first-come-first-served basis, no reservations. Best sites are located around a large picnic pavillion with indoor toilets and border on a fishing lake. Motels are available nearby for non-campers.
