QUARLES SHOT BACK TO BACK PERFECT ROUNDS AT STATE

Warwick Bowmen Sponsor Great Shoot

"I've never had so much fun in my life." "Boy, this is an easy shoot." "Well organized." "Smooth shoot." "Great ranges." "Good barbeque." These were just some of the praises given. It was the observation of many that this was the smoothest shoot they had ever attended.

In spite of the low turn-out (150 plus)of participants, the Warwick Bowmen kept up their enthusiasm. Warwick President Bill Marshall and members were well organized and had everything running smoothly which included registration, starting the rounds on time, the Saturday night party (Yeah!), the Sunday night barbecue, and giving out of the awards.

Some felt that the reason for the low attendance was the shoot being three days instead of two, too much expense involved,

o much time, etc. However, it was inted out that shooting over three days was the very reason participants were more unhurried and relaxed both on and off the ranges.

The camping was superb. Some of us motel dwellers got by on \$6.00 a night. The barbecue was free, so you didn't have to spend a bundle. Jim Quarles shot back to back perfect scores on the Field and Hunter rounds in the Virginia State Field Tournament held on the Warwick Bowmen range at Newport News City Park on Sept. 4, 5, and 6. This has never been done before in the history of organized Archery. The other champions, winners, and scores are listed on pages 3,4 & 5.

At the last V.B.A. meeting (Sept. 25) Warwick Bowmen exercised their option and requested to host again next year's State Shoot. The delegates voted to extend the 3-Day-Shoot trial another year also.

Telephone Interview With Champion Quarles

Q. Back to back '60's has never been done, Jim. What did you do to prepare yourself for the State Tournament?

A. Well, of course I did a lot of shooting through the end of July. But then my work load at my regular job, I'm an engineer for Best Products, got heavy, so the only shooting I did was in tournaments. One problem I was having was that when I shot three arrows good, the fourth would fly high right. It seemed for a period of time I could not get it corrected. Finally, I discovered that I simply was not getting the string lined up with the middle of my nose. Using under-the-chin anchor, this is extremely important for the way I shoot. I had been shooting a lot of '50's and everything fell into place.

Q. To what do you attribute your success?

A. To sum it up in one word, it would have to be dedication." To take it a little further, besides form, I think the main thing is to get your equipment per-



fectly matched and, more important, perfectly tuned. Of course I used to shoot right-handed, and it seemed that I could only get so far or so high in score. So I got to talking to Jerome Keyes* and he talked me into switching to my left hand. After I switched, I found out my left eye was my master eye, and I'm sure that had a lot to do with my better scores. Besides that, I've read everything about archery in the way of getting equipment tuned, getting mentally ready. I've worked . hard at it and done a lot of experimenting. Eve also had a lot of help from my competitors Paul Haydel and Jim Shively.

Q. What kind of form do you advocate? Is form as important as some say?

A. Very important! Particularly when you are in the act of drawing an arrow. It's sort of like . Power . Archery" -pushing the bow and pulling at the arrow at the same time. The most important thing is proper back tension and to explain that is easier said than done. When I'm at full draw and have proper back tension, it's just like having a muscle in the middle of my back give the signal and that message runs from that point right through my shoulder around my elbow to my release hand and releases the arrow. I really don't know at what split second it will go off. It's sort of like squeezing off a round when shooting a rifle.

Q. What kind of equipment do you use, Jim?

A. I use a Bear Custom Tournament Take-Down bow at 36 lbs. with a Chekit sight and omni-stabilizer, Easton X-7 1914 arrows with heavy points and Flex Fletch vanes.

Q. Do you do anything special in the way of physical conditioning?

A. NO! just practice. I have a tennis elbow in my bow arm, so I'm careful about that.

Q: Did you feel any pressure, particularly on the 2nd round (Hunter) -- say, on the last 3 or 4 targets?

A. No, not on the Hunter round. For a signt shooter, it's a lot easier to lock on that white dot. I really didn't feel that much pressure on the Field round either. However, I'll admit I took some extra care on the last targets.

Q: Tell us about the arrow that you dropped on the Animal round. What animal was it?

A. I hate to tell you, but it was on the 59 yd. moose. Again, I have to have something or some spot to lock onto. On the animals it's hard to find a spot. My sight runs all over the place. My type of

sight has a peep hole and when I'm at full draw, I can't always see the kill zone. And, as I said before, I'm not conscious when the shot goes off. Plus I added a 1/2 yard because of the way the target was placed. So I shot high right over his back. That error cost me 6 points.

Q. This miss, did it disturb you?

A. Not really I laughed it off. I'll tell you this. My next door neighbor didn't shoot that arrow. You didn't shoot it. Nobody shot it but me. And once that arrow is gone, there's no bringing it back. So you have to be careful with the next one.

Q. Needless to say, Jim, V.B.A. is proud to have as one of their members the first archer to shoot perfect rounds. What is your personal feeling?

A. Let me answer it this way. Paul Haydel and Jim Shively and I are always getting after each other. Particularly when one of us wins a major tournament, we ask each other if he has a big head and just generally kid each other. If they call me this time, I'll have to admit my head is about three times normal size.

The Ranger Speaks

The use of trail bikes, all terrain vehicles, and 4 wheel drive vehicles on National Forests is becoming a problem that we can no longer ignore. I have seen several areas in the last week where these vehicles have caused serious erosion potential. Hunting season will cause these vehicles to be used even more on National Forests. Let me try to make our policy on the use of vehicles in the National Forests clear.

•The National Forests are public lands and are open to the public for your use -provided that laws and regulations are obeyed. The state motor vehicle laws say that all motor vehicles that are operated on public lands must be licensed and the operator must have a license showing he is capable of driving the vehicle. Forest officers can and will enforce this law. This means that children can not operate motor vehicles without a license. It also means that vehicles that can not be licensed will not be allowed to be operate on public lands.

Roads and trails are not closed to motor vehicles are open to the public to use. On the other hand, those roads and trails that are closed; and these are signed, gated or both; are absolutely closed to motor vehicles. Your are welcome to use the area of National Forest behind these signs or gates, but you must do it on foot or horseback. You may not make new roads or trails across National Forests where none now exist without a permit. Motor vehicles operators will be charged with violations if they are found off an authorized road or trail.

We like to encourage the use of your National Forests. However, I don't have the time, money or inclination to repair the damage caused by anyone who wants to test the limits of his vehicles performance. The National Forests are not test tracks and our mountains are not going to be used for motorcycle hill climbs.

There are many miles of roads and trails on the National Forests that are available to use any licensed motor vehicle. You are welcome to walk to all of the National Forest. Use your National Forest, but do not abuse them.

N.F.A.A. BOWS OUT

N.F.A.A. voted to withdraw from the AAC. In the opinion of many, V.B.A's hard working delegate, Ralph Stevens, was responsible for this action. Following is Ralph's letter that was printed in the N.F.A.A: Newsletter and was endorsed by many states. Ralph read his letter at the Va. State Open and received a standing ovation, and only because of a mis-understanding on the part of your editor, the letter was not printed in the May-June issue of Flight.

June 28, 1971

Mr. Wingfield:

As NFAA. Director of the Virginia Bowhunters Association I have been diected, by unanimous vote of the Board of Directors of VBA, to notify. NFAA Headquarters that Virginia will not accept the AAC rules as presented if and when they are so directed.

Virginia also seconds the motion by Board of Director, John Slack, California, as per Newsletter #45, page 1. Our position has been recorded by our votes with six other states at Chattanooga not to allow our President to sell us down the river. However, that is exactly what happened. You did not want us to even discuss: the compound bow or releases in Tennessee. But we did and then by majority vote agreed as to how we could live with these problems. But this council was not heeded, instead complete acceptance of the rules as presented by NAA.

If we in Virginia wanted to shoot NAA rules we would not have been strong supporters of NFAA, and I think we qualify on that account. We supported NFAA two years in a row with checks of (\$1,000.) one thousand dollars to ease their cash flow when requested. I might add that VBA received no recognition for this at Chattanooga except from George Rohrbach. The Federation of States concept was born here in Virginia and we still believe it to be the best foundation for any democratic association on a national basis.


We are faced with the loss of over 50% of our 1200 members because of one rule. Surprising enough, it is not the compound bow or releases, although they would take their toll, the rule that over 600 of our archers cannot and will not accept is Art. 2, Bare Bow Rules. Quote 'The bowstring center serving must not reach above the point of the archer's nose'. Note: not one case has ever been reported in Virginia where someone used his/her string to sight by and there never will be. Our state archers, over 600 of them, use three fingers under/split fingers, in bare bow division. They enjoy it and will continue to shoot that way long after this idiotic rule is forgotten. Also, some archers like to use back quivers which are not listed as acceptable equipment. Isn't that ridiculous.

I should like to make one further observation. We, in Virginia, do not give a damn what rules, games, or programs PAA or NAA play with. We had hoped that thirty thousand field archers could grow to be one hundred thousand, all enjoying the programs we (NFAA) sponsored. But if that is not to be let us at least sit down in National Convention for one last time and bury ourselves, thereby depriving NAA and AAC the privilege of doing it for us.
