## SUMMARY OF A.A.C. MEETING

## I. Archer's Equipment

1. This article lays down the type of equipment archers are permitted to use when shooting sanctioned events of the member organizations of the American Archery Council. (These rules do not apply when sanctioned FITA Rounds are shot.)

2. Items of equipment not mentioned or covered in this article are consequently not allowed to be used without prior approval of the American Archery Council Equipment Committee. Further it will be necessary to place before the Equipment Committee any equipment or part thereof for which approval is requested.

3. No archer shall be barred from a tournament because of a physical handicap unless his or her shooting requires mechanical aids which, in the judgement of the Field Officials, would give him or her undue advantage over the other archers.

II. Definitions of allowable equipment

1. A Bow of any type may be used provided it subscribes to the acceptable principle and meaning of the word "Bow" as used in competitive archery: e.g. an instrument consisting of a handle (grip), riser and two flexible limbs each ending in a tip with a string nook.

a. The Bow is braced fro use by a single bowstring attached directly between the two string nocks only, and in operation is held in one hand by its handle (grip) while the fingers of the other hand draw, hold back and release the string.

2. A Bow String may be made up of any number of strands of the material chosen for the purpose, with a center serving to accomodate the drawing fingers, a nocking point to which may be added serving(s) to fit the arrow nock as necessary, and to locate this point one or two nock locators may be positioned, and in each of the two ends of the Bow String a loop to be placed in the string nocks of the bwo when braced. In addition two attachments may be used.

a. The Kisser Button not to exceed 3/8" in any direction.

b. The String Peep not to exceed 1" total length of 3/8" total width.

c. Contrasting color servings may be used on bow strings, as may be string marks.

3. An Arrowrest which can be adjustable, a Plunger, an Arrow-plate and a Drawcheck Indicator may all be used on the Bow Provided they are not electric or electronic and do not offer an additional aid in aiming.

4. A Bowsight, A Bowmark or a Point of Aim on the ground for aiming are permitted, but at notime may more than one such device be used.

a. A Bowsight, as attached to the Bow for the purpose of aiming may allow for windage adjustment as well as elevation setting for aiming. A single lens prism as well as a bow level will be allowed.

b. A Bowmark is a single mark made on the Bow for the purpose of aiming. Such mark may be made in pencil, tape or any other suitable marking material.

A plate or tape with distance marking may be mounted on the bow as a guide for sight marking, but, must not in any way offer any additional sighting aid.

c. Any type of Point-of-Aim may be used which does not protrude more than six (6) inches above the ground and does not interfere with shooting or scoring. 5. Stabilizers on the Bow are permitted provided they do not

a. Touch anything but the bow.

b. Represent any obstacle to other archers as far as place on the shooting line is concerned.

c. The number of stabilizers mounted shall not exceed four (4). (The term "stabilizer" shall also include counterbalancing weights.)

6. Arrows of any type may be used provided they subscribe to the acceptable principle and meaning of the word Arrow as used in competitive archery, and that such arrows do not cause undue damage to target faces and buttresses.

a. All arrows used shall be identical in length, weight, diameter and fletching with allowances for wear and tear. b. An Arrow consists of a nock, shaft and arrow head (point) with fletching and if desired, cresting.

7. Finger Protections in the form of finger stalls or tips, gloves, shooting tap or tape (plaster) to draw, hold back and release the String are permitted, provided they are smooth with no device to help to hold and/or release the String. A separator between the fingers to prevent pinching may be used. On the bow hand an ordinary glove, mitten or similar item may be worn.

8. Field Glasses, Telescopes and other visual aids may be used between shots for spotting arrows as long as the archer does not leave the shooting line.

a. Ordinary spectacles as necessary or shooting spectacles provided they are fitted with the same lenses normally used by the archer, and sun glasses. None must be fitted with microhole lenses, glasses or similar nor marked in any way, which can assist in aiming.

9. Accessories are permitted such as Arm Guards, Chestplates, Bowslings, Fingerslings, Bow-saddles and Locators, Belt or Ground Quivers, Tassels, Foot Markers not protruding above the ground more than 1/2".

a. Ground quivers may be placed on the shooting line while the archer is in the process of shooting but must be removed to the tackle area while others are shooting and during the scoring interval.

III. The referee or his counterpart shall be the final authority in settling any dispute that may arise over the interpretation or requirements of this article.

AAC Standard Equipment Rules for Bare Bow and Instinctive Shooters

1. A Bow as prescribed in Free Style division with the following exception a. The Bow must be bare and free from any protrusions, marks or blemishes or laminated pieces which could be used in aiming. The inside of the upper limb shall be without any trademark.

2. The Bowstring center serving must not reach above the point of the archers nose. The bowstring must not in any way offer aid in aiming through peepholes, markings or any other means.

3. A Clicker may be used providing that it does not extend above the arrow diameter.

4. No device of any type that may be used for sighting may be used or attached to the archer's equipment.

5. There shall be no device, mechanical or otherwise, in the sight window except the arrow rest.

6. A sight window that is altered from standard configuration and not offered as a standard option at no charge by the manufacturer shall not be acceptable.

7. String shall b one color only. A serving of one other color may be used. One nocking point (the point where the arrow touches the string) only may be used. Any marks, ties or string attachments to the string shall invalidate its use in this Division.

8. One anchor point only is permitted.

9. An archer shall hold the arrow when nocked in the traditional manner, i.e., index finger above the nock and middle finger below the nock, except in cases of physical deformity or handicap for which special dispensations shall be made.

## OFFICE OF THE NFAA DIRECTOR

#### FLIGHT EDITOR

Enclosed in this issue of Flight are the results of the AAC meeting held in COBO Hall, Detroit, Michigan. As we see it now, they will become official May 1, 1971.

Under AAC Standard Equipment Rules for Bare Bow and Instinctive Shooters, Sections 8 and 9 have been deleted. However, Section 2, line (1), "The Bow-String Center serving must not reach above the point of the archer's nose," actually serves to restrict and accomplishes the intent of 8 and 9.

Florida has moved to strike this sentence and we will support his motion, but how it can be accomplished, and when, I cannot answer at this time. I should also like to take this opportunity to restate that Virginia (3) votes, West Virginia (1) vote, North Carolina (1) vote, New Mexico (1) vote, Kansas (2) votes and Georgia (1) vote voted against BD-28-71 in Chattanooga, Tennessee. This motion was to allow our President of NFAA to attend the AAC meeting with full ratification authority. The result has been complete sell out to NAA. Our NFAA President did not follow his board's recommendations.

1. He was directed to allow releases in F/S.

2. He was directed to allow compound bow in F/S.

These were controversial items, but majority ruled. As he did not follow the dictates or mandates, and if I am directed by VBA, I shall prepare a motion to be sent to all directors and councilmen requesting support to move that NFAA not be a part of AAC. Maybe this route will allow the majority 32,000 NFAA members to rule rather than a handful or minority rule as we see from the AAC meeting. As soon as I receive official notice of the effective date for these new equipment rules, I will inform the State Secretary, who can propogate it to all clubs.

spread backing and several variations are being considered by the committee. One system would work like this: An archer who shoots in a sanctioned shoot and takes first place in his class, would be awarded a certificate valued at 4 points. Second place winner would be awarded a 3 point certificate, and third place winner would recieve a 2 point certificate. Any archer competing in a sanctioned shoot would receive 1 point. An archer would then keep his certifiicates until a certain time. As this specified time, the archer could then choose an award according to the number of points of his certificate. Awards that are being considered are trophies, gift certificates, archery equipment, or merchandize.

In conjunction to this, an achievement patch award is being discused. This would be a VBA Patch with achievement scores attached. All VBA Pins would be discontinued. Archers have already indicated they would be more receptive to more useful awards.

It has become clear that clubs and VBA are losing members that they should not lose. There are many reasons for this and no one answer can solve the overall problem, but we feel that two of the reasons are:

1. Some members like to shoot just for the fun and enjoyment of shooting and associating with other archers and cares less who might win or if they win. Archery has become so competitive in recent years that they can not do this. For them it is impossible to think of score and enjoy the game at the same time.

2. Others archers just do not like to shoot under the tight rules that controls our tournaments.

With this in mind a new program has been approved that we hope will

solve these two problems. Under this program a prospected new member would be allowed to shoot three rounds using any equipment he chooses and any style or mixture of styles he would like to use. He would be registered as a beginner and there would be no awards. During this time the local club would explain to him the different divisions and styles of shooting available to him and the rules for each. It would not be required that he be a VBA or NFAA member during this period, but the local club may or may not require member club may or may not require that he be a club member. During this period of time the archer is becoming familiar with the different styles and can decide which he likes or may even decide he likes none of them. After the 3rd round is shot the archer would have to become a VBA and NFAA member to proceed to shoot and a club member if he is not already one. He would at this time decide styles of shooting he wanted to shoot (Barebow, Free Style, or Bowhunter). If he so desires he may continue to shoot any equipment he likes and any styles and register in an Open Unclassified Division. There would not be any classes or no distinction between sexes in this division. There would be one award given for up to four archers, two for five to seven, and three for over seven. Awards would not be furnished by VBA and would be of a clubs choice.

If at any time the archer decide he would like to start shooting one of the competitive divisions he would then classify in the division like any new archer. That is by shooting two scores using the equipment required for the division he chose.
