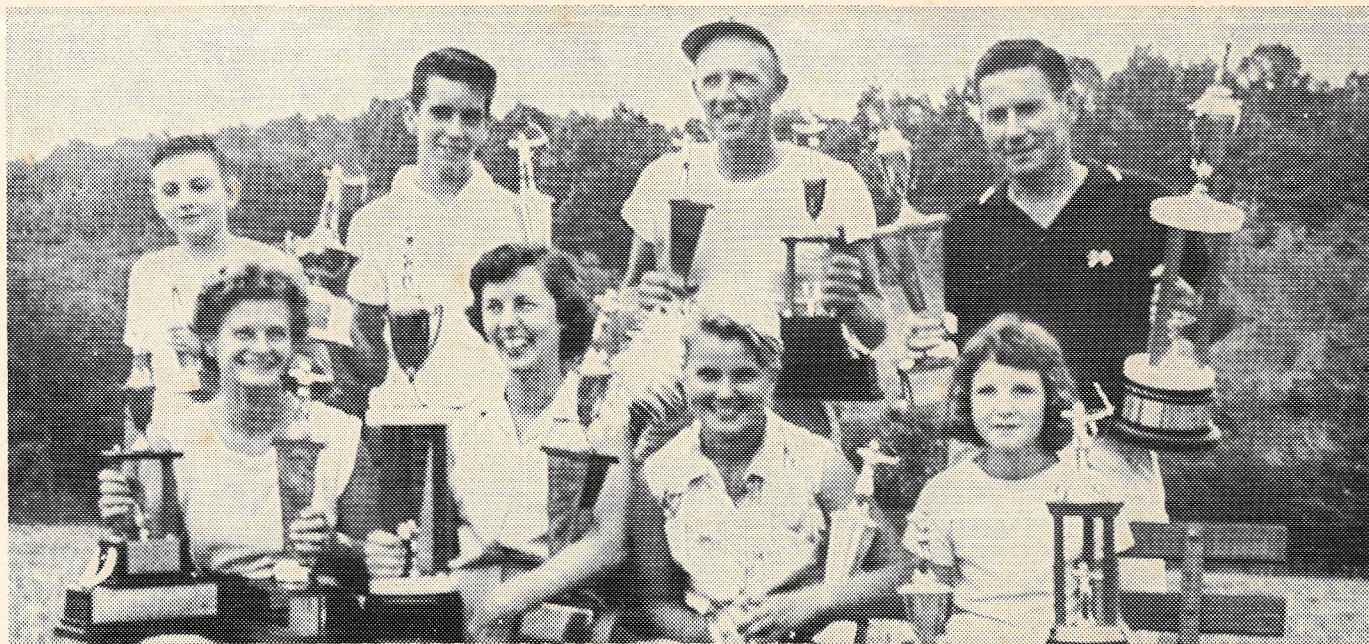




1960 VIRGINIA STATE CHAMPIONS

Hixon and Whitacre Win State Meet

Some 300 archers participated in the Fourteenth Annual VBA State Championship Field Archery tournament at Staunton on the Augusta Archers range over Labor Day weekend. Leading all the way in the Women's Divisions and never really contested was Mildred Hixon from Richmond. Mary Lee Craft, defending champion, was 74 points behind in second place, with Sue Korzenewski a close third 4 points behind Mary Lee. In the Men's Division past champion Kermit Whitacre took a 12 and 14 point lead over Obra Keesee and defending champion Gene Limerick on the first day, and opened his lead to 64 and 68 points on the final tally. Kermit shot a smashing 489 Hunters Round to prove himself a real champion.

Russ Hawes again outclassed all other

archers in the Men's Heavy Tackle Division with a substantial 220 point lead over his nearest competitor Charles Payne, with Wesley Creasey 6 points behind Payne. Gertie Lewis came from behind in the Women's Heavy Tackle Division to defeat defending champion Betty Kello by 19 points. Evelyn Seal placed third behind Betty Kello.

In the other Divisions Madeline Ford successfully defended her Intermediate Girl's championship and Linda Davis set new records in her sweep of the Junior Girls Division, while Donnie Davis and David Shickle won the Intermediate and Junior Boys Divisions respectively. Class winners are found elsewhere in this issue.

Federation Urges Clean Camp Sites

Many of you archers will be proceeding to your favorite haunts to hunt the wily deer and will be setting up camp sites in camping areas and other forest locations. The National Wildlife Federation urges all hunters to leave clean camp sites. Use the trash disposal facilities that have been made available for you, and if none are provided, take two minutes off from your valuable hunting time and dig a pit to bury your trash. Paper can be burned and the cans should be flattened and buried along with glass bottles and jars. Dig your pits deep enough so that animals will not dig out and scatter the debris. Don't litter our streams and lakes.

Special Insurance For Bowhunters Available

Now available to all outdoors people including archers and bowhunters is a special insurance policy giving them added protection while traveling to and from as well as participating in their favorite sport. This policy is automatic when the archer becomes an individual member of the Virginia Wildlife Federation. Thus not only is he buying himself this additional coverage in insurance, but is also supporting a worthy organization that works hard in his behalf in the field of conservation.

The policy provides life insurance of \$1000.00 that increases each year it is kept in force by \$100.00 up to a maximum of \$1500.00 after five years. Also, \$15.00 weekly indemnity for 13 weeks and \$5.00 daily hospitalization for 21 days. Also each member will receive The News Record, the official publication of the VWF, keeping him informed of the activities of the Federation and news conservation wise around the state.

The policy gives this protection at all times while: Hunting and Fishing during the legal season; Going to or returning from a hunting or fishing trip; Engaged in the sport of skeet or trap shooting, rifle, or pistol matches; Engaged in official field dog trial meets, including transportation going to and returning from such activities; Engaged in archery at a registered archery range or bowhunting.

The Virginia Wildlife Federation has only recently acquired this insurance for the sportsmen of Virginia after several years of work in that direction. As the policy remains in effect for a full calendar year, it appears that this is an opportunity that no archer will want to miss. Elsewhere in this issue is an application blank to be filled in and sent along with your \$5.00 to the VWF for your membership and insurance.

Bowhunting Safety

One of the virtues of bowhunting is its relative safety. But the likelihood of serious accidents increases each year as the concentration of bowhunters increases. There have been very few injuries and no fatalities in Virginia. Let's keep it that way by preaching safety and practicing what we preach.

Don't shoot until you are absolutely sure of your target. Shadows and noises in the woods can play strange and deceiving tricks on even the most experienced hunters. Camouflaged clothing adds to the importance of observing this most fundamental rule.

Be especially careful when light is poor. The bowhunter should carry a flashlight and when going to his stand before dawn he should flash the light now and then. When returning from the afternoon hunt he should whistle frequently and flash the light. There is always some eager archer who lingers longer than the rest and who is straining his eyes and ears for the deer which walk more freely in the deepening dusk.

When you have a quiver full of razor sharp broadheads on your back, remember that a fall may scatter these "daggers" all over the place. Get that quiver off your back when climbing trees. And incidentally, we note that tree stands are being resorted to more and more, and we hear about an alarming number of falls from trees. Not everyone should try to climb trees, much less stay in one for hours and try to shoot from the precarious perch. As a cause of serious accidents this tree business might well prove to be the most dangerous aspect of bowhunting.

When carrying a bow with a broadhead on the string, don't walk too close behind anyone. If you trip and stumble, you can easily put your companion out of commission for a time. Upon returning to camp or whenever you are in a group of people, take your arrow off the string. You wouldn't carelessly brandish a straight razor, and we hope that your broadheads are almost that sharp.

And finally, don't hunt alone. Have someone to check in with before going home. Otherwise, if something should happen, many hours might elapse before anyone became concerned about your plight. Always tell your companion exactly where you intend to hunt and don't stray too far away from your announced plan.
