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From the President

Our September meeting of the Club Delegates was a very productive one! The Directors worked together to pull together the shoot card for next year and de-conflict any issues within each region. They also took time to readdress the date for the Spring Open, which had previously inadvertently been set for Easter weekend. Through a lot of discussion and negotiation they were able to select a date which worked best for avoiding National shoots and Club events planned for the spring. They deserve a big "Thank You" for working hard to pull together a great shoot card for the 2017 season!

Time truly does fly! I was reminded that Elections for the VBA Executive Board will occur this upcoming year. Terry Ballowe, our current Vice President, has indicated he will not seek another term. Cay McManus, our current Field Vice President, has indicated the same. These are both key positions which required talented, dedicated folks to serve. Robert Garber, President of the Bowhunters of Rockingham, agreed to chair a Nominating Committee to seek qualified candidates. Charlene McManus, Delegate from Staunton River, and Bakari Dale, President of the Belvoir Bowhunters, are serving as members on the committee with Robert. The Nominating Committee will prepare a list of nominees who have agreed to accept office and who have stated that they can and will attend VBA meetings. They will submit a list of at least one or more candidates for each office. At the January meeting, nominations will be open from Club Directors and those names will be added to the official ballot. This slate of candidates will then be forwarded to each member of affiliated clubs, and associated members, at least 30 days prior to the March meeting. All voting for candidates will be done by mail ballots which are sent to all adult members of affiliated clubs and associated members within 30 days after the March meeting. These ballots must be returned to the Executive State Secretary, unopened until the June meeting of the Board of Directors where they will be opened and counted. Candidates receiving the highest number of votes, whether a majority of total votes cast, or not, shall be thereby elected. (When only one person is running for each office, no mail ballot will be sent out.) So if you are interested in any of the elected positions, I would encourage you to get in contact with one of the members of the Nominating Committee and them know.

If you are a bowhunter, then this time of the year, the Fall, is truly special! It is a time of promise for successful hunts and great memories of being with friends and family in the field. But this time of fellowship and good times comes with the risks we take when we pursue our passions. As I tell my IBEP students, the only thing our loved ones ever ask is that we come home safe from each hunt. Never leave the ground unless you are wearing your fall restraint system. Keep it on until you return to the ground. Stay alert when you drive to and from your hunts, and take time for a coffee break on long drives. Check your stands, ladders and other equipment frequently to make sure it is still in good working order. Let the good times roll, but above all, Be Safe!

If this is passed, then the scoring will probably be scored using the Pennsylvania Scoring System.

Now that most of you are bowhunting, remember to: 'buck-up' when you are in your treestand, getting permission to hunt on private land on Sunday's, no hunting over bait, know your area, when to wear blaze orange and following all the VDGIF Hunting & Trapping Regulations. AGENDA ITEMS

AGENDA ITEM VOTED AT SEPTEMBER MEETING:

(7) VBA By-laws, Art. 14. 3-D Styles of Shooting, pg. 10 of 23: Amend as follows: Delete: "Refer to IBO Shooting Rules." Insert: "Use VBA Classifications and Shooting Styles for the VBA Spring Classic and Fall Classic 3-D tournaments and use VBA 3-D rules. Effective: Jan.1, 2018, as amended. Failed, 27 no, 8 yes, 2 abstained.

AGENDA ITEM FOR JANUARY MEETING:

(1) VBA <Sect. 6 Shooting Styles, pg. 12, Sect. G, Traditional, Rule #4: Change to read: Stabilizer and or counter weight is allowed as long as it is no longer than 12" measured from back of bow.
NFAA Art, 2, pg. 31, Para. H, Traditional: One straight stabilizer, coupling device included if used, which cannot exceed 12" at anytime, as measured from back of bow.

Justification: NFAA rules and BO rules both allow 12" stabilizers and or counter weights. If archers are going to Nationals, they should be allowed to shoot in VBA by the same rules. Heavy bows have a stability advantage, but cost more, than light, inexpensive bows. You can add weight or small stabilizers to help equalize the advantage.

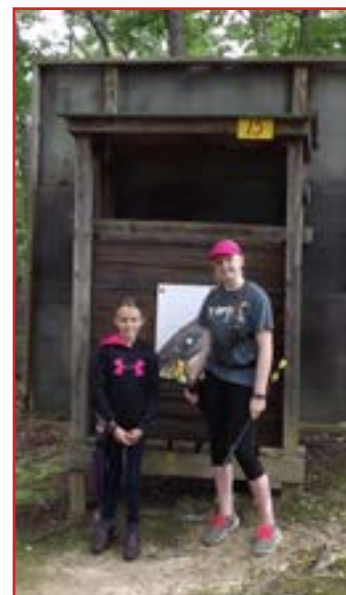

KINGSBORO BOWMEN SHOOT FOR HUNTERS FOR THE HUNGRY

Kingsboro Bowmen was happy to host our annual Hunters For The Hungry (H4H) shoot on August 28, 2016. There was an excellent turnout with 76 shooters and because of the great turnout we are able to donate \$673.00 to the local H4H coordinator. All of the shooters were able to shoot at and for the most part hit the 25 3-D targets we had set up with the animals ranging from Buffalo, Alligator, Deer and Javelina and with a good time had by all.

Straight Talk About Archery Equipment

Let's get back to using straight talk about archery equipment. I heard last week that the crossbow was called that because it was a cross between a rifle and a bow. Newsflash; the crossbow was around long before gunpowder. Historically it is more accurate to say that combining the shoulder mount feature of the cross bow with the miniaturization of the canon resulted in the individual small arm we call the musket. Later, when we learned how to impart spin on the projectile, the rifle was developed.

So what is the defining feature of archery equipment? The bow is a device that uses bent limbs to impart energy to a projectile like a small spear that we call an arrow. Those bent limbs are springs. Archery limbs have been made out of wood, bone, animal composites, and in modern times, aluminum, fiberglass, carbon and laminations of some of those materials. But they all work the same – they store energy when bent and give up that energy to propel the arrow when released. Therefore it is logical to consider hand held devices that use bent springs – what Traditional Archers call “the bent stick” – to be archery equipment. That includes crossbows.

But now there is a new thing marketed by Crosman called the “Pioneer Air Bow”. It is a device that propels an arrow with the release of compressed air. Let's think about that. A firearm – a gun – imparts energy to a projectile through the sudden release of compressed gases generated by an enclosed explosion. Air guns impart energy to a projectile through the sudden release of compressed air (a gas) or compressed carbon dioxide (a component of air). The only difference between an air gun and the “Air Bow” is the projectile. In fact the “Air Bow” most closely resembles a spear gun. Despite the projectile, the Crosman product is decidedly not an archery device and never should be considered a valid device for hunting during the archery season. Come to think of it, calling the Crosman device an “Air Bow” is like calling a slingshot an “elastic pistol”.

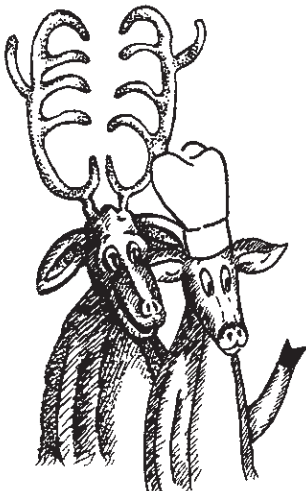

Ye Old 14 Point Buck Venison Roast

- 4 pounds venison rump roast 1 large onion
- Salt and pepper, as much as you like
- 2 tablespoons Italian seasoning
- 2 (12 ounce) cans of beer
- 1 (16 ounce) jar of spicy peppers in tomato sauce

Remove all of the fat and gristle. Stick your roast in a large deep pan. Season well with salt and pepper and the rub Italian dressing into meat. Cover with sliced onions. Pour both cans of beer over the meat. Cover with foil and place in refrigerator overnight.

Next day put your roast and the marinade and onions into Ye ol crockpot, stir your spicy peppers into the marinade. Cover the crockpot and cook on low heat for 7-9 hours, or until your rump roast is tender and falling off the bone. Serve up your roast and enjoy.



My First Canadian Spring Bear Hunt

My brother, Danny Korbini, is an avid bow hunter and has been a member of the Virginia Bow Hunter's Association for a few years. In an effort to spend some quality time with his big brother, he encouraged me to knock the dust of my old bow and join both the Massanutten Archery Club (MAC) (<http://massanuttenarchery.com>) and the Virginia Bowhunter's Association (<http://vbarchers.com>). My old bow required serious TLC so I took it to Hoffman Archery (<http://hoffmanarchery.com>) in Warrenton, Virginia. The owner, Farron Moss, was more than willing to bring my old bow back to life; however, after witnessing all of the advancements in compound bow technology I decided to upgrade to a Mission Blaze. I shot the Mission Blaze during Massanutten Archery Club's indoor season but was having a problem getting a good grouping of arrows due to an old football injury to my thumb. I decided to try a new bow and Farron showed me the Matthew's Halon 6. I really liked the way it felt in my hand and decided to give it a shot. I quickly fell in love with that bow. My shooting during indoor season improved drastically. In the spring, I started shooting with the Massanutten Archery Club during 3D season. It was during a 3D shoot that I decided I was going to use my bow on my first Canadian Spring Bear hunt. After making that decision, not only did I shoot the weekly 3D range at MAC, I started shooting at both Two Rivers Archery in Front Royal, VA, and Shenandoah Archery in Strasburg, VA. All three ranges are great as are the people at each location. I was able to build enough confidence in my abilities to try something new. I have killed several deer with a rifle but I had never shot a deer with a bow nor have I ever been bear hunting. The following is a chronological journal of my first Canadian Spring Bear hunt.



Day 0 – June 5, 2016

We arrived at our camp at Long Lake Adventures (<http://www.longlakeadventures.com/>) in Plaster Rock, New Brunswick, Canada about 2:00pm. We all unpacked and hung around meeting the staff. From Clay Harrison, the owner, to his guides: Vince, Kevin, and Alan. We also met Tanya Harrison, Clay's wife, who cooked us a great spaghetti dinner. After dinner, Clay officially welcomed the group of hunters: Dolph and Renier from South Africa's Leopard Moon Safaris (<http://www.leopardmoonsafaris.com/>); Bob from Clarksburg, WV; Art from Pittsburgh PA; Rob from Nova Scotia who runs Moose Creek Lodge (<http://www.moosecreeklodgefld.com>) in Newfoundland; Jimmy Walsh from Mount Airy MD; and lastly Danny and Tom Korbini from Linden and Berryville Virginia, respectively. From the start, Clay and his staff made us feel all at home. We were assigned guides: Rob and I were assigned to Kevin; Bob and Art were assigned to Vince; Dolph and Renier were assigned to Alan; and Jimmy and Danny were assigned to Clay. We spent the rest of the night drinking a few and telling stories. Dolph and Renier talked about hunting in South Africa and reflected on Danny and Jimmy's hunt last year. It was really interesting to get their perspective of the events. Why my little brother was tracking a wounded cape buffalo with only a bow in his hand is still a mystery to me. That could have really turned ugly. Rob educated the group on hunting in Newfoundland. I did not know that the Moose on that island were originally brought in from New Brunswick, Canada. Clay enjoyed a Country Music playlist that I made that consisted primarily of Jamey Johnson and Chris Stapleton. It was nice to see that our Canadian friends enjoyed good country music as much as we do.

Day 1– June 6, 2016

We woke up and ate a pancake and bacon breakfast which was a great start to our day! Dolph and Renier are not used to pancakes, French toast or anything sweet for breakfast. They put ketchup on pancakes and I almost yacked. Who does that? Afterwards, all of the hunters were required to shoot our weapons for Clay and the guides to ensure weapon accuracy. Long lake Adventures doesn't want hunters injuring animals due to faulty equipment or in some cases, a lack of ability to properly operate his/her weapon. We all respected them for this practice. Guns and Bows can get banged up during transport and it's wise to ensure that you are sighted in.

We ate a big roast beef lunch that included these vegetables called fiddle heads which look like a cross between a green bean and broccoli. I had never had them before and enjoyed tasting something from that area. Kevin was ready to go at 4pm so Rob and I piled in his truck. We dropped Rob off at his blind then we were off to my stand. When we got there we found three cubs climbing the tree by the bait barrel and momma standing at the bottom of the tree (pictured next page right). Unfortunately,

this meant that I was not going to be able to hunt in the two man stand that they had set up for me. Clay decided to move me to a different stand that was a lot smaller. After a short drive, Kevin got me set up in the new stand and it was game on. Black flies and mosquitos are a pain in the, well you know the back side, but my Thermacell helped. It was about 6:45 PM when I hear a noise from behind me.



I turned to see my first bear! What a beautiful animal. My heart was racing. He came right under my stand then disappeared in the woods. About fifteen minutes later he popped out at the bait barrel, or honey hole as they call it, but my kill shot was blocked by trees. I quickly learned I was not set up for success. The stand placement wasn't conducive to a successful shot for a right handed bow shooter. I also had my backpack between my feet which further restricted my ability to get the perfect shot. I tried to get lined up from a sitting position the best that I could but it was totally against everything that I practiced and drawing the bow straight back effected my anchor point. As a result, I missed the bear. Fifteen minutes after the missed shot, a second bear came in that was even bigger than the first only to have the same results. I was 0-2 and very frustrated at this point. The guys at camp all laughed at my story as they cut my shirt tail (pictured right).



Day 2– June 7, 2016

Tuesday started with a great sausage and egg breakfast then I practiced shooting from a sitting position. Clay and his guys turned my stand and cut down the trees that were in my shooting lane earlier in the morning so if those bears come in again, I would have no excuses for missing the shot.

After breakfast, I practiced shooting with a purpose; something Farron has always told me to do. Since they straightened my stand, if I see bear tonight, I should have a good shot. We will see what happens.

We ate a chicken lunch and I headed to my stand about 4 PM. I sat there all night and didn't see anything. Back at the camp, I learned that Danny, Jimmy, and Renier all have monster 500+ pound bears either on the trail cams or in Renier's case he actually saw the bear. Jimmy has passed a 300 pounder two days in a row waiting on the big bear. The rest of the hunters didn't have any luck, though Bob did see a moose. We pulled the card on my trail cam and the bears from Monday were confirmed to be shooter bears but not monsters. Not everybody can be lucky enough to have the big boys hitting their bait. You have to work with what is presented to you. I will say this, Clay and his team do a great job putting you on quality bears and there is no shortage of big bears.

Day 3– June 8, 2016

Wednesday started like every day at Long Lake Adventures. A great breakfast and lunch served up by Tanya and Tammy then some voluntary practice shooting on my part. Before I knew it, it was time to hunt. Wednesday's weather was rainy and cold. I didn't dress right and won't let that happen again tomorrow. I saw a small bear at around 8 PM that I didn't want to shoot. I watched him enjoy the bait in the honey hole and he eventually ran off into the woods. When we got back to camp, Danny told me that he finally had the chance to see the monster bear that they were tracking on the trail cam but was not given an opportunity for a shot. Jimmy passed on the 300 pounder ... again.

Nobody has killed anything yet. I have gained confidence in myself that with this new stand I can execute a great shot on a bear. I am starting to feel comfortable calling myself a bear hunter. Monday was a train wreck but I'm regrouping nicely. Tanya had a big pot of Hamburger soup to warm our bellies. I think everyone was pretty beaten up by the weather and was in bed early.

Day 4– June 9, 2016

French toast and bacon made for my favorite breakfast thus far. We are hoping that the rain subsides this evening as the last two hunts are right in front of us. Again I practiced shooting with a purpose while it was still misting by the lake. The chatter has started about settling for a bear that is smaller than the one that they are waiting for. Trail cams all showed several monster bear but they have not been coming out. Based on the activity this week, it appears that the rut started.

Between the rain, wind, and rut, finding the big bear has been challenging. Renier saw one on Monday while Danny and Dolph each saw one last night, though nobody was able to get a shot. Optimistic for today's hunt!

Thursday's hunt started slow. Rain and wind caused a mostly silent evening. At 9:30 PM, just as sun was almost gone, a bear stepped out near the bait! I thought this may be my last opportunity at a shot. At that time of evening, it looked big enough to shoot. So I drew my bow back and put the 25 yard pin right behind the shoulder. As I released the arrow, the bear's head turned and the arrow hit right between its eyes ... it dropped in its tracks. After the shot, my heart was pounding out of my chest. What a rush! I had killed my first bear with a Matthews Halon 6 in Canada. I now fully realize what my brother and the boys from Massanutten Archery Club were telling me. It is an incredible feeling to hunt and kill an animal with a bow and arrow.

As the hunters returned for the evening, I learned that Bob shot a bear that was a little bigger than mine with his crossbow. We were all happy for him.

Day 5

After breakfast, it was picture time. We took some great pictures of our bears (pictured right), then Bob and I assisted Clay and his guides with processing the bears for transport. They have it down to a science and it didn't take long before both bears were in a freezer.

At 4 PM, the six remaining hunters went out in the woods for their last chance at a bear this week. I was invited to ride with Clay to work a bait site and get a tour of the Long Lake property. As I was sitting on top of a mountain with Clay and a breathtaking view of Long Lake, all I could think was that this place is amazing. A hunting and fishing paradise run by a team of expert bear hunters, moose hunters, and anglers!!! While riding along with Clay in the truck, we saw three deer and a big moose. I've never seen a moose in the wild so that was pretty cool. It looked to be a bull to Clay because it was a big animal. As the sun set, we went to pick up Danny and Jimmy then headed back to camp.

As the hunters returned from their final day in the woods, we learned that Dolph had shot a bear.

Trust me, you wish you were me right now! Like Luke Bryan says, 'Huntin', fishin', and lovin' every day'!!! A great week had finally come to an end.

In summary, I am 50 years old and I have never done anything like this before in my life. I guess you can teach an old dog a new trick. I will start by saying this trip was a great opportunity to bond with my little brother because family should always come first. I want to thank him for motivating me to pursue archery. I don't think I would have ever done it on my own. He also introduced me to some amazing people that I can now call friends. I want to thank Farron Moss and all of his staff at Hoffman Archery for their personalized help. They made sure that I had everything that I needed and encouraged me throughout my preparation for this trip. Their guidance is invaluable. I want to thank Massanutten Archery Club for allowing me to be part of their group. I can't say enough about the guidance, patience, and encouragement they afforded to me. I wish I could call them all out by name but I would end up forgetting somebody.

Lastly, I want to thank Clay Harrison and his staff at Long Lake Adventures. From day one, the entire Long Lake team made our group of hunters feel like family. I was treated to a first class destination hunt and if I had to rate them on a scale of 1 to 10 with 10 being the highest; I would give them an 11. I am an extremely satisfied customer and I would highly recommend Long Lake Adventures (<http://www.longlakeadventures.com>) for both hunting and fishing. I have already booked my trip for next year.

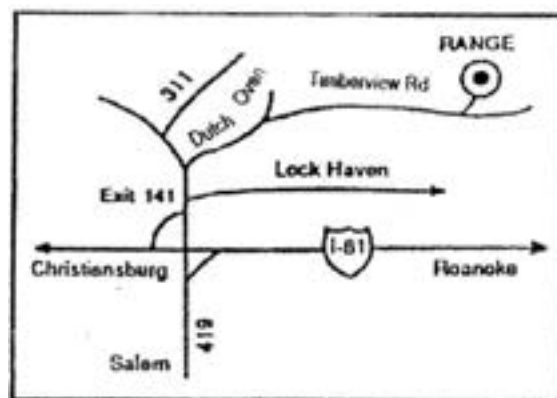

Crosman, the 90-year old company that built your granddads Red Ryder BB gun, has introduced a new shooting product through its Benjamin brand called the Pioneer Air Bow.

Before you rush out to plunk down \$849 to buy one, be aware that the Department of Game and Inland Fisheries has ruled that it doesn't qualify as a hunting instrument in Virginia.

According to Lee Walker, VDGIIF media relations coordinator, a bow/crossbow is defined as using "a string that bends a flexible piece of material." The air bow uses compressed air to propel the arrow. The arrows are pulled from the front rather than pushed from the rear. Nor does the air bow meet the standards for a rifle, an instrument described as having a barrel.

All this doesn't appear to be quelling the hype over the new introduction. It has been grabbing the spotlight at the SHOT Shop open this week in Las Vegas. The new product has increased traffic on the company's [website www.crosman.com](http://www.crosman.com), threefold. The air bows are scheduled to be shipped to buyers beginning in April, but sales have been so strong buyers are being advised it may be months later before they are delivered.

The air bow shoots full-size, broad heads-equipped arrows at a sizzling speed of 450 feet-per-second, all driven with air. The manufacturer says the instrument is capable of firing eight shots with amazing accuracy in the same amount of time as a crossbow can shoot three. You can cock an air bow with two fingers, which opens bowhunting to people who can't handle a traditional bow. It is equipped with a scope.

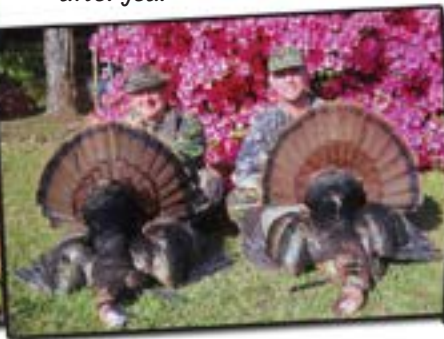

Just a reminder that the VBA has a \$500.00 Conservation Scholarship Available each year [providing funds are available]. Written request for the scholarship must be submitted to the VBA President by March 1st for approval by the directors. VBA members and their immediate family members are eligible. Scholarship can be used at any institute of higher learning for Forestry or Wildlife Conservation/Law Enforcement.

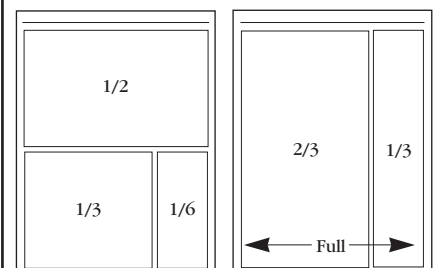

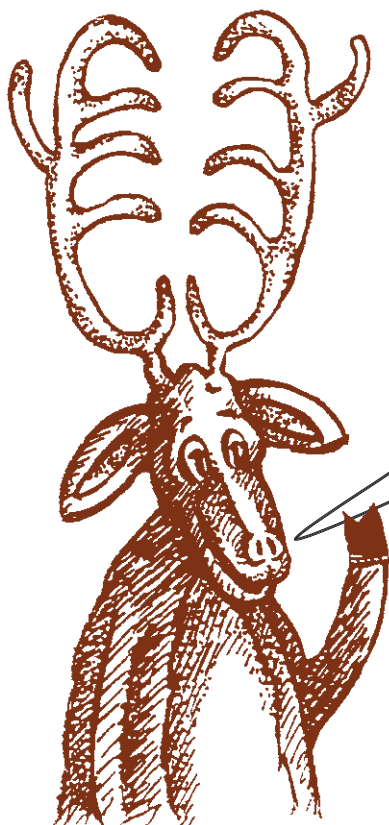

NOMINATIONS DUE IN MARCH

The VBA Order of the Golden Feather was created to honor those persons who have given unselfishly of their time and talents toward the betterment of archery and archers. Recipients are persons who possess the virtues of sportsmanship, character, morals, integrity and friendship. As a reflection of the substance for membership, only 80 people have been elected to the Order in the past 71 years.

To be qualified, a candidate must be member in good standing of the VBA at the time of nomination, must have a minimum of ten successive years' membership in the VBA and must be sponsored by three VBA members of good standing or by a VBA Club.

This article is a reminder that candidates must be submitted to the Board of Directors at the March meeting for this year. Nominations must be in writing and be signed by sponsoring individuals or a Club officer. Successful nominees have always performed duties or had an impact outside their immediate club.
