From The Hunting Vice President

Department of Game and Inland Fisheries (VDGIF) considers changes to the regulations that govern game wildlife, hunting and trapping. This spring the VDGIF is holding a series of 11 open meetings to receive public comments regarding proposed regulations or regulation amendments that the Board of Game and Inland Fisheries proposed at its March 6, 2003 meeting.

The public comment period will close May 1, 2003. The proposals are available on the department's web site (www.dgif.state.va.us) at the department's central and regional offices, in

the Virginia Register of Regulations, and at the public meetings.

Comments received on the proposals at the public input meetings will be summarized and reported to the Board for their consideration at the May 1, 2003 meeting prior to their adopting final regulations.

This is your chance to be heard. Get a copy of the proposed changes, form your opinion about the changes, and then let your voice be heard.

"The Crack Shot"


Iwas sitting around recovering from off season shoulder surgery and catching up on some reading when I started thinking about some hunts from this past fall; one in particular conjured up an image that got me to laughing so hard, I could hardly stand it. Thankfully, I didn't witness the actual scene I was thinking about, but the image that came to mind is worth sharing with other VBA members. Read on and see if the image that comes to your mind doesn't make you chuckle!

The idea for this hunt actually germinated two years earlier. In 1999, I had hunted the Werner Ranch in Douglas, Wyoming for antelope, but three days of rain kept the goats from coming to the water holes. Even though I didn't connect on antelope, I could tell the Werner Ranch was a good place to hunt. Jim and his son, J.J. worked very hard to get me an antelope, but with water everywhere it was tough hunting. I knew I would have to return, if not for the antelope unting, for Lori Werner's cooking! When I got back home, I told my buddy, Bob Seltzer, what a fine place I had found and we booked a trip for the first week of September, 2001.

August 31, 2001, found VBA members, Bob Seltzer, Ralph Lawson, and me headed to Wyoming for a week of antelope hunting at the Werner Ranch. We arrived late in the evening due to flight delays. We learned it's not necessarily

best to take the cheapest flight.

There were five other hunters in camp and after introductions and dinner, we drew for blinds. All the blinds have names, the names are put in a hat and each hunter draws a blind. The blind I drew was called "Highway Trees." It is located next to a grove of cottonwood trees beside a small pond just off a major highway. Bob drew "South Blind," which is within sight of the ranch house. Ralph was put in the same "pasture" that I was. All of the blinds are located near water. The blinds are either permanent or are erected well in advance of the season so the antelope are used to them when they come to

For those who have never been lucky enough to hunt antelope, weather can be one of the determining factors of your success. Two years ago, I saw 55 antelope and passed on some "easy" shots; then the rains came. This time we had hot, dry weather, excellent for antelope hunting. On the first day, four of the hunters, including Ralph, brought bucks into camp, only Bob, myself and two other hunters, one who had never hunted antelope before, had mistakenly passed on a large Pope & Young buck, failed to bring in a buck that first evening. Usually antelope huntinng can mean long days in the blind. While we were hunting it would get daylight around 6 a.m. and we would hunt until about 8 p.m. We took lots of reading material to while away the long hours in the blind, but it really wasn't needed. If you like watching animals, as I do, a good pair of binoculars will keep you busy, as there is almost always game within sight.

The waterhole I hunted was shared with another ranch that did not allow us to hunt on their property. It was very tough to be sitting there and watching a very large buck water on the other side of the fence only 15 yards away. No matter how much I tried, I could not wish him across the fence. To make matters worse, he usually was in sight most of the day.

After a large breakfast, we would pack our lunch and head out to the blinds. To keep the area around the blinds from becoming too contaminated with human scent, each hunter is provided with a jug and a trash bag to be placed in a 5 gallon bucket to relieve the necessary calls of nature, and to brought back to the camp and disposed of.

Now comes the part of this story that I did not witness, thankfully!!! The morning of the second day found Bob and I in our blinds. A big breakfast and lots of coffee were taking their toll onBob. Feeling the call of nature, Bob placed his trash bag in the five-gallon bucket, dropped his pants and sat down

to relieve himself. While in the middle of taking care of his business, he looked up and there was a respectable antelope buck standing outside of his blind. Bob, being a true bowhunter, grabbed his longbow, raised up off the pot and shot the buck with his pants down around his ankles. He then sat back down, finished his business, got dressed and went out to claim his antelope. After Bob got back to camp and was relaying his story, one of the other hunters immediately dubbed Bob's buck the "Crack Shot

Buck." I'm sure most will agree, it takes a "crack shot" to shoot a "Crack Shot Buck."

By midday, one other hunter and I were back in camp with our bucks. By late afternoon, the last hunter was back with his antelope.

The Werners work hard for their clients; they will move youu, if you are not seeing any antelope, but that was not necessary for us, because eight hunters killled eight bucks in two days of hunting.

Though our antelope hunting wover, the Werners kept us entertaine throughout the rest of our time there. We even got in a little sightseeing and met some new friends. We had a great time and are booked for a return trip in 2003. When we go back it will be for a combination antelope/mule deer hunt. Smothered Venison Ribs

3 lbs. venison ribs
liquid smoke
1½ cups celery, diced
1/2 cup onion, minced
1 tsp. salt
1 small can musbroom stems and
bieces

1/4 lb. butter
1 cup soft bread crumbs
1½ tsp. poultry seasoning
1 cup carrots, sliced
2 cups bot water
2 beef bouillon cubes

Cut venison ribs into serving size portions and brush with liquid smoke. Lay ribs close together in large roaster. Preheat oven to 450 degrees. Make dressing by sautéeing half of celery, onions, salt, mushrooms in half the butter; remove from heat and stir in soft bread crumbs and poultry seasonings. Sauté remaining celery and carrots in remaining butter for 15 minutes

Brown ribs in the oven for 10 minutes. Remove the ribs and spread carrots and celery over the bottom of roaster. Arrange the ribs tightly together on top, their more raw sides toward the top. Cover ribs with the dressing, smoothing it evenly down and brown for another 10 minutes. Dissolve the bouillon cubes in the hot water, then pour the bouillon over the dressing. Cover the roaster and return it to the oven. Turn the heat down to 300 degrees and bake for 2 hours. Add more bouillon if necessary. Serves 4 to 6.




