# Virginia Women Become Archers

In April, I had the pleasure of teaching the "Women in the Outdoors" (WITO) co-sponsored by the National Wild Turkey Federation (NWTF) and then "Becoming an Outdoors Woman" (BOW) for the Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries (VDGIF). Both of these courses were well attended and the attitude surrounding both events was that of fun and excitement. With my fellow instructors, Buffy Eppard and Dirk Welch, we taught three archery courses and two bowfishing courses.

As with all our archery courses, we began by stating, "Today we are going to give you a disease." I simply cannot think of a better way to state the excitement of the sport we all love and enjoy. By the end of the day, we heard comments back, letting us know that they had indeed "caught the disease." The archery courses began by lescribing the various bows, arrows nd their makeup. Following a demonstration of proper shooting form, determining eye dominance, and the outfitting of gloves and arm guards, the women began to shoot at a distance of 10 yards. After two rounds, we brought them back to discuss the form we would use, adjustments to our shooting, things that could help us sharpen our skills, etc. Following the discussion, we went back to shooting. After two more rounds, we again formed the group to discuss the various avenues in which women can pursue the sport of archery, from VBA tournaments, to club shoots, to bowfishing and hunting. We also attempted to point them toward local clubs in their area which would allow them to further pursue the sport. When the discussion ended, we set up balloons on the targets and let them finish the day shooting at balloons and one novelty shoot. It is simply amazing how deadon they begin to shoot when those balloons

go up onto the targets! The novelty shoot consisted of a 3-D alligator with a small spot on the 12-ring. We gave prizes for the two closest arrows to the spot. Again, by the end of the class, we had many women zeroing in on the gator! I must admit that I have never seen such a camera magnet in my life! While instructing classes in the past, we've turned to find people not in our course getting their pictures taken while wrestling the gator. It was fun to watch! Judy Kitchen, a student from the WITO event responded, "As a beginner to the sport, I felt that the instructors were very professional and thorough in teaching the 'Art of Archery.' I've taken away a lot of valuable information from the class and I'm excited about pursuing archery as a regular hobby."



Our Bowfishing course has improved since the first class. We made high-density foam carp, which are weighted by 10 lb. weights. Each fish is sunk about a foot underwater. These are much better than the Tide bottles we began with over a year ago. The class starts with a short video I made a year ago with my brother while bowfishing for Cow-Nosed Ray in the Patuxent River. As with the archery course, we have a statement we make in each bowfishing course. "You will get excited. You will get wet. You will get exhausted by the end of the day." Again, I can think of no better way to describe this sport. Following the video presentation, we covered the pros and cons of both compound bows and recurve bow

used in the sport, as well as the makeup of bowfishing and the different styles available. Finally, we ended the classroom portion with information on where to bowfish for Carp, Gar, and Cow-Nosed Ray and what to look for when searching each out. Once the class presentation was completed, we brought the students out to the water and began working with each student, one at a time. This helped to ensure they maintain the proper form learned from the archery courses and also to take in the refraction of the water. Once each student was comfortable, we began by allowing them to shoot the fish and haul them in when hit. This past course, at Hungry Mother State Park, we began running with a rope attached to the fish, to allow the students to shoot at a moving fish under water. Needless to say, that went over really well. I'd love to come up with a way for the fish to "fight back" once the arrow actually hits it.

While the styrofoam fish may not have provided a lot of action, they were suspended underwater, which allowed me to experience the issue of refraction while trying to adjust to a heavier arrow," said student Jaine Darby.

Last year, we brought a full sized real ray with us for the women to see exactly what they were fishing for, as well as 40 lbs. of ray meat, which was prepared the night before. Following that Mother/Daughter event, a woman and her daughter approached me and deeply thanked the VBA for sponsoring her family to attend the event. That made me very proud indeed to be a VBA member and see the joy we had given to others in pursuit of our sport.

In the end, each of the courses has been tons of fun for both the participants and the instructors. If anyone knows of women interested in the outdoors, I would highly recommend one of these two courses to them. Outside





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# Two Rivers Archery Club Front Royal, Virginia

Rivers has been around for a long time. It is now located about two miles from the Linden, Virginia exit off of Route 66 at the junction of Dismal Hollow and Happy Creek roads.

Two Rivers now has a 28 target field range on its own land with kitchen, playground, horseshoe pits, pavilion, parking area and brand new cellotex practice range. The club will be replacing all close yardage butts with Cellotex for the 2002 season.

In addition to a full season schedule of NFAA rounds, TRAC holds a terrific annual with a two night coon shoot, two days of field rounds and 3D along with super fun novelties like a 120 yard 'wand' shoot (50/50 \$), lifesavers/ping pong balls, apples – shot from a 'human' head (penalties involved) and aerial disc shooting with recurve and flu-flus. (Traditionally a wand was a peeled willow branch, two thumbs in thickness stuck in the ground and shot at from between 80 and 120 yards with the English longbow. TRAC has modernized the event with a soft pine stick 2" wide x 1/4" thick x 6' tall with gradient measurements at 1" on center backed by a large Cellotex bale.)

On Tuesdays from June through September TRAC holds a 50/50 3-D shoot starting at 4:30 p.m., offering an open kitchen with great food and great company from sister clubs Massanutten and Shenandoah. Wednesday night finds TRAC 3-D shooters at Shenandoah Archers and Thursday night finds them at Massanutten; three great clubs with a lot to offer and many reciprocal associate members.

In partnership with Massanutten, TRAC holds indoor shoots throughout the winter at the 4H center with some very keen competition between teams.

TRAC is a great place to bring children of any age to shoot, as many members have children and the patience and equipment to get them started with the right attitude.

If you get the chance, shoot at Two Rivers this year!


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

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
## Mississippi Venison Roast With Red Wine And Musbroom Sauce

1 (3-4 lb.) venison bindquarter roast Buttermilk 1/2 cup all-purpose flour 1 tsp. salt 1 tsp. pepper 1 tsp. garlic powder 1 tsp. paprika 1/4 cup olive oil 1/4 cup bacon drippings
1/2 cup tomato juice
juice of two limes
juice of one orange
2 bay leaves
2 Tbsp. red plum jelly
1/2 cup red wine
1 (8 oz.) can musbrooms, drained

In a large glass container, soak venison overnight in the buttermilk; turn frequently. Remove venison and allow to drain. Mix and sift flour, salt, pepper, garlic powder and paprika. Roll roast in the flour mixture, reserve flour for sauce. In a large Dutch oven or heavy roaster, quickly brown the roast in the olive oil. Combine bacon drippings, juices, bay leaves, jelly and wine and mix well. Pour the wine and jelly mixture over the roast. Preheat oven to 300 degrees. Cover roast and bake for one to two hours or until tender. Add the mushrooms. Thicken sauce and pan drippings by adding a little of the flour mixture which was left over from coating the roast. Serves 8.
