From The NFAA Director

The Mid-Atlantic Outdoor Sectional Tournament will be held on June 16 and 17 at the Sugar Hill Recreation Area in Watkins Glen. Shooting will consist of a 28 target field round on Saturday and a 28 target hunter round on Sunday. There will be NO animal round at this tournament. I have been advised that the the "2001 Porsche Clash" race event will be held at the Watkins Glen International race track the same weekend as the Mid Atlantic tournament. I urge those planning to attend the tournament to make hotel reservations early. The Seneca Lodge has informed me that they have 58 motel rooms and 20 cabins. Seneca Lodge will not accept reservations fc 2001 before January 12. Those interested in rooms should send a written reservation request to the Seneca Lodge, P. O. Box 272, Watkins Glen, NY 14891 as early as possible. The reservation request should include the following: credit card number and expiration date; number of rooms needed; choice of cabin or motel room; double or queen size bed. The Seneca Lodge will send a letter confirming your reservation.

The Seneca Lodge's telephone number is (607) 535-2014 but the phone is not "turned on" until early April and by then the rooms might be filled.

Agenda Items Of The VBA March 2001 Meeting

- Amend Article 4, Section 1 of the Constitution to read: "No Officer of the Association can be a Director representing his/her Club or group. However, elected or appointed Officers will be allowed to vote on behalf of their Club when the Club's Director is absent. **PASSED**
- "Eliminate the office of Field Governor. Duties to be assumed by the NFAA Director."
 PASSED
- Add to the 3-D shooting rules a clause to restrict shooting times

in 3-D as follows: "Two minutes are allotted for the first shooter in each group. Time will begin when the advance group clears the target. Each following shooter in the group will have one minute to shoot his or her arrow. This begins as soon as the previous shooter releases their arrow. Individuals taking more than the allotted time may have five points taken from their score." This will be effective immediately.

I would personally like to thank Bob Seltzer and all the volunteers who helped at both shows. A special thank you to Dave Proctor for the volunteer time he spent re-designing the prop.

In March we had the VBA State Indoor Sectional at Augusta Archers. Those who went enjoyed getting together and having fun no matter the weather or distance. If you missed Mark Lohr's Saturday night ping-pong ball shoot, then you missed it all! It was reported that participation was down approximately 27% from last year and *why*? From discussions at the March VBA meeting, we may be back to two locations again! As for those who went to the Mids, lucky for them to have missed the big storm of the year! The participation at Augusta and Prince William Archers was also down.

Our NFAA Director, Cay McManus ventured to Las Vegas for the annual Board of Directors meeting and came back with some interesting news:

• There will be an increase of NFAA dues to \$25 for Head of Household and \$31 for family membership.

• *The 2002 Nationals will be a five- day shoot.*

• There will be a Senior Division (ages 55 to 64) and a Master Senior Division (over 65) at Sectionals and Nationals.

• Motion failed - 50 yards maximum for Traditional Archers.

• The 3D rules will be by themselves.

• Marihelen Rogers salary increased by 10%.

• NFAA mileage allowance increased to .35 per mile.

• Scheduled shoots for 2002 are: Las Vegas -February 15-17 (February 14-16, 2003) Kansas City Indoors - March 30-31 Atlantic City Classic - April 19-21 New York Outdoors - July 29-August 2 (five days)

All In An Afternoon's Hunt

Tovember 13, 2000 started out as a typical day of bow hunting for deer in the wooded area near my home. Arriving at my pre-hung stand at around 3:15 p.m., I hooked my bow on the pull rope and then proceeded to distribute scent over an area that extended to about twenty yards away from my stand. Once on my stand, I used my Bow Grunter Plus, first on the "doe" setting and then on the "dominant buck" setting, hoping to attract the attention of a trophy deer. Would I be lucky today? After about an hour of waiting and using my caller about every ten

minutes, I heard a sound in the distance. There, about fifty yards away was a deer moving parallel to my location. Immediately, I used my doe call to try to draw him into closer range, but was not successful, as he moved down the trail to a bedding area about 150 yards away. Changing the grunter to the dominant buck setting, I made several calls and waited. I repeated this process a second time with no response. I reset my call to the doe setting and as I was about to call, I heard him and saw him moving towards me. This time he was different. He seemed angry with his head down and the hairs on his back seemed to bristle in the air. He moved down the path with the stiffness in his step of a statue.

Readying myself for the shot, I placed my caller on my seat and folded it up. In the rush of the moment, I accidentally knocked over my caller. I held my breath as it went sailing towards the ground. Luck was on my side as it landed on a limb about three feet below my stand. The deer stopped about 40 yards out and seemed to survey the area, looking for another deer.



I pondered as to what my next move would be in that I could not retrieve my caller without the possibility of exposing my location. At that moment, the deer started walking parallel to my stand. My next strategy was to pick a shooting lane ahead of him that was about 40 yards. I released the arrow, but unfortunately I did not hit my target. I misjudged and my arrow landed too low. Startled, he jumped and ran about 15 yards before stopping. As he walked away from my stand, I quickly grabbed my safety rope and attempted to retrieve my caller. In the excitement, I had not changed the caller from doe call, so the deer did not respond. Quickly, I corrected the problem and called again. Suddenly, the deer stopped, looked around, and started moving towards me. After a couple of low calls, I waited. He stopped about 22 yards from me and began to pace. As if he sensed my presence, he seemed to look up at me, but did not leave. Several glances later, he turned to my right and started to walk on an angle from my stand down a trail.

I was in luck because I had pre-

ranged that area on previous hunts on the same stand. I knew that the only shooting lane was at 31 yards between two trees that were two feet apart. This was my chance! I came to a full drawn position and waited for him to walk into the lane.

I released and BINGO!, I had made contact. The arrow had entered his back. As he jumped to retreat, I saw blood gushing from his back wound. I had hit a main artery. The deer ran about 30 yards, stopped, looked back, stumbled and fell. After taking a deep breath in an effort to control my emo-

tions, I whispered a prayer thanking God for the opportunity to be victori ous on this hunt. Fifteen minutes later, I descended my stand to view my prize. The feelings that I experienced when I saw the trophy that I had killed were hard to handle. My buck was an eightpointer with a 17 inch plus inside spread and 21 inch plus main beams. Might make Pope and Young, hopefully.


This past hunting season, my hunting partner and I were leaving the woods after an evening hunt. Along the edge of dark as we were walking out of the woods, we happened to jump several deer. As the deer went running toward the adjacent property, we heard the sound of leaves rustling and what sounded like a barbed wire fence rattling. Apparently the deer were trying to cross the fence. The first deer made it, but the second one wasn't so lucky. As he tried to cross he fence, he got tangled in the barbed wire. As my partner and I stood there listening, we could hear the fence shaking as the deer struggled to get loose.

The deer continued to fight the fence and my partner and I decided to go and see if we could untangle him. Walking down to the fence, we found a young button buck tangled in the

barbed wire. The deer's rear legs looked as though they were braided through the fence wire.

In order to get the deer untangled, I tied a piece of rope around his hind legs so I would not get kicked. My buddy held the fence and I slowly slid the legs through the barbed wire, allowing the deer to get loose. My rope came unwrapped from his legs as he took off running through the woods. Luckily, I had my camera with me and was able to get this picture, and my partner and I were able to save a deer from a grueling death by coyotes or starvation.









Roast Hindquarter of Venison with Currant Sauce

6 Tbsp. butter 1 large yellow onion, chopped 3 Tbsp. green onions, chopped 1 large carrot, chopped 6 whole cloves 1/2 tsp. dried thyme 3/4 tsp. dried marjoram 1/4 tsp. dried tarragon 1/2 tsp. dried basil 1/2 tsp. dried rosemary
1/8 tsp. sugar
1 cup Burgundy wine
1 hindquarter of venison, with bones
olive oil
black pepper
cayenne pepper
1/2 lb. salt pork, cut into thin strips
4 cloves garlic, sliced

Make Red Wine and Spice Marinade by melting the butter and sautéing the onion, green onions and carrots over low heat until they are tender; add the cloves, thyme, marjoram, tarragon, basil and

rosemary; mix well; add the Burgundy; mix well and remove from heat. Brush the venison with olive oil and sprinkle generously with salt, black pepper and cayenne pepper. Place venison in large glass bowl and pour the marinade over. Cover the bowl and refrigerate for 6 to 8 hours.

Remove roast from the marinade and allow to drain. Strain and reserve the marinade. Make deep cuts all around the roast and place a piece of salt pork and a slice of garlic into each cut. Preheat oven to 450 degrees. Insert a meat thermometer into the thickest part of the roast, making sure not to touch the bone. Place roast in roasting pan and pour 3/4 cup of the marinade over the roast; roast for 30 minutes.

Reduce heat to 325 degrees and, basting frequently with pan drippings, roast until less than medium done. When the roast is done, reduce oven to 200 degrees. Remove the roast to a platter and keep warm in oven until the sauce is made.

pan drippings 1½	tsp. fresh lemon juice
3/4 cup dry red wine 1/2	2 cup currant jelly
1/4 tsp. ginger 37	bsp. flour
1 large carrot, chopped 1 k	nindquarter of venison, with bones
1/4 tsp. cloves 11/2	Tbsp. brandy


Pour pan drippings into a large saucepan; add sauce ingredients and cook over low heat until currant jelly is melted. Continue cooking until sauce is reduced by one-third. Slice roast and spoon some of the sauce over each serving. Serves 10 to 12.
