### From The Hunting Vice President

Yes, it is that time of year again. The weather is giving its hint of fall, and the hunting season is just a few days of target practice away. Given the facts that we need to be outside honing our skills and that the editor keeps a tight rein on the length of this column, let me summarize a few key topics.

First, the Bill Bennett Award. Don't forget that as a VBA member you are eligible for a plaque as the first presentation of the award and a pin for all subsequent presentations. After harvesting the deer, fill out an award application and send it to Ann Boyd. Her address is on the form. She forwards the form to me and I make sure your award is provided to your club for presentation at one of your meetings.

Second, the Annual VBA Awards Dinner: the dinner is set for March 14, 1998 at the Mount Vernon Best Western Hotel in Charlottesville. Details will be announced in future newsletters, but put it on your calendar now. We will have a guest speaker, good food, plenty of prizes, animal/equipment displays, and presentation of the VBA awards.

Third, the VBA awards. There is an award for the largest carp and the largest gar taken by bow and arrow. The weights need to be certified and entry is by using the VBA Carp/Gar

from. Again, send it to Ann and she will forward it to me. First, second and third place winners will receive plaques. There are also awards for the largest doe by weight, the largest buck by weight, and the largest rack scored by the Virginia system. You need to send your entry form to Ann along with a copy of the game tag. Please pay special attention to the requirement that the weights be certified – no guessing allowed!

Finally, but perhaps most importantly, are changes to the hunting regulations. There are many changes this year, so be sure to read your state, county and local rules. Among the key changes: season lengths may be different than in previous years depending on where you hunt, and this year you can harvest a maximum of five deer three on your Big Game tag and two on the single bonus tag you are permitted.

I hope to receive a record number of requests for Bill Bennett awards and would like to see some real com tion for the VBA hunting awar. Remember, there is a first, second and third in all categories, so be sure to enter.


Good hunting, and see you at the banquet in March.

Thanks to Frank and Mary McGurgan, Dave Burpee, Bob Seltzer and Irene Stocksdale who greeted and talked to many folks about archery, the VBA and its affiliated clubs.

### **Bidding For Wild Boar**

I thought I'd learned my lesson bidding on hunts. Burned once at a Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation Banquet, when I "won" the bid on a Colorado 2-D rifle season elk hunt, and ended up in a snowline camp with two Wisconsin hunters who took 17 shots with 300 Winchester Mags in two days. I got on my horse and left, in fear of life and limb.

But this was different. I'd been to Boar Walla, near Covington, Virginia in '96 for a successful bowhunt and had scheduled a return trip in '97. So when the VBA Banquet offered a silent auction wild boar hunt at Boar Walla, I decidd to bid it up for the beneof VBA and if it stops der the cost of the hunt, tip the guide and cook accordingly. That was the plan and that is how it worked out.

With the VBA hunt certificate in hand it was off to Boar Walla Lodge for an overnight and hunt on Saturday. We were into our camo and out in the woods early after a great night's rest and an excellent breakfast. In our party there was one traditional bow, my Golden Eagle compound and a .44 Magnum handgun. The stalk was on for wild boar.

First a little hill climbing and then the traditional bowhunter begins the first approach on a bedded boar. With a twang and a thump, first blood, but not a fatal hit. On to the chase. By the time we catch up, a couple more shots have found the vitals and the boar is down and out. a tough 300 pounder well-dispatched.

Next the handgunner to the front. veral large boar are rallied in a



thicket and not eager to play. With boar, like elk, "you shoot 'em 'til they're down." Once a big boar was located and clear, it was time to "rumble." Four shots broke the windwhipped silence. What happened? A big brown boar broke past me on the charge. At full draw I knew I'd stated, "Black boar or no boar." Off the lucky 280 pounder ran.

I knew there was a big black boar in that thicket and I'd seen this area in '96. Advance and be ready, slowly moving behind bushes, wind in my favor, strong and gusty. Move - move - check the others' locations - there he stands. Broadside, black, 240 - 260 pounds of "mean meat" looking downhill at the handgunner. Draw, sight, keep the arrow on the rest

-darn wind!- RELEASE, and a hit, but wind and too much cant on the bow. A hit nine inches forward of the aim point, through the front shoulders, neck high.

Off they charge now. Four boar on the move with my wounded boar in the lead. The handgun barks once, twice and one boar goes head over heels. He is finished, but mine is over the hill and now a tracking job. Good blood sealing fast. Seems like an hour later there he is crossing the creek with guides in pursuit. The boar starts uphill and I release as he turns. The arrow slaps off his flank and he goes into the bushes. Now he is headed downhill in a charge. With more care, release and this Thunderhead 125 buries into his spine forward of the right ham. Dang, I'm trying to kill this boar, not punish him! His rear is down and

dragging. Hot pursuit again, advantage bowhunter. The fourth arrow is through the lungs from 15 yards and he is in the creek. The wildest of wild boar hunts is over.

What a day! Then I realize it is not yet noon. What excitement! A group of Maryland bowhunters has also been successful and now the outfitter begins the butchering process. We have a great lunch and by mid-afternoon are on the way home with coolers full of tasty pork.

Great hunt; smart bid; Boar Walla delivers! Thanks to the VBA! Maybe bidding on hunts isn't so bad after all. How about trying this again next year? Anyone for wild and wily boar?





Dear Governor Allen:

I am the Executive Director of *Common Sense for Virginia*, a statewide organization which represents some 12,000 Virginia biomedical researchers, small businessmen, recreational sportsmen and others determined to prevent "animal rights" extremists from infringing <u>our</u> rights to peaceful, lawful use and enjoyment of animals. The enclosed brochure explains our purpose.

We read with some consternation, the news that you had proclaimed August as "Virginia is for Animal Lovers Month" at the request of People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals (PETA).

PETA is an extremist organization cloaked in the guise of harmless pranksters. The organization's motto is "Animals are not ours to eat, wear or experiment on." PETA's co-founder Ingrid Newkirk, stated the organization's philosophical view of the moral equivalence of animals and humans when she declared, "a rat is a pig is a dog is a boy." For years, animal rights extremists have harassed Virginians wearing fur, eating meat, hunters, fishermen, trappers, biomedical researchers and mothers.

That harassment continued as late as June 29th when a violent animal rights demonstration spilled out of the Animal Rights '97 convention co-sponsored by PETA in a Crystal City hotel, and into a McDonald's restaurant across the street. Patrons and staff were harassed; property was damaged; more than 60 riot police were called, and 18 demonstrators were arrested. Even more violent demonstrations occurred in Washington D. C. the next day, resulting in further arrests on charges including arson and attempted murder.

PETA itself is currently being sued in U. S. District Court in Norfolk by a New Jersey-based medical research laboratory. PETA infiltrated the lab, surreptitiously removed proprietary documents then, based on spurious allegations of animal cruelty against the lab (a PETA trademark for the past 17 years) convinced several of the lab's major customers to suspend vital research operations. The lab is suing on a variety of charges including Fraud and Theft of Trade Secrets.

In a political season, we understand the appeal of any organization that claims half a million members. Frankly, our own opinion is that this claim, like most of the things PETA says, isn't true.

What <u>is</u> true is that *Common Sense for Virginia* represents biomedical researchers at Old Dominion University, Eastern Virginia Medical School and Virginia Commonwealth University, whose research work using animals holds the promise of a cure for Diabetes; improved understanding of the mechanisms of drug addiction and better treatment for Lyme Disease, among other vital advances.

Just three of our statewide sportsmen's organization members – The Virginia B.A.S.S. Federation, the Virginia Division of the Izaak Walton League of America, and the Virginia Bowhunters Association – represent more than 10,000 active hunters and fishermen who, with other sportsmen, contribute more than \$1.2 billion annually to the Virginia economy, according to the Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries.

Governor Allen, few understand PETA's audacious tactics better than we. We also understand that leaders can be blind-sided; and that sometimes staff decisions have unintended consequences. We trust that this unfortunate proclamation does not represent Commonwealth policy. We hope that you will join *Common Sense for Virginia* in fighting FOR biomedical progress; FOR responsible management – and enjoyment of our wildlife resources; and FOR the rights of the individual to make responsible lifestyle choices – to eat meat; wear fur; own pets; go to the circus; farm, or any of the thousand other in vidual decisions that are ours alone to make.

Also enclosed for your information are a series of recent articles and editorials from *The Bulletin* of Bend, Oregon, and *The Washington Times*. These articles portray the real face of "animal rights" extremism and leave no doubt of the sympathy and support PETA provides for terrorism. Incidentally, my source for these articles, Americans for Medical Progress of *(continued on page 9)*


