Point of Aim

The March VBA meeting started with an excellent turn-out on the 27th by bowhunters from all over the State, who came to attend the first Bowhunter Education Program Instructors' Course. Many of them stayed over and joined with a number of other relative newcomers in attending the official meeting on Sunday. As a result, we had the largest attendance of any VBA meeting in recent times. I am sure the other officers will agree that the discussions were more lively and the viewpoints more varied because the VBA membership was more widely represented. Let's keep up the good work. Make sure your club sends a director to represent YOU at the meetings.

Nancy Lee Western reported that VBA had fewer members on March 21 than we had at the same time last year. While this may be a seasonal factor, since the year is still young, it does reflect a shortage in obtaining new members. We certainly hope you will do your part in promoting archery and help sign up as many new members as possible. There is strength in numbers; strength to get and hold hunting privileges, strength to get and keep the shooting programs we want from NFAA; etc.

Did you know that your membership in VBA automatically makes you an affiliate member of the Virginia Wildlife Federation? It may interest you to know that a number of the new officers recently elected to serve the VWF have expressed a desire to work more closely with us on conservation, hunting and other matters of mutual interest. In line with this, Pete Rowe, VWF President, came to the March meeting and gave us a fine outline of the organization, operation and goals of VWF. When we informed him we are trying to get an extended bow season West of the Blue Ridge, he suggested that a resolution proposing the support of VWF on this might stand a good chance of adoption at their April 10 quarterly meeting. Clint Western and Harold Street volunteered to represent VBA at the meeting, which was held in Roanoke. I have since

learned that VWF adopted our resolution and has forwarded it to the Game Commission.

On May 7, at 9:30 a.m., the Game Commission will have a public hearing at 4010 West Broad Street, Richmond, to decide whether to give us the extended bow season If you can possibly make it, you are urged to be there and lend your support to this effort. Pool up with your buddies, and be there early. Elsewhere in this issue, you will note the two supports of the up with your buddies.

Elsewhere in this issue, you will note the two changes adopted at the annual NFAA meeting that probably will have the greatest effect on our competitive archery game. As with every tournament procedure change I can recall. I am sure some of you already have started tearing your hair out! Before you get too steamed up, permit us to point out a few things. The new targets will eliminate perfect rounds (for awhile at least) and will help in breaking ties. The spot (5) and the 4-ring will be larger; some of the 5's you usually get will become 4's. BUT some of the 3's you often get will become 4's. Everybody's scores will come down a bit, but don't forget that we all will be shooting the same targets from the same distances, keep in mind that the entire U.S. is soon to change over to the metric system of measurement. If we accept the challenge of these changes, and have a little patience, our game can become even more enjoyable than ever.

Bill Enders says we missed getting a Semi-Restricted Bowhunter Division on a national basis by only one vote. It seems this style of shooting is gaining popularity everywhere. Due to the demand of many of our own SRB's. I have appointed a committee to find out what changes you want to make in this division in VBA. Give your suggestions to your club's VBA Director or one of the following committee members: Don Arthur-Roanoke, Webb Babcock-Lynchburg, Sonny Doup-Warwick, Leon Thompson or Bob Steffan-Christiansburg, or David Proctor-Harrisonburg.

Bill Enders Reports on

National NFAA Convention

*N.F.A.A. Director Bill Enders gave a very enlightening report on the National N.F.A.A. Convention which he attended in Long Beach California.

One of the important things decided on at the convention was changing over to the metric System which will become effective in January of 1977. The committee chaired by Paul Double as directed came up with a new proposed target incorporating the metric system of measuring. These targets will be very similar to the ones now being used in the field and hunter rounds. They will be black and white as they are now. The field round target will have a white X in the middle and the hunter will have a black X in the middle of the spot, to be used as a tie breaker. In the field and hunter round a 5 will be counted for striking the center circle, 4 points for each arrow striking either of the inner 2 rings, and 3 points for each arrow striking either of the outer 2 rings. A scoring of 5-4-3 instead of the 5-4 of the old targets.

The scoring of indoor targets was changed also. This will be dealt with further in future issues of Flight as we progress toward the indoor season.

There will be very little difference in the metric system versus the yard system. Following is an example of metric conversion.:

Triangle Has New Range



Triangle Bowhunters of Christiansburg has recently purchased a tract of land near Christiansburg and will have 28 targets completed for their first 1976 in vitational shoot on April 25.

The new range facility is located in the community of Merrimac, approximately midway between Christiansburg and Blacksburg, on Secondary Rd. 657, just 3 miles West of US 460. (See Map on this on page)

Future plans of the club include putting in an additional 14 or 28 targets, construction of a 60' x 100' club house and indoor range, large parking and camping area, a pistol range, and possibly a bowhunting range.

The club anticipates continued growth and interest, and intends to provide its membership and guests with a challenging range, pleasant atmosphere, and First Class Facilities.




Champs and Winners

With all the pressure involved, Robert shot a perfect, taking the State Free Style Championship to Richlands until next year.


