From the President

Every bowhunter's dream to have a trophy deer walk within range during the hunting season. But the antithesis of that dream is a nightmare; it is that moment when you realize that your shot didn't hit exactly where you were aiming. Generally, this is followed by hours of searching, hoping for a glimpse of the fallen animal, and a lot of second guessing as to what went wrong. There are few worse moments for a bowhunter than the realization that you are not going to recover the animal. It is a gut wrenching experience that effects all of us who have been through it.

In addition, anti-hunting groups use statistics on unrecovered deer to portray our sport in the worst possible light. They often cite decades old studies like "Wounding Rates of White-tailed Deer with Traditional Archery Equipment" by Stephen S. Ditchkoff, Edgar R. Welch, Robert L. Lochmiller, Ronald E. Masters, William R. Starry, William C. Dinkines, N. Lincoln. This is a study done at McAlester Army Depot in Oklahoma from 1995-1995. The study reports that 1,300 archers using traditional archery equipment (longbows and recurves) shot 22 deer but only recovered 11, for a 50% nonrecovery (e.g., wounding) rate. Despite the age of this study, and the fact that modern archery equipment is so much more effective, you will find this study cited as evidence that archery is ineffective and inhumane. This and other similar studies are used routinely as typical outcomes of bowhunting, and to negatively influence public perception. This is a clear and present danger to our sport that all Bowhunters need to be very much aware of.

Despite efforts of the anti-hunting community, Northern Virginia (NOVA) has been able to create and sustain a model archery program that has proven to be an effective, low cost method of controlling deer populations in the Fairfax County Park system. But not surprising, the program constantly having to defend the use of Bowhunting, both to elected officials who are vulnerable to the one sided arguments of the anti-hunting community, as well as landowners who have property adjoining the parks, and can be concerned with ensuring the hunts are conducted in a safety and ethical manner.

Against this backdrop, a group up called the Deer Advisory Council of Northern Virginia has conducted a study that looked at deer mortality in NOVA, and to objectively compare humane impacts of different forms of deer mortality in terms of time (duration) and trauma involved with each. What they found is that controlled archery program results in NOVA and other modern archery studies indicate that the typical time and trauma associated with hunting is low compared to other forms of mortality. Statistics on nonrecovery (wounded deer) are maintained and made available to the public. Archers in the Fairfax County Park Program recover 93 to 96 percent of deer that are shot, for an unrecovered rate between 4% and 7%. That's a very far cry from the older, outdated statistics used by the anti-hunting groups.

My point in this discussion is that in the court of public opinion, everything we do as Bowhunters can and will be used against us and our sport. Every bowhunter needs to be keenly aware of this, and conduct themselves with the highest ethical standards when hunting. Assume someone out there is watching, with a phone camera – because they probably are. And your actions, good or bad, reflect on all of us.

If they were really looking to decrease the bear population I think creating a spring bear hunting season like they have in several northern states makes more sense to me. The next thing the VGDIF did was to approve the sling bow for use in hunting season, there is no way that a bow made from a sling shot can be considered a good choice to hunt deer and bear with, the wound rate will skyrocket and the next thing you will hear is that all of archery is under attack from anti hunters saying that all we do is wound animals and leave them to lay around the woods to die a long and horrific death, what were you thinking VGDIF.

I would to like to say goodbye to two friends and fellow traditional archers bowhunters and sportsmen, on May 18 Olin Bare passed away doing one of the many outdoor activities he liked to do, he was mountain biking in the woods near his home and left this world on his own terms and I pray that he is scouting out a new place to hunt on the other side. Over the past several years Olin wrote several short articles for Flight magazine, he was not only a hunter and outdoorsman but he liked to read and study about the origins of archery, he was a big fan of Fred Bear, Pope and Young and of course Ishi, I am going to repost the article he sent me several years ago about Ishi and I hope you will take just the few minutes it takes to read it. Rest in peace Olin and when we meet again I expect you to make good on your promise to teach me how to make Flemish strings. On Sat June 17 Webb Babcock passed in the hospital in Lynchburg, Webb was an avid archer and teacher of archery. He not only ran a sporting goods store but he loved to shoot, teach and mentor the future archers, hunters and sportsmen of not only Virginia but everywhere he traveled. Webb was a friend to all and an archery ambassador at every shoot he would go to. Summer is fast approaching and we are mid-way through the VBA State Tournaments. NORVA will be hosting the 3-D Fall Classic (unmarked) and Walton Park hosting the State Closed. Let's hope that both clubs have a very nice turn-out at these last two tournaments.

I would like to thank Lowell Hertzler, from the Bowhunters of Rockingham, who helped me get the missing FLIGHT issues going back to May 1957. These issues can be found on the VBA website. I must say, the issues are very interesting, historical articles and pictures of archers and bowhunters. My how times have changed!

The VBA is planning to be at several county fairs over the summer. The Bergton Community Fair in Bergton-Rockingham, will be held on August 8th to 12th, the Pr. William County Fair in Manassas on August 11th to 19th and the Shenandoah County Fair in Woodstock on August 25 thru September 2nd. We also plan to be at the Virginia Outdoor Sportsmen Show (VOSS) that will be held the weekend of August 11th thru the 13th. Hope to see you there!

An important article in Cay's June report: she asked the Directors to remind all the clubs and archers of the new rule changes are, regarding shooting rules:

Since the VBA has gone to IBO for the State 3-D's, there have been additions to what rules govern the shoot. PeeWees has become a competitive division. The Spring Classic maximum yards is 60. The Fall Classic (unmarked) is 50 and the know class is 50 for men and 45 for women, and <u>must be declared at the time of registration</u>. There are no money shoots, Pros or Team competition at the State level. The VBA rules have provided, that water will be available at <u>every 7th target</u>. This rule was installed before bottled water was available and water was always free. It should still be free with the clubs using cups and water coolers or bottled water.

The new Cabela's in Gainesville is very interested in conducting a large-scale outreach campaign to their shared customer/constituents. Cabela's would like to have monthly Hunter Education & Boater Education classes in their store, as well as Educational Clinics that will focus on strengthening outdoor skills for both their staff and the public at large. If anyone needs to take any of these classes, contact them.

The VDGIF reported that a total of 18,860 turkeys were harvested in Virginia during the 2017 spring gobbler season. The 2017 harvest was 9% higher than the 2016 harvest. This year's harvest was the third highest harvest in modern times! More details can be found on the VDGIF website and the Outdoor Report.

Also, the department is accepting applications for their next Conservation Police Officer Basic Law Enforcement Academy. The deadline to apply is 11:59 PM on Wednesday, July 5, 2017. If you know anyone that would like to become a CPO, contact Ray Hudgins at the Henrico headquarters.

Some of you may have heard, that Olin Bare passed away on Thursday, May 18, 2017 at age 65, while bicycling in nature on the Chessie Trail. He is survived by his son, Zachary Benjamin Seal of Colorado, and his longtime companion Stephanie Neofotis. He was born in Lexington at Stonewall Jackson Hospital to the parents Geneva Irene Bare and William Campbell Bare.

He was a member of the Virginia Bowhunters Association (VBA) for years. Olin accomplished much throughout the years as a Traditional archer and bowhunter. At the 2016 VBA Spring 3-D Classic, he won the State Championship; in 2015, he placed 3rd; and, in 2012 shot with other Traditional archers. He is known to harvest several does (in 2017 and in 2014), and a bear in 2013. Olin wrote many articles for the VBA FLIGHT. 


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IN MEMEORY OF OLIN BARE

The modern day archer could learn much from a man born in the wild and lived 50 yrs. in the woods before contact with western civilization. The last of the Yani tribe walked out of the woods to be discovered at a ranch in Orville, California in 1911. Ishi means "man" in the Yani language and that is what he called himself because there was no one else left in his tribe to hear his real name. Since he had no ID the sheriff put him in jail. This caused quite a stir at the time. No other Indians could communicate with him. Anthropologist from the University of California heard of the wild man. Professor Waterman who had been documenting western costal Indian tribes was sent to investigate and was able to speak the Yani language that was thought to be extinct. Permission was given by the U.S. Dept. Of Indian Affairs to take Ishi to the University of California for study. Residing professor Dr. Saxton Pope was assigned as Ishi's physician. For the next 4 yrs. Dr. Pope documented everything he could about Ishi before Ishi died in 1915 from tuberculosis from which he had no immunity. This collection of knowledge is not to be forgotten because there is really very little known and documented from reliable sources. Ishi and Dr. Saxton Pope influenced Arthur Young who in turn taught Fred Bear how to make archery equipment. In 1961, Glen St. Charles who worked for Fred Bear at Bear Archery, became Chairman of the Pope & Young Club to Honor a Scoring System for Bowhunters. We must remember and learn from those who spent their life with the bow and arrow. Ishi, Saxton Pope, Arthur Young, Fred Bear and others who lived by the bow would be grateful that a great family sport is still practiced today.

Supplies needed

1 Five gallon bucket with snap lid

1 Bottle brown lysol disinfection

1 Spaghetti strainer (do not use the wife's she won't think its funny believe me i know)

1 Bottle 40% by volume hair peroxide comes from hair salons (this comes in paste and liquid i prefer liquid)

1 Small paint brush

1 Small wash pan (as above do not use the wife's she will not find it funny)

1 Small wire brush

1 Can mod-podge acrylic sealer gloss or matte. (Found in crafts supplies)

1 Small bottle elmer's glue white

1 Box latex gloves

1 Or more skulls this is how i do bear skulls

I use latex gloves for all the next steps! First remove skull from animal. Remove skin and most of flesh and eyes with knife. This next step is of utmost importance. Freeze till hot weather i start my skulls in june.

Now comes the part that will get you a divorce if done too close to the house, or kicked out of the home owners association if too close to the neighbors house, mine are still mad, good thing i never liked them any way. If you don't listen its on you this was a warning, my wife hates it when i do skulls!!! Remove skull from freezer, place in

five gallon bucket cover with warm water to within inches of top of bucket if skull wants to float weight it down, i use a clean rock to hold mine down. Place lid on bucket and seal drill or poke small holes in lid to release gases. Take bucket up wind and a far piece from home hang in tree off ground to prevent dog's and critters from turning it over. Leave in tree. Check on bucket or buckets if doing more than one skull often to be sure critters have not messed up the buckets. Leave

in the hot weather for two months. During this time bacteria will set up in the bucket and eat almost all the flesh from the skull making an awful stink. After two months remove skull from bucket by pouring it through the strainer. The reason for this is the teeth fall out of the skull during the decay and are easily lost be careful. Rinse with clean water use the gloves for this. With wire brush remove any remaining flesh in most cases it is very small amounts if any.Next, place skull in fresh water in the washed out bucket add to this water two table spoons of the brown bottle lysol. Be sure to cover the skull completely, let set over night remove and rinse be careful of the teeth i lost a many of them when i started to do this. The skull will now smell only of the lysol set skull in sun and let dry keep up out of reach of animals. Next place skull in small wash pan or similar container. Pour small amount of the peroxide over skull and brush over skull (waring do not get this on skin it will burn also removes color from clothes) if you do get it on you rinse with water quickly.Place skull in sun to bleach and dry.This step is repeated till as white as you like. Now sit down and figure out were the teeth go and glue in place, once this is done we are in the home stretch. As an after thought if the lower jaws come apart just glue them back together some times the bacteria eats them apart. Now spray the whole skull with the mod-podge sealer. This sealer won't turn yellow like some do. Now your trophy is ready for display. And you just saved a couple of hundred bucks to spend on more archery equipment. There are quick ways to do this. But this way works well and is simple and cheap and i have always had more time than money. Save the remaining supplies for the next time they go a long ways.Good luck.







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Wally and Winnie's Venison Meatloaf

2 pounds of deer burger2 c½ cup beef stock½ c2 eggs slightly beaten1 ts½ tsp worcestershire sauce¼ t¼ tsp dried , crushed sage leaves¼ t¼ tsp dried oregano leaves¼ t2 small tomatoes, peeled, halved and seeded

2 cups of bread crumbs ¹/₂ cup chopped onion 1 tsp salt ¹/₄ tsp sugar ¹/₄ tsp celery salt ¹/₄ tsp pepper ded

Heat oven to 325 degrees. In a bowl combine all of the ingredients except the tomatoes, pat $\frac{1}{2}$ mixture into pan, arrange tomatoes on meat mixture leaving $\frac{1}{2}$ inch around the edges of the pan. Spread rest of the meat mixture over the tomatoes, pressing the edges to seal.

Bake about 1 1/4 to 1 1/2. hours

NEWS FROM DGIF

The Department of Game and Inland Fisheries announced a total of 18,860 turkeys harvested in Virginia during the 2017 spring gobbler season. The 2017 harvest was 9% higher than the 2016 harvest. This year's harvest was the third highest harvest in modern times. The record harvest occurred in 2015 where 20,580 birds were taken. The second highest harvest occurred in 2013 (19,265 turkeys). These record, or near-record setting, season harvests support data showing that wild turkey populations are at record levels for modern times (Fig. 1). Virginia's wild turkey has increased 2.7% annually over the past 10 years. However, with moderate reproduction over the past 5 years, the turkey population has plateaued near these record levels. Crude population estimates put Virginia's turkey population at a range between 185,000 – 195,000 birds.

Although the spring harvest increased 9%, annual changes in spring harvest must be viewed cautiously because of the influence of unpredictable environmental and biotic factors. Hunters encountered unusually warm conditions in the early and middle weeks of the 2017 season. In contrast, spring hunters faced cold, windy, and wet weather in the early weeks of the 2016 season. Both circumstances, unseasonably warm or cold, may serve to suppress hunting success rates. Between the two extremes, unseasonable warm weather may have been a better alternative for hunters as the 2017 season posted a gain. The warm weather did not hold throughout the season as cold and wet conditions prevailed at the end of the 5-week season. The worst weather scenario, cold and snow, greeted hunters in some western highlands near the end of the season!

Figure 1: Spring wild turkey harvest in Virginia, 1961-2017.

The harvest on Saturdays accounted for 30% of the season bag while the harvest on Sundays accounted for 12% of the season total. Clearly, weekends contribute significantly to our spring harvest and the weather can moderate hunter success on these key hunting days. The proportions of the total harvest that occurred on Saturday's and Sunday's this year were nearly identical to 2016.

Youth and Apprentice hunters took advantage of their Weekend Season and tagged 627 birds, a 5% increase over 2016. Recruiting new hunters is a key expectation noted in our Wild Turkey Management Plan; growing the Youth and Apprentice Season harvest to a higher level is a positive sign. The Department's Wild Turkey Management Plan can be read at the following link: <u>www.dgif.virginia.gov/ wildlife/turkey/management-plan/</u>.

Two-year-old birds typically make up an important component of the harvest as these young adults are believed to gobble frequently and respond to hunters' calls more than any other age class. Therefore, good reproduction 2 years prior to the spring season is believed to be an important foundation for harvests and gobbling activity. Recruitment in 2015 was near the survey average so little change in the 2017 harvest was expected (Fig. 2).

Figure 2. Wild turkey brood reproduction based on staff field sightings in August. Virginia's public lands are an import destination for many resident and non-resident hunters. With 1,664,110 acres of land in Virginia, the George Washington and Jefferson National Forests offer tremendous gobbler hunting opportunities in the Blue Ridge and Alleghany Mountains of western Virginia. In 2017, the spring gobbler harvest increased 26% on the George Washington National Forest acreage and 56% on the Jefferson National Forest!

Among regions, Virginia's Tidewater counties have the highest harvest rates (0.93 gobblers/sq. mile of forest range). Westmoreland County is Virginia's Turkey Capital with 2.6 gobblers harvested per square mile of forest range in 2017! Ranking second is Northumberland County with 2.1 birds harvested per square mile of forest range. Order of the other regions is as follows: 2^{nd} – Southwest Mountain (0.82 gobblers/sq. mile forest range), 3^{nd} – South Piedmont (0.63 gobblers/sq. mile forest range), 4^{na} – North Piedmont (0.57 gobblers/sq. mile forest range) and 5^{na} – North Mountain (0.49 gobblers/sq. mile forest range).







The VBA Order of the Golden Feather was created to honor those persons who have given unselfishly of their time and talents toward the betterment of archery and archers. Recipients are persons who possess the virtues of sportsmanship, character, morals, integrity and friendship. As a reflection of the substance for membership, only 80 people have been elected to the Order in the past 71 years.

To be qualified, a candidate must be member in good standing of the VBA at the time of nomination, must have a minimum of ten successive years' membership in the VBA and must be sponsored by three VBA members of good standing or by a VBA Club.

This article is a reminder that candidates must be submitted to the Board of Directors at the March meeting for this year.
