National Bowhunter Education Program

Highlights of N.F.A.A. Meeting

February 1-2-3-4-5, 1978

It is the policy of the Bowhunting and Conservation Division of the NFAA to continually review on an annual basis the National Bowhunter Education Program.

The first objective is to clear up any genuine misunderstandings which may have arisen from information we have released on the program to date.

The second objective is to review, at the request of the NFAA Board of Directors Council, the observations made by the representative of the Archery Manufacturers Organization regarding the program.

The principal points of possible misunderstanding seem to center around the inclusion in the course of the Field Competency Experience (Proficiency Test) whether the course should be voluntary or mandatory, and the requirement that the prospective bowhunter actually shoot under field conditions.

It is the recommendation of the Bowhunting and Conservation Division that the following facts be stated again and that certain changes be made in the requirements for qualification of bowhunters and certification of instructors in the NBEP:

No proficiency test has ever been required for qualifying a bowhunter in any state where the program has been or is now used.

A voluntary proficiency test has been available in Part III for use by federal refuges and military bases who insist on such a qualification. The bowhunter was allowed to participate on a voluntary basis at his own request.

The proficiency test was required of all potential instructors for certification.

The NBEP has been and is now offered to bowhunters, organizations and state environmental and conservation officials on a strictly voluntary basis.

The DNR or the DEC of the state has the complete authority regarding the administration of the Hunter Education and/or Safety programs of the state. Such programs can be made mandatory only by appropriate legislation of the state under this authority.

The NBEF does not promote any legislation which makes the BEP mandatory.

The NBEP has required participants to shoot at a target — the purpose being to give the bowhunter an opportunity to demonstrate his knowledge of the use of his equipment and to learn his own limitations.

CHANGES RECOMMENDED:

The requirements of the NBEP basic course for qualifying bowhunters are divided into "The Hows of Bowhunting" and "The Field Experience."

The first portion of the course will include "The 15 Points of Emphasis in Bowhunting."

Further special emphasis will be placed on the use of matched equipment.

Number 15 will be "Discussion of the available sources of proper equipment for bowhunting."

The second portion of the course, The Field Experience, provides the opportunity for the student to observe, or to participate if he desires, in the use of equipment in the field. The objective is to give him the opportunity of associating with a certified bowhunting instructor who will help him inspect equipment, understand its proper use, and determine how to set his own limitations as he enjoys the sport of bowhunting. The bowhunter should have an understanding of:

adequate legal equipment and familiarity with its proper use.

- how to sharpen broadheads and/or the proper use of pre-sharpened blades
- the importance of limiting the distances of his shots
- safety under field conditions

Setting — Where possible, the area selected should be in a typical environment including natural obstacles such as rocks, trees, bushes. It should be located where broadheads can be shot, if the bowhunter desires, at a proper target under completely safe conditions.

Instructor — The instructor should take every opportunity to assist the student in the use of equipment. He should also have a list of individuals or organizations such as clubs, schools, dealers or lane operators who can assist bowhunters.

The prospective bowhunter is not required to shoot his equipment (or even to have his own equipment to qualify in the course.)

The old Part III will be eliminated from the course.

(Prospective instructors will not be required to complete the proficiency test to become a certified instructor.)

The NBEF is administered by a volunteer committee of outstanding and qualified bowhunters and sportsmen. Recently, this committee has been expanded to include other outstanding members. We believe that the NBEF committee represents all who have an interest in the sport of bowhunting. The program and its administering committee is bigger than any one organization or one interest and is administered in the best interest of the bowhunter and the sport of bowhunting. Members of its committee serve as individuals, not as representatives of organizations or special interests, with the single goal of administering an NBEP for all bowhunters and for all concerned with bowhunting.

The Bowhunting and Conservation Division feels that these statements and changes will dispell any misunderstandings about the NBEF. We would expect that all facets of the bowhunting fraternity will not band together in support of this NBEP and its administration in the various states.

1. There were three nominations for Vice President of the NFAA. Paul Double from Maryland, Benny Morrer from Arkansas and Dr. J. Scheider from North Dakota. Dr. Schneider withdrew his name from the Ballot. Benny Morrer was elected by a vote of 22 to 21. We are now preparing a nomination for Paul Double for President next year and feel that he has a pretty fair chance of winning. This will bring the power back to the east coast.

2. There will be NO alcoholic beverages carried or consumed on any range or practice area during shooting hours at National or sectional tournaments.

3. Bowhunter membership dues have been increased to \$10.00 per year with \$3.00 going to the Bowhunter Defense Fund.

4. A new 500 patch will be designed for the metric target.

5. ***Removing the animal round from National and Sectional tournaments was defeated. The round will stay in.

6. Handicaps will be derived from scores shot within the last 12 months which previously has been 24 months.

7. Course approvals are still every two years and the charge is still \$5.00

8. When shooting butts require multiple faces, the first two shooters will shoot the bottom target. THIS IS NOW A HARD AND FAST RULE.

9. For clarification . . . Expert round. An arrow shaft cutting two rings, must cut completely through the line to count as the higher score.

10 Indoor round. The time limit per end is now officially 5 minutes.

11 Replacement item. Article 7 Section H Page 23 of the NFAA handbook. Delete paragraph 4 and the new paragraph is to read "off ground skids or glances into target shall not be counted. Arrows striking objects over the shooting lane may be reshot.

12 Target points verses Field points. Refer to page 20 Article 7 section D paragraph 3 sub paragraph M. This now reads "There shall be no restrictions placed on the bow weight in the Bowhunter division. Hunting arrows of any material may be used as long as they are equipped with commercially manufactured non modified points, and are a minimum of 125 grain for men and 100 grain for women, that can be replaced by broadheads, and in which at least one quarter inch of the length shall be a concave surface of revolution."

13(1) A dropped arrow is one which falls when being transferred from the quiver to be noched on the string or in preparation for the shot. A DROPPED ARROW MAY BE RESHOT.

(2) A shot arrow is one which becomes propelled from the bowstring. SUCH AN ARROW MAY NOT BE RESHOT.

14 Indoor Championship Round. The number of units shot on this round is recommended as 2, but is left to the discretion of the host. (Article 8 section I paragraph I Page 34, and to L after 20 yards.)

15 We now have a Freestyle Bowhunter Limited. (We Won.)

16 Article 7 Section D paragraph 3D change the wording to read “No clicker or draw check will be allowed. The only addition - it makes it positive. No laminations, level, marks or blemishes may appear in the sight window, upper limb or in the field of vision at full draw.

17 Article 7 Section D Paragraph K. Change the last sentence to read “One straight stabilizer with coupling device included (if used) not exceeding 12 in. as measured from the back of the bow may be used in Competitive Bowhunter. No face or forked stabilizer or any counter balance will be legal.”

18 At National and Sectional Tournaments a practice area shall be available from 10 to 80 yards in 10 yard increments.

19 1979 Pro dues to the NFAA will be \$75.00. Pros are now paying \$50.00.

20 The Killian shooting tab is not legal in Bowhunter.


SCHEDULED BOWHUNTER EDUCATION COURSES

EXERCISE IN IMAGINATION

I would like to attempt to help you form a picture in your imagination. This picture is one that I experienced while camping in the woods in October of this year. Listen carefully to the words as I describe it and let your imagination form the picture for you.

This year we camped on a little ridge away from the road that winds through the Jefferson National Forest. We have camped here before and there is a special place I want to take you to in your imagination. So come with me. Pick up our folding chairs, tuck a book under your arm for reading, let us walk down this ridge, back into the woods.

We walk on a trail that goes out of the crest of the ridge, past large black gum trees, clumps of mountain laurel and fragile dogwood and service berry trees.

We walk back a short ways and come to the end of the ridge which drops off to the valley floor, is a trail made by animals or man in some time past that provides a level place for us to set our lawn chairs.

We sit down and make ourselves comfortable as we survey the scene before us. The ridge slopes off to our left to a level of the valley to join thick, dark green beds of mountain laurel. The ridge

rolls off to our right to a small hollow. The sides of the ridge to our right are covered with clumps of mountain laurel, dogwood, and white oak trees. The valley directly in front of us is approximately 100yds. wide and 200yds. long from left to right. The floor of the valley is carpeted with fallen leaves and yellow ferns that have started to change color from the autumn weather. Large white oak and a few crab apple trees cover the valley. These oak trees thrust upwards to a height of 100 to 125 feet, reaching for the sky.

From the hollow to our right a small stream, perhaps three foot wide, winds its way through the valley floor and disappears in the thick laurel beds to our left. Across the valley, directly in front of us, the mountain rises sharply to a point high above the valley to the sky above. The sunlight filters through the varied colored autumn leaves and reflects on the stream below that tumbles over stones and sticks that have fallen in its path. We glance up through the tops of the white oak trees and glimpse patches of clear blue sky. The wind has swept the clouds from the sky, leaving pure deep blue and you can see for endless miles, out and out, we know not where.

We settle comfortably in our chairs and the quietness settles around us. The breeze whispers in the trees overhead. We

hear a rustle in the leaves and glance to our right to see a chipmunk scurrying from the valley floor, up to a clump of laurel near the top of the ridge.

The peacefulness and quietness surround us and as our gaze sweeps the valley in a semi-circle, a picture forms in our imagination.


The mountain, across the valley that rise to a peak, becomes the choir loft and pulpit. The ridge where we sit becomes the balcony pews. The canopy of blue sky becomes the ceiling. The valley is the sanctuary where the worshipping oak trees stand uprightly. This surely is one of God's Cathedral. Yes, that is what we shall name our picture . . . God's Cathedral. The oak trees are dressed in their season's best colors, their limbs extended out and upward in worship and supplication to their creator. Peace and quiet enter into our very being and in a moment of worship, we lift our arms, as the oak trees lift their limbs, and say aloud what they must be saying, "Praise, ye the Lord." We are so fortunate to be able to slip away from the hurry and rush of civilized life to sit in this pew of one of God's Cathedral. Let us hope our children and grandchildren will be able to see a similar picture in their imagination, as they view God's great handiworks.



Virginia Bow Deer Harvest--1977

Following are selected bow kill statistics provided by the Virginia Commission of Game and Inland Fisheries for the 1977 season. No statistics are shown for counties with a harvest of less than 15 deer. Statistics are not available for Loudoun County.

Hopefully, the statistics will be useful in determining the most productive area to hunt. A word of caution — if you are after a trophy buck, you may not find him in a county with high harvest. Other factors to consider are that the number of deer taken will necessarily be influenced by the number of hunters afield and the size of the county, as well as the deer population of the county.

Of the total 986 deer taken statewide (including counties with a harvest of less than 15) 520 or 53% were taken west of the Blue

Ridge. There were 599 bucks harvested compared to 387 doe.

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
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
