Survey Conducted During State Open

As those of you who attended the State Open know, a survey was conducted to find out what type of equipment was being used here in Virginia, and who is using it. 180 shooters saw fit to fill out all or part of this survey. (mostly part) Here are the results:

BOWS—Hoyt (57), Bear/Jennings (37), Pearson (19), PSE (18), Browning (14), Martin (11), Golden Eagle (11), Darton (3), American (2), eight other types 1 each.

RESTS—Springy (50), Wise (29), Star Hunter (14), Terry II (11), Supreme (9), TM Hunter (8), Pacesetter (4), Barner (4), Stanislawski (4), Homemade (4), and 2 each of 9 other types.

ARROWS—XX75 (60), X7 (57), AFC (15), ACE (3), Beman (2), Cedar (1).

SIGHTS—Check-it (42), Toxonics (20), Cobra (18), PSE (15), Hoyt (15), other (13).

RELEASES—Stanislawski (32), Fletchmatic (14), Failsafe (11), Golden Touch (9), Hot Shot (8), Golden Eagle (5), Barner (4), others (6).

TABS—Black Widow (24), Saunders (9), Neet (8), Homemade (5), others (4).

OTHER—Clicker (6), Draw Stops (4). **Staff Shooters**—15 total—Hoyt (4), York (2), Bear (2), and one each from Browning, Golden Eagle, Astro, Martin, PSE, JLJ, and Oneida.

1990 State Open A Huge Success

The Bowhunters of Rockingham would like to thank everyone involved, shooters and workers alike, for helping to make the 1990 State Open such a huge success!!!

214 shooters from Virginia, West Virginia, Tennessee and North Carolina took to the ranges on Saturday morning, and when the shooting was over on Sunday afternoon, 27 new State Champions had been crowned, and 11 new State records for aggregate score had been set!

The top score of the week-end once again came from the men's Freestyle division, with Mark Lowe of Tenn. posting a 1093. Virginia's own C. D. Miller was 2nd with a 1091, and Terry Pendley of N.C. was 3rd with a 1085. These guys had better watch out though, as Paula Weissend posted a 1073 on her way to winning the women's Freestyle title, and setting a new aggregate score record.

Not far behind the Freestyle shooters was Martin Stonesifer, who posted a 1087 while winning the men's Bowhunter Freestyle division. His score was also good enough for a new aggregate record.

Doug Carico saved the weekend for the men's limited shooters. He posted a 1043 on his way to winning the men's Bowhunter Freestyle Limited division. This was one point better than women's Freestyle Limited winner Debi Barker. Debi beat the men finger shooters at the Indoor, and was looking to do it again at the Open. Her 1042 was also good enough for a new aggregate record.

James Moore, Jr. won the men's Freestyle Limited division with a 1031. Charles Waybright was lead-

ing that group on Saturday, but J. J. and Vance Cave both made charges on Sunday, with Vance ending out 2nd, and Charles 3rd.

Gloria Smith won the women's Bowhunter Freestyle with a 936, followed closely by Marsha Layman with a 934. Linda Bradley won the women's Bowhunter Freestyle Limited division with an 847.

Albert Walker beat Tom Schanbacher by 2 points to win the men's Barebow division. Something new happened though this year, they both beat women's Barebow winner Cay McManus. If I were you guys, I'd watch out next year!!! I don't believe Cay will cut you any slack at all. (Now, did I really say CUT SLACK?)

John Boyd had the lead in the men's Bowhunter division on Saturday, but Howard Farris caught fire on Sunday, and left it to John and Kenneth Sorrels to fight it out for second. John ended out beating Kenny by 1 spot!

Webb Babcock won the men's Traditional division. He and Larry Fisher showed us what that style is all about, and had most of us wondering just how they could shoot that good with a recurve and no sights. Webb also won the Saturday afternoon FUN SHOOT, which was right up his alley. If you didn't shoot in this shoot, you really missed out according to everyone who did. It was 14 3-D targets, recurves and longbows only, and no sights. Everyone I talked to who shot in it had a great time, but the guys who cleaned up the range the next day said that there was a box full of bent and broken arrows. Special thanks to Danny Alger, who helped me come up with the trophies for this shoot, and Debi


Barker, who took the registrations for it.

If we left anyone out, we are sorry! It was a team effort, and ALL the team members count, even if you were left off our list!




Bowhunters Jamboree Eastern Region September 15, 16





Fogbuck

It was one of those cold, damp, autumn mornings when everything is cocooned in a chill sheath of foggy silence. The bite of excitement that edged my consciousness was due to my intended activity for the day. Nothing gets me going faster or more intensely than an opportunity to bow-hunt for whitetails!

As I made my way through the foggy darkness, images of deer mingled with my mental reconstruction of the approach for getting into position undetected. Once on stand, daylight was inhibited by the damp mist that clung everywhere. When I finally could make out my surroundings, visibility was restricted to thirty yards or less. The heavy dampness muffled everything so that squirrels appeared almost like apparitions even on the brightly colored, leaf strewn forest floor. Only the myriad birds that inhabit the deer woods of a hunter's autumn uttered an audible whisper of activity in the morning fog. I watched and listened in silent anticipation as minutes evolved into hours. Slowly the fog began to creep eastward and the sun's October rays began to thin its composition. I stood once and scanned all around. The fog's pace quickened as an Indian Summer breeze began to work its unique effect on the environment. The sun was well into the sky when visibility could hold to forty yards consistently. To my right I discerned a faint footfall. I shifted my focus to the vicinity and studied the wall of fog. The sun's rays shimmered on the wet autumn leaves in a bright reflection just beyond the limits of three dimensional vision. In this area of light I could detect a shadow that appeared to have a horizontal aspect to it. My concentration intensified. At times the fog would thin slightly as it hurried on its way. It was in one of these breaks I caught a glimpse of movement. I looked on. Minutes dragged by at an alarming rate. My senses began to cramp with the effort of concentration. Then, the sound and sensation of a single, cautious step. I still could see nothing tangible but I knew a deer was making its way right toward me. The fog thinned briefly and I could make out a shape, but it took some minutes to delineate first the form of a high, tight rack and then the twitch of an ear. The fog bunched briefly and then thinned as the buck took two more

steps and came into semivisibility. The suspense was incredible. The buck would alternate between the visible and the invisible with the density of the fog. Each time he disappeared my senses would wind that much tighter from anticipation. My immediate problem was to maneuver to a shooting position without being detected. Slowly I began to shift. The image of the buck was never very clear, but I tried to time my moves when his attention seemed to be averted. Suddenly he bounded to my right and disappeared into the haze. I strained to make him out again, but he was gone.

I waited a long time for a reappearance of that deer, but he never returned. The day progressed as only a mountain autumn day could; full of forest critters and the conduct of their daily business. At dusk I sat quietly and watched as groups of does browsed their cautious way past and then I snuck out to my truck once it was too dark to shoot.

Life has been full of dreams for me and some of them have even come true. At times these dreams end in disappointment or frustration. Hunting can also be frustrating, but rarely is a bowhunting experience disappointing. That night I had dreams of the fogbuck and those dreams proved not to be disappointing

Next morning, as I made my way slowly in the dark, the events of the previous day mingled with the mental reconstruction of my approach strategy. During one of my pauses I could make out the movement of deer ahead. I waited patiently as two deer stood and ambled past from right to left. When I was sure they were out of ear shot I resumed my course. I had not traveled far and was only a few steps from my stand when one of the earlier encountered deer began to stamp its hoof! After a time snorts joined the stomping, shortly followed by the sound of running deer. It did not take me long to cover the remaining distance to the stand and as I


waited, high in an oak tree, the two deer cautiously returned to investigate the disturbance. They seemed to know exactly where I had left the ground and soon I had two does right at the base of my tree conducting a thorough investigation of the area. One of them was a small piebald that I had seen at a distance the previous day. There was just enough light to make them out at close range, but not enough to shoot. Soon they moved off into the woods and it got quiet. I amused myself watching squirrels and assorted wildlife. At one point I got a little cold, but when I moved to put on a heavy wood shirt an unseen deer, off to my left snorted and took off running. I sat motionless again for some time before the next deer arrived and this time, I was ready.

In some hemlocks to my immediate left a deer began a deliberate approach to the area. I could see it skirting just inside the thick cover. It continued on with its head down and then broke out where I could recognize it as the fogbuck. My cardiovascular system was operating in overdrive at this point and I stood as he hesitated and looked the other way briefly. He started moving left to right, broadside, at just under thirty yards as I came to full draw. I followed along with him until he hesitated in a shooting lane and then the arrow flashed across the forest. I could see the deer alert and coil to bolt with a snap of the bowstring, but he could not move quickly enough and the shaft caught him square in the chest, with a thump. He spun away and disappeared down a steep bench.

By now it was midmorning on what turned out to be one of those really great fall days that you always picture during your most vivid July day dreams. I sat in that oak tree just soaking up the bright fall sunshine and basking in the glow of satisfaction that normally accompanies the accomplishment of an important personal goal. The air was clean and crisp and carried the smells of autumn to my nose. Times like those are priceless. I carry these memories around with me and secret them out for replay at opportune moments back in suburbia.

The blood trail was easily started and followed, but that buck had run straight down a long, steep bench. I field dressed him and then bundled


Atlantic City Classic

Results from the 1990 Virginia May 19th & Bowhunters of

Recently my daughter and I competed in the Atlantic City Archery Classic, a competition for FITA and NFAA shooters. My daughter took 1st place in her class, but when awards were handed out she received only a ribbon, as did all the NFAA Youth Shooters that participated and won. When I inquired why she had not received the advertised "Classic Medallion," the reply I received from Helen Bolnick the tournament director, was "Was she shooting a recurve?" I replied no a compound. Ms. Bolnick further commented, "Well, she should have been shooting a recurve. If she had been shooting a recurve there would have been enough people in her class for her to qualify for a medallion." Furthermore, she also asked if I thought that Jessica deserved an award, being that compound shooters in Ms. Bolnick's opinion were only mechanical operators not true archers as the FITA shooters are. I was taken aback by this attack on compound shooters, especially when I was dealing with someone who was heading a competition as large and varied as the Atlantic City Shoot. I feel that it should not make a difference what style shooting an archer chooses and that one should not be censored for choosing a certain style as opposed to another. Archery's future is in today's young archers, be they recurve or compound shooters. I would hope that in future shoots that all competitors be treated fairly and equally, after all everyone has stood on the line and shot right along with everyone else and everyone has paid the same entry fees, so all winners of any competition are deserving of awards.
