



Officer's Report

1990 NFAA Annual Meeting

The Annual Meeting of the NFAA Board of Directors was held Feb. 13-18 in New Orleans, La. There were 42 attending Directors. The 3 largest member states were California with over 2500 NFAA members, New York with a little over 1200 NFAA members and Virginia with 1151 NFAA members.

Out of the 86 proposed changes to the NFAA Constitution and By-Laws 32 passed. Most had to deal with changes in the way NFAA does business. I've listed some of the most important ones that passed. The rest will be out in the NFAA handbook within 60 days of the closing of the Annual meeting. All will take effect 60 days after the meeting.

1. The biggest change came about through Council and was then changed in the Constitution to agree with Council, sort of putting the cart before the horse. This dealt with the expiration date of NFAA membership.

2. The SS# has been dropped from the NFAA Handicap card. (Editor's note: Nancy Lee Western requests clubs to continue to send SS# to her as this will help to eliminate a lot of correspondence on members who have moved, etc.)

Every agenda Item proposed by the Bowhunter Committee passed. This is the hardest working committee the NFAA has. They had a total of 32 meetings last year alone. Tim Atwood was commended for his work as chairman of this committee. I will have these agenda items published in Flight since all our members should benefit from them.

4. The Cubs are now eligible for perfect patches on a score of 20 shot at 10, 15, 18, 20, 25, and 30 yards. Application is to be made to the State Secretary in the same manner as twenty-pins for the adults.

5. A major change in outdoor scoring. If more than the prescribed number of arrows are shot, a point per arrow over the prescribed number will be subtracted from the score. (If 5 arrows were shot, all in the 5, the highest scored arrow would be pulled, and in this case the total points would still be 20 until you subtracted the one point for the extra arrow, leaving a total score of 19.)

6. The NFAA pro-Division only recognizes FS and FS-L styles of shooting.

7. The traditional rules were moved from the policy section and placed in its proper place so that this style of shooting may be recognized at all levels.

8. NFAA Directors will rule on all protests within his state. All rulings will be forwarded to RIC for action.

9. Multiple target faces may be used on all distances shot in the field and hunter rounds.

10. There is a \$5.00 dues increase. Effective 4-7-90. This effects page 25, article XII, paragraphs B, C, D, H. section B-1st sentence change 15 to 20 section B-3rd sentence change 19 to 24 section D-1st sentence change 16 to 21 section H-1st sentence change 15 to 20 section H-last sentence change 19 to 24

11. ALL ITEMS DEALING WITH DIRECT BILLING were DEFEATED by the Board of Directors.

Now for the bizzare news. On my trip home from New Orleans, I had a conversation with Ken Rogers, SE Sectional Councilman in the Charlotte, NC airport. He informed me that the Council had passed Direct Billing on Monday the 12th of February. This was the first time I had heard of this. You can imagine my reaction to this bit of news in a crowded airport. My apologies would be in order to anyone standing within shouting distance of me in that airport. Upon arrival at home, I began calling other Directors to see if they had heard of this action. I could not get in touch with any so I called Dillard Bucklin and he informed me of the same. I called Paul Double the MA sectional Councilman and he at first told me he thought it had only been a recommendation. Days later I again spoke with Double and he told me the same story as the other Councilmen. I asked why I had not been informed of this while in New Orleans. This started a whole series of out-right lies from him. He insisted to NFAA HQs that he informed his section and that the other Councilmen had informed their Directors. I've found that this is indeed NOT the way it happened. I've since talked to Directors from all sections and I've learned that most of the other Directors were informed of this by their Councilmen. Except the Mid-Atlantic and the Mid-Western sections. Those that were

informed are upset that Council did this on their own and are wondering what can be done about it. I am most upset. I talked for 2 hours with John Slack on the phone about this matter. He insists the Council has the authority to do this. It really didn't upset him that there were states who were not informed of Councils Decision. According to the "Law according to Slack," the Central Billing Program goes into effect Jan. 1, 1991 for all states. I do not agree and there are other Directors who do not agree. With your help I intend to fight this until the Board of Directors pass this billing program.

For those interested, Mardi Gras is not my idea of a good time. It might have been, had I been in a better frame of mind and a lot younger.

Nominations were taken for the NFAA President, and Vice President at the 1990 Annual Meeting. They are: for NFAA President:

Dean Hupp, Director, West Va. Dillard Bucklin, NFAA Vice Pres. Paul Double, Mid-Atlantic Councilman

For NFAA Vice President:

"Bud" Beaudry, Director, WI Chuck Crowell, Northwestern Councilman

My recommendation for these offices is simple, because of the recent actions of "council", any member of council would be eliminated from consideration leaving for President of the NFAA. Dean Hupp, and Bud Beaudry for NFAA Vice President.

Explanation of Why The RIC

The minutes from the NFAA Council meeting of February 12, 1990, states "A motion was made by Ken Rogers, 2nd by Chuck Crowell. 'The NFAA automatic billing program becomes the only method for accepting renewal of dues effective January 1, 1991'" Vote 10-0. This was **not** an agenda item for the Board of Directors to vote on. I did not vote on this. This is the reason for the RIC.

RIC

Question: Does the Board of Directors Council have the authority

to alter, amend, or delete the NFAA Constitution and By-Laws?

Question: Did Council make a decision on Central Billing that will have the effect of changing, altering, or deleting the Constitution and By-Laws?

On Feb. 12, 1990, in New Orleans, LA, the Board of Directors Council met. Quoted from Council "Rough Draft" minutes furnished to me March 7, 1990 by Dillard Bucklin: "A motion was made by Ken Rogers," Councilman from the SE Section, "2nd by Chuck Crowell," Councilman from the NW Section, "that the NFAA automatic Billing Program becomes the only method of accepting renewal of dues effective 1/1/91. Vote was 10 for and zero against. Motion Passed."

In a letter dated Feb. 23, 1990 from Paul Double, Councilman from the MA Section, states "that acceptance of Council minutes by the Directors upheld the Councils recommenda-tion." (Central Billing) First of all the Councilman who voted on this issue believed that the outcome of the vote by the Council was merely a "recommendation" to be voted on by the Board of Directors at the 1990 Annual NFAA Meeting. A recommendation is just that. It does not imply that this is a final decision. It does imply that this was intended to be an agenda item for the Board of Directors, since it is they who vote on all changes to the NFAA Constitution and By-Laws. Secondly, this "recommendation" was never, repeat, NEVER brought up on the floor for the Board of Directors to vote on. Therefore, the Board of Directors did not accept the Council Minutes nor this "recommendation".

The NFAA Constitution and By-Laws state on page 28, Article XV, that the NFAA Constitution and By-Laws can only be altered, amended, or deleted by a vote of 2/3 of the Board of Directors at the Annual Meeting. The Constitution and By-Laws does not make any other allowances for changing the Constitution and By-Laws. It does not state nor imply that any other body of the organization other than the Board of Directors, can change the Constitution and By-Laws. It can not be any clearer on this point.

The specific part of the Constitution and By-Laws attempting to be

changed by the decision of Council deals with the Billing Method, the way dues are collected in each State. It is stated in the Constitution page 3, Article III, para. 3 that dues are to be collected by the State Association, except in those cases that a State Association wishes to allow the NFAA to do the collecting for that State. It does not say that the "Central Billing Program" will be the only methood used for collecting dues.

It is also stated in the NFAA Constitution and By-Laws on page 56, Article V, para. D-5 that handicap cards will be issued by the State Association unless that State Association allows NFAA to do so. It does not say that the NFAA will be the only one to issue and administer NFAA Handicap cards.

The collection of State dues is the responsibility of the State Association. When the fees are due, when they expire, and how much the fees are to be, are all set by the State Association and is so stated in the NFAA Constitution and By-Laws. It says on page 26, Article XII, para. F, that the NFAA dues will coincide with payment of State Dues. The opposite statement was an agenda item from Council at the 1990 Annual Meeting and was defeated by the Board of Directors.

The Mid-Atlantic Councilman, Paul Double, a candidate for the NFAA Presidency in the upcoming election, in a letter dated Feb. 23, 1990 wrote "I cannot see or believe anyone can construe Article VII, para. G as giving the Council the power to override the Constitution, By-Laws or Policies, since it clearly states we (the Council) will be empowered within the restrictions and limitations of the Constitution and By-Laws and Policies as set by the Directors." The Directors at the 1989 Annual Meeting voted to leave the Billing Program on a voluntary basis. If a State Association needed or wanted the services of the NFAA in collecting their State dues and NFAA dues, they were entitled to do so, on the other hand, if a State Association did not feel the need for such service, then that State Association would be allowed to continue collecting dues in the same manner as they had been doing in the recent past. This Billing Program, as it was written and adopted by the Board of Directors, has the ability to help some State Associations, and has. It also has allowed for a State Association to practice the Sovereignty guaranteed by the NFAA Constitution and By-Laws.

At the 1990 Annual NFAA Meeting, there were several items that were directly related to the Billing Program


that if passed by the Board of Directors would have made Central Billing Mandatory for all State Associations. These agenda items were rejected by the Board of Directors, again setting the "Policy" of a voluntary Billing Program. In General Session of the Board of Directors in 2 consecutive years, the Board of Directors have exercised their right and have voted to keep the Billing Program as written in the NFAA Constitution and By-Laws.

It is not the merits of the program in question. What is in question, is the ability of the 8-Councilmen, the past President, and the Vice President, to LEGALLY pass "recommendations" that has the result of altering, changing, and deleting specific parts of the NFAA Constitution and By-Laws. The "final word" is supposed to be the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors "word" at the 1990 and 1989 Annual Meetings was to leave the Billing Program in its present form in the NFAA Constitution and By-Laws.

As the Director of Virginia, being present at the 1990 Annual Meeting and having been part of the Board of Directors that voted down agenda items relating to Mandatory Direct Billing, and being a Director from a State that is not on the Central Billing Program, rules that the Board of Directors Council consisting of the 8-Sectional Councilmen, the immediate past President, the Vice President, the Executive Secretary, and the President, DOES NOT, by virtue of the NFAA Constitution and By-Laws, have the authority, either specific or implied to alter, change, amend, or delete any part of the NFAA Constitution and By-Laws without the expressed consent of a 2/3 vote of the Board of Directors present at the Annual NFAA Meeting. By so ruling, any "decision" made by "Council" that has the result of altering, the NFAA Constitution and By-Laws, is "VOID" and "NULL". Such as the Central Billing issue for all States.

Outdoor League Competition

Has your Club sanctioned your League? Any NFAA chartered association, club or archery lane may apply for the Outdoor League Program.

League sanction will be granted provided:

- a) The League sessions will be conducted on a NFAA approved range.
- b) Official NFAA targets are used in official NFAA round.
- c) A league sanction fee of \$3.00 per archer is submitted to NFAA Headquarters.

NFAA, in granting league sanction, will furnish:

- a) League Sanction Certificate
- b) League Secretary instruction guide
- c) League forms, including team score sheets, team standing forms, team shooting schedules and individual archer handicap and game record cards.
- d) Individual progression awards. NFAA League Awards:
- a) Individual achievement awards. All archers who shoot in a Sanctioned NFAA Outdoor League will be eligible for individual achievement awards. The first three individual achievement awards won by an archer during a league period will be presented by the NFAA free of charge. Patches available for scores, 120, 140, 160, 180, 200, 220, 240, 260, 270, 280 and Perfect Patch.
- b) A League Championship Pin will be presented to each member of a League Championship team.

Escape

It started as a barely perceptible nudge within my sub-conscious, something was near. I could not hear or see it yet. My scan intensified. About thirty yards over my left shoulder I made him out as he slipped quietly along an ancient logging road. The image was equivalent to being touched by a live cattle prod. Every nerve in my body vibrated with anticipation. He stopped and worked over a wrist-size sapling as a fork-horn and a subordinate eight point moved in from behind him. They waited attentively until he finished his work. Then the bruiser moved parallel to me about 20 yards to the scrape.

I had missed a shot at him just four days earlier. This time would be no different. The combination of huntwise savvy multiplied by three was more than I could overcome.

It was a three year old memory, but one I cherished during the past years while work kept me out of the woods. Now I was back. Same woods, different tree. It was the thirteenth day of a fourteen day hunt and what a time it had been. Both my wife and I had seen about everything a woodsman could ask for. From the amorous adventures of a young fork-horn pursuing a conquest to the morning when a cock grouse perched himself on a log beneath my wife's tree and commenced drumming out his love song.

It was a good hunt for my wife on her first attempt at big game with a bow. She had experienced the full gamut including a missed chance at a spike. But it was not my first hunt and I was becoming frustrated. The old hag doubt was beginning to nag at me. Was I in the right spot? Was I using the proper scent? Camouflage? Interpreting sign properly? Should I have passed up that shot in the early going? Yes, yes, yes! Put it all together and it is only a matter of time. But how much time? I turned slowly, inches at a time, to face down the hill. I had been in this tree for over three hours and it finally stopped raining.

My ears strained to detect any sound. My eyes ached from constant peering through openings in the dense autumn painted brush. Still nothing. Then, just below me at less than ten yards I detected a sound. I strained to discern any irregularities in form or color. Then again, the sound of a leaf being plucked from a tree and rain falling from the disturbed tree to the ground. Now I could see it; an eye surrounded by grey deer hair. Then

the nose and a portion of the hindquarters. It shifted and I caught a glint of antler. There was no shot, so I crouched slowly to my seat as the buck turned to move down the hill. My backside touched the seat and an old Jennings hovered in front of me. It had started; a chain of events I felt powerless to control and yet had worked on so many hours to ensure composure. Eyes searching for an opening, brain estimating yardage and determining shot placement, eyes searching for an opening. The white bead found a gap between saplings that quickly filled with the buck's shoulder. The pin moved just below his rib cage. I felt like a spectator with the best seat in the house. The last rib showed in the gap and hand honed death streaked to meet it. My tunnel vision evaporated and I could see the buck carom among the saplings as the arrow hung first on one side and then the other.

It was a staggering sort of run and then he lurched out of sight beyond a stand of hemlock. My heart began to beat again. It pounded in my ears and the cold air inflated my lungs in great draughts. I peeled my tongue from the roof of my mouth, closed my eyes and leaned back against the coarse bark of my perch. Thirty seconds passed, I opened my eyes and sent a second shaft through the same gap the deer had vacated moments before. I checked first my watch and then the leaden sky overhead. Fifteen minutes passed as my brain worked to recon-

struct the scene. It was all there-all but the arrow. I could not mentally confirm the hit. Thirty minutes and I was on the ground searching for sign. Then on some leaves and on a sapling low, I found some blood, not much but a start. The trail weaved in and out of the thicket for ten yards and headed down hill. It took about twenty minutes to start the blood trail. I was excited and rusty but mostly excited. I stopped and lectured myself sitting in the yellow leaves trying to calm down. After about sixty yards I picked up the bent arrow, minus the broadhead and soaked in blood to the yellow fletch.

One hundred yards and forty-five minutes, the trail is steady but leads through some dense second growth. Then a puddle about eight inches across and the unmistakable pattern of a blood-choked cough just beyond. A shard of lung and the trail is heavy and steady. Eyes burn and the back complains but adrenalin presses tired muscles on. Over one hundred and fifty yards and one hour through heavy second growth hardwoods. Red nut stains on yellow leaves attempt to confuse the issue. Then into a hemlock stand consisting of only four trees, but they shield the dark, sponge-like earth from sign preserving leaves. Several strides and I search the far side for exit sign. Fifteen minutes pass, my tongue is thick and tears sting my eyes. I sit in the hemlock stand; to my left a well defined trail of blood stained shreds of tissue paper and then the cursed dark earth that absorbs fluid and rebounds within minutes from footfall. Black sponge of ill fate. I laid my bow on the ground on the high side of the stand. Hands and knees on damp earth to search the decaying needles inch by inch. There on a stick like tree about the size of a knitting needle a dark, dried out blood stain. He had made a ninety degree turn down the hill. I am on him again and soon see the white belly of a deer. Over two hundred yards and two hours. This is what it is all about. Elation and exhilaration wash out my fatigue. Long strides in a crouch through the low undergrowth bring me to the seven pointer that would dress to 145 lbs. As I stand to my full height I feel a twinge of regret and a little let down. In the distance the sound of a pickup on a rut carved dirt road penetrates my mood. I reach for my knife, and as the chore progresses I once again become a "civilized" man.

1989 VBA Bowhunting Statistics

If you were a typical VBA Bowhunter last season the following statistics would have applied to you.

You would have taken a 4 point buck that field dressed 97 pounds. You would have shot the deer at a distance of 21 yards from a tree stand in late afternoon. Your equipment would have been a 64 pound compound bow, aluminum arrows, and a 125 grain Thunderhead broadhead.

The above composite was developed from analyzing the data included on the 233 applications for Bill Bennett Big Game awards for deer. Following is information compiled from the applications.


